### GUTHRIE STILL CAPITAL OFFICERS MUST RETURN

State Supreme Court Finds Constitutional Issue Involved Until the Year of 1913

GUTHRIE, Okla., July 30.—Late this afternoon the state supreme court handed down a decision in the capital removal case to the effect that Oklahoma's capital shall remain at Guthrie until the legality of the election recently held is determined and the courts have settled the constitutional question embraced in the provision of the enabling act until 1913, and that an election shall be held after that time to establish a permanent capital.

The decision was rendered on a writ of prohibition on the question

whether Judge Huston, of the Logan county district court, had the right to restrain Governor Haskell and other state officers from moving their offices and records to Oklahoma City.

Under the decision, Judge Huston acted within his rights when he issued the restraining order against the state officers.

In obedience to the decision, all state officials, other than the governor, who have removed their offices to Oklahoma City, must return to Guthrie and stay there until the court has finally decided the capital controversy.

The governor may go where he pleases, but legally his official acts must appear as having been performed in Guthrie.

It is not thought Governor Haskell will return to this city.

### QUICK RUN FROM SHANIKO TO KLAMATH FALLS

Party Leaves That City Friday Morning and Get Here at 1 o'clock the Next Day

The Wenandy-Bunton Auto company brought a party of tourists down from Shaniko in record time last week. The party consisted of W. M. Wilson and wife, Miss Lyons, Misses Annie, Sophia and Louise Stixner, Ed Stixner and F. Brown, and also C. M. Triplett.

J. H. Wenandy and Russ Johnson were the chauffeurs and they hit the high places on their way here. They left Shaniko Friday morning at 7 o'clock and made the 100 miles to Bend by 3 o'clock that afternoon. Leaving Bend the next morning at 4 o'clock they arrived here at 1 o'clock that afternoon, making the 152 miles in nine hours.

The party stayed here until this morning, when they left for Crater lake, where they will stop before returning to Shaniko. They came from California and are making a tour of the interior of this state. Mr. Wilson is interested in land near Powell Butte and has extensive property interests there.

### QUICK TRIP BETWEEN KLAMATH FALLS AND MEDFORD

Lloyd Rippey Makes the Run in Ten Hours—Five Hours Faster Than Previous Record

Lowering all previous records for a trip from Klamath Falls to Medford via Crater lake, Lloyd Rippey, driving a model 16 Buick, arrived in this city Wednesday evening. The run was made in ten hours. Accompanying Mr. Rippey were Mrs. Hoaglan, Miss Grace Hoaglan and Louis Hoaglan. The trip was made without an accident and the car arrived in splendid condition.

It was also driven in five hours from Lakeview to Klamath Falls through the sand.

The run lowers all previous records for the trip by four hours.—Medford Mail-Tribune.

### INDIANS GET DIPLOMAS

F. H. Abbott, Assistant Indian Commissioner, Says Indian School Is in Advance of Others

CHEMAWA, Ore., July 30.—Four young Indian men and four young Indian women were graduated from the Chemawa Indian school today. These were the 30th annual graduating exercises of the school. The baccalaureate sermon was delivered to the class on Sunday by the Rev. Barr E. Lee, of Salem.

These young Indian men and women, in addition to acquiring an academic education, are qualified to go out and earn their own livelihood, three members of the class being proficient blacksmiths and one an engineer. The young women have taken a course in domestic science.

### HIS FIRST WIFE IS NOW HIS OWN STEPDAUGHTER

LOUISVILLE, Ill., August 1.—Henry Krintz having lived to the ripe old age of 75 years yesterday upset all traditions of the comic papers by wedding his mother-in-law, 60 years old, while the thermometer stood 100 degrees in the shade.

His bride, before the wedding, was Mrs. Elizabeth Fuchs, whose daughter divorced Krintz several years ago. Both live in Oskaloosa, Ill. Krintz is a farmer.

### SPANISH CABINET PRE-DICTS CIVIL WAR

Newspapers Insist on Dismissal of Canalejas—King Will Not Comply With Their Demand

MADRID, August 2.—The clerical newspapers are demanding that King Alfonso dismiss Canalejas and the cabinet, predicting that civil war will ensue unless he does so.

They blame Canalejas and upbraid Alfonso for falling under his "baneful influence." Canalejas said: "It is not a question of what a majority of the people wish. It is a matter that rests with the government. The cortes and army are on our side, and it is not likely there will be civil war."

A Carlist movement has begun in the Biscayan provinces, but as yet has not made much headway. King Alfonso is determined to continue in his present course.

### STEAMER LAUNCHED

Monday the new steamer Modoc, which has just been built by Captain Wickstrom, was launched at Buena Vista. It is expected that the new boat will be in commission in about two weeks. It is not to be used for passenger work and will tow freight from the various ports of the Upper lake. There are some 8,000 tons of sand which this boat will probably move from Wood river to be used on the railroad work here.

Captain Wickstrom will also continue to run the Eagle as a freight boat.

### MANY NEGROS ARE KILLED IN TEXAS RIOT

PALESTINE, Texas, August 1.—Slocum and Elkhart are now quiet. The rangers and Austin cavalry and armed citizens are patrolling the district. It is estimated that the negro dead will number from 18 to 40. Of the slain were buried shroud shrd Scores have been fatally wounded. Eighteen of the slain were buried yesterday. It is not known how many whites were killed. The Anderson county grand jury convened this morning to investigate the riot and four whites have been arrested.

### SACRAMENTO, CALIF., DOUBLES IN POPULATION

Gains 15,414 Inhabitants in 10 Years. Increase Is Over 50 Per Cent

WASHINGTON, D. C., August 2.—It was announced today that the census enumeration of Sacramento, Calif., gave a population of 44,696, an increase of 15,414, of 52.6 per cent.

## BALLINGER ASKED TO RESIGN

REPUBLICAN LEADERS REQUEST HIM TO SURRENDER OFFICE

Action Is Contemplated After Committee Reports on the Pinchot Controversy in September

BEVERLY, Mass., August 2.—(Bulletin)—It was learned from the highest sources that Senator Crane, acting on the initiative of the republican leaders, President Taft tacitly acquiescing, conferred with Secretary Ballinger at Indianapolis yesterday, and suggested that Mr. Ballinger resign before October 1st.

Senator Crane recently visited Beverly, and afterwards announced that he was going West "on a mission." Pressure was brought to bear on President Taft to hint to Mr. Ballinger that he ought to retire. The leaders selected Senator Crane as the spokesman, and he secured the tacit acquiescence of President Taft. It is reported that Senator Crane told Mr. Ballinger that he must resign shortly after the investigation committee reports in Minneapolis on September 11th. Mr. Ballinger expects to return to his law practice in Seattle. Mr. Norton refused to confirm or deny the story, saying that in many respects he knew nothing about Senator Crane's mission. It is supposed to mean that Mr. Norton joined with the politicians in their plan to remove Secretary Ballinger.

## REVENUE CUTTER HITS ROCK

GOES ASHORE IN FOG IN BEHRING SEA

Fifty Officers and Men Reach Shore After Thrilling Experience—The Boat Is a Total Loss

WASHINGTON, August 2.—A cable today to the treasury department says that the revenue cutter Perry, with fifty officers and men, struck a reef near Tonki Point, on St. Paul island, in Behring sea, on July 25th, and is a complete loss. The accident happened during a heavy fog, and the swift current swept the boat on the rocks before they could be seen. The Perry was engaged in patrolling the sealing islands. After a thrilling experience the crew reached shore safely.

### REPORTED LOSS OF VESSEL IS CONFIRMED

### TEMPERATURE FOR THE MONTH OF JULY

Highest and Lowest Degrees of Heat as Recorded by the Government

The temperature of the different days is probably followed as closely by the average individual as any one feature of news. The table published in this number of the Herald gives the maximum and minimum record for the month of July, and many are probably curious to know how the extremes of temperature are recorded.

At the reclamation office in this city is a small wooden box with lattice work sides so arranged that the air can circulate freely through the enclosure but the sun's rays cannot penetrate to the interior. In this box are hung two thermometers differing in many respects from the ordinary instrument. The mercury in the common thermometer rises and falls with the change in the temperature. The thermometers in this lattice work box, however, change in only one direction. One of them falls as the temperature gets cooler, and remains at the lowest point registered until it is taken out by the man who keeps the record of the temperature and the matter in the registering tube is shaken back to its normal position at the top of the instrument. In the other thermometer the substance which is in the instrument is only affected by the heated atmosphere, and as the weather gets hotter it rises, but as the temperature cools the substance does not fall, but remains at the highest position reached during the day, until the operator readjusts the instrument, which is done

every time the record is taken, the reading being made at 5 o'clock each afternoon.

In this way the highest and the lowest temperature is recorded, but in case one wished to ascertain the temperature at any given time he would have to consult one of the ordinary thermometers, in which the mercury rises and falls as the temperature varies.

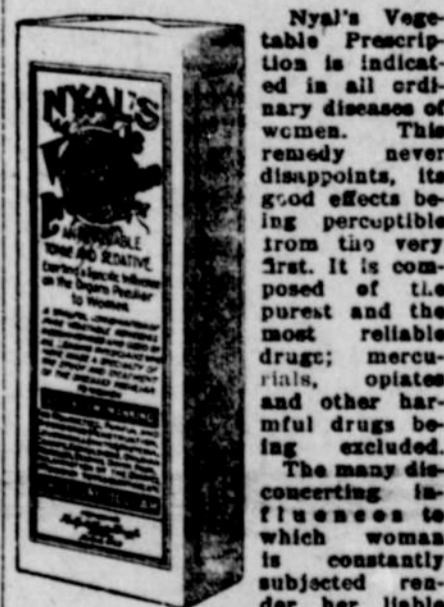
