VAST QUANTITY OF TIMBER TO BE SOLD

Condition Is That the Humboldt and Eastern Railroad Be Completed

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 15.—The forest service announced today that it will sell a billion feet of timber in the Trinity reserve on the condition that the Humboldt and Eastern railroad is completed and operated to Wildwood within five years. The promoters represented that this will insure the success of the road.

The government requires the removal of the timber within ten years. It sets a minimum price of \$1.50 per 1,000 feet for the first five years and \$2 for the second five years. It is to be auctioned. Reselling for speculation is prohibited.

The department has announced that its intention is to aid the development of Northwestern California as much as possible.

VALUABLE SETTER DOG EATS POISONED MEAT

Mr. Voorhees' "Smoker" Succumbs to Bait Laid Out for Cats.

The handsome Gordon Setter dog "Smoker," belonging to Mr. Voorhees, who so often is seen with Mr. H. Newham, received a dose of poison Saturday evening at 6 o'clock, while making a delivery of vegetables to a party en route home. It is understood poison had been put out to kill cats, and the dog got the bait and died in convulsions in less than half an hour. The dog was a great pet, and highly prized by Mr. Voorhees, as well as the Newhams, and they would not have taken \$100 for him. If the party placing the poison had seen the agony of the poor dying dog and the grief of those to whom the dog belonged, their conscience would have been touched.

BIG STRIKE ON GRAND TRUNK

NEARLY TEN THOUSAND MEN ARE AFFECTED

No Trains Are Moving—The Union Has Over \$1,000,000 in the Defense Fund

TORONTO, July 19.—There were no trains on the Grand Trunk road this morning on account of the strike. Forty-five hundred miles of road are affected. Forty-five hundred yardmen, trainmen, conductors and baggagemen, as well as 5,000 shopmen are concerned in the struggle. The union's defense fund amounts to \$1,300,000, and \$50,000 monthly support has been promised them.

RAILROAD PRESIDENT EXPECTS TO WIN

DETROIT, July 19.—Assistant President Atwater of the Grand Trunk said today that his road expects to win, as they will have police protection and the militia may be called if necessary. The trainmen refusing to strike will get an 18 per cent increase in their wages. This has been promised them by President Hayes.

STRIKE BREAKERS GREETED WITH CRIES OF SCAB

PORT HURON, July 19.—Cries of "Scabs" greeted the strike-breakers on the Grand Trunk here today. There were no disorders. Sheriff Wagoner refused the Pinkerton's request to swear in a company of Pinkertons to protect the line. Six hundred shopmen are idle.

SHOPMEN ARE LOCKED OUT

BATTLE CREEK, Mich., July 17.—Seven hundred Grand Trunk shopmen have been locked out. They were notified they would not be needed during the strike.

NO FREIGHT TRAINS RUNNING

CHICAGO, July 19.—The Grand Trunk passenger trains were an hour late today. No freight trains are running. It is believed the strike has not affected the American passenger traffic.

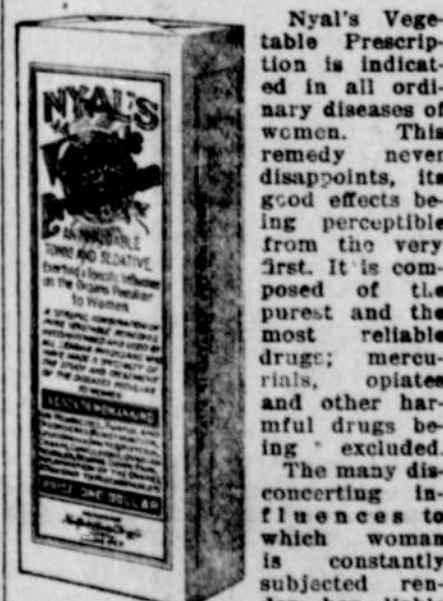
