

WAS HEADED FOR BRITISH COLUMBIA

POSTOFFICE INSPECTORS TAKE HIM INTO CUSTODY

Will Return to San Francisco Without Making a Fight Against Extradition

PORTLAND, Aug. 19.—Geo. L. Price, promoter of alleged swindling telephone schemes in South America and the Pacific Coast, is under arrest here today, awaiting the arrival from San Francisco of Detective Lord, who will take him to that city to face charges of obtaining money through the issuing of fictitious checks. Price was captured by postoffice inspectors. He has been in custody twice before, but escaped both times. The first time he eluded the officer while he was being taken from Klamath Falls to San Francisco; the last was while under arrest in Grants Pass on the 15th. Price stated today that he was willing to return to San Francisco without putting the authorities to the trouble of securing extradition papers.

George L. Price is no longer free, thanks to the vigilance and acumen of the Portland police. This time he was not accorded any privileges, and as a result he was safely landed in the city jail. The arrest of Price in Portland is the outgrowth of the determination of the local officers to land him in jail, following the rumormongering in the grand jury. As soon as the investigation was undertaken by the grand jury steps were taken to insure Price's return to San Francisco, and the outcome thereof is his arrest in Portland.

Ever since Price's return to this city, with the exception of a few days during which he was employed as a carpenter on a residence in the Mills after the investigation was started he addition, he was living comfortably a short distance from the courthouse. He decided that it was about time for him to move and on Tuesday, August 24, he started for Ashland. He left the city about noon, and in plain sight of men who were watching his movements. After proceeding toward Keno a considerable distance, he alighted, dismissed the driver, and proceeded on his way afoot. He reached Ashland in good time, and remained there nearly ten days, picking fruit in the orchards at that place. When this employment was finished he started for Portland as a chauffeur, and reached Grants Pass in time to be taken in by the chief of police of that city. His arrest was made at the request of the chief of police of Ashland, who was acting on behalf of Chief Townsend of this city.

A letter from Price received in this city last evening gives the particulars of his arrest at Grants Pass. He was taken into custody Monday afternoon at 3 o'clock. While the officer who made the arrest was engaged in telephoning to Ashland, advising the officers of that city that he had captured Price, that gentleman slipped out the back door and ran for the timber. He hid in a ditch until 10 p. m., when he started for the railroad by a circuitous route. Wednesday morning he boarded the northbound train. About twenty miles north of Grants Pass a deputy boarded the train looking for him but the officer failed to recognize the fugitive, and he continued on his way until within five miles of Roseburg, when he alighted and walked through that city. He did this for fear that the Roseburg officers might search the train. He further stated in his letter that he intended to avoid the big cities for a few days, when he would light out for Vancouver, British Columbia. He evidently went to the postoffice in Portland looking for mail, when he was taken into custody by the postoffice inspectors.

There is still hanging over him in this county the charge of selling lottery tickets. On this he was bound over to await the action of the grand jury.

SAYS JAPANESE IN UNITED STATES ARE DECREASING

A statement has been prepared by Matsuo Nagai, acting consul general of Japan in San Francisco, showing for the last two and a half years Japanese have been returning from the United States to their own country in greater numbers than they have been coming.

According to the statement in 1908 the departures from Japan for the United States numbered 3,326, and the arrivals in Japan from the United States 5,943, making an excess of 1,667 returning. For 1909 the figures given are 1,913 departures from Japan and 4,539 arrivals in that coun-

try from the United States, making an excess of 2,626 returning. For the first six months of 1910 there are shown 1,371 departures from Japan and 1,807 arrivals from the United States, an excess of 436 returning.

MRS. PROSSER FOUND NOT GUILTY OF MURDER

Shot Her Husband in the Compartment of a Pullman Car on the Northern Pacific

LIBBY, Mont., Aug. 19.—Mrs. Vera Prosser, charged with murder after she had shot her husband in a compartment on a Northern Pacific train a few weeks ago was found not guilty by a jury today.

The case went to the jury at 5 o'clock last night. The woman is broken in health and is in a pitiable condition. She pleaded insanity, and was acquitted on the grounds of self-defense.

FINDS DIAMONDS AND RUBIES AMONG THE OLD RAGS

NEWARK, N. J., August 22.—Herbert Streuble finds the job of rag sorter at a paper mill at Whippany, N. J., a most remunerative position. His wages are only \$6 a week, but during the past week he has cleared \$1,800 from valuables which he found concealed among the old rags and waste which passed under his rake. Five days ago he picked up an old stocking which contained two diamonds worth \$500 each. Yesterday he came upon a large sapphire and a ruby tied up in a handkerchief.

U. S. CENSUS ESTIMATE REACHES 93,600,000

NEW YORK, August 19.—A Columbia University statistician has been comparing the census figures this far announced at Washington with those of the previous enumeration. He figures that the average gain thus far shown is 29.7 per cent. If a similar percentage applies to the rest of the country, the net gain for the whole country will be about 17,300,000, making the total population of the continental United States over 93,600,000.

PRESIDENT MCKINLEY'S ESTATE IS AWARDED

CANTON, Ohio, August 19.—By a court decision recently Mrs. M. C. Barber, sister of the late widow of President McKinley, was given title to one-half of the property known as the McKinley block in Canton, valued at \$45,000. James McKinley, a nephew of President McKinley, and other heirs-at-law of the late executive brought suit to get possession of the property, but the court held that the title of Mrs. Barber is valid, and that the property belonged to her.

BELIEVES LA FOLLETTE WILL BE RENOMINATED

SALINAS, Kans., August 19.—Senator Briatow recently returned from Wisconsin and predicted Senator La Follette's re-election. He said: "I do not believe he will be beaten, and I believe he will be renominated by a majority of from 50,000 to 75,000."

ROOSEVELT WILL NOT BE CONTROLLED IN SPEECHES

NEW YORK, August 19.—Colonel Roosevelt arrived here today and told the reporters that on his Western trip his speeches would not be under the auspices of the republican congressional committee.

JUDGE GEO. NOLAND IS SUSTAINED

PAYS THE PENALTY FOR MURDER OF WALTER NEWELL

Stay of Execution Asked by Murderer's Attorney Is Denied by the Supreme Court

The stay of execution of the sentence of death imposed on Ike Harrell has been denied by the supreme court. An opinion sustaining Judge Noland was received by him Thursday to that effect.

On the 9th of June Harrell shot in cold blood Walter and Herbert Newell two young sheep men of Lake county. Harrell had been working for the two boys, one of whom was 22 years old and the other 24, and they discharged him because he had become careless in handling the herd of sheep. As Herbert was writing a check for the amount due Harrell the latter struck him with a heavy pistol. Walter saw the act, and running to his brother's aid Harrell shot him through the heart, killing him instantly. He then shot Herbert through the shoulder, the shock of the bullet felling the boy to the ground. Harrell supposed that he had killed Herbert, and walked away. Herbert revived and crawled to his tent, where he wrote a note, telling of the horrible crime.

Harrell came to the tent, and seeing Herbert lying down inside, he blew the top of his head off with a high-power rifle. He then made his escape.

Harrell was caught some time later by a posse and locked in the Lake county jail at Lakeview. He confessed to the crime, giving as his reason that the boys "bothered" him.

Judge Noland and District Attorney Kuykendall went to Lakeview to try the case, and on July 9th, after hearing the evidence and giving Harrell a chance to plead, Judge Noland found the crime to have been murder in the first degree, and sentenced Harrell to death, the sentence to be executed on September 9th.

Harrell was taken to the penitentiary at Salem, where he now is awaiting the day of execution.

His attorney, Thomas S. Farrell, took an appeal from the judgment and asked for a stay of execution. The contention in the appeal was that when the court adjourned the term was ended, and therefore the court did not have jurisdiction. In deciding that part of the appeal the supreme court said:

"Terms of the circuit court for Lake county are required to be held commencing on the second Monday in May and the third Monday in October of each year. B. & C. Comp. sec. 2492 as amended. Laws Ore. 1905, p. 262. That the suspension of the May term, 1910, was not intended to be final by the adjournment on the 12th of that month is apparent from the court's direction to the jury, to return promptly when notified, and by retaining the grand jury who were expected the report of a physician employed to make a post mortem examination in order to learn the cause of the death of a person."

Further on the opinion says: "The order of adjournment was equivalent to a direction to the clerk that the term should be unclosed, subject to resuming business when commanded by the court, due notice of which was required to be given."

The supreme court therefore held that the court was in session and that Judge Noland had jurisdiction.

Referring to the stay of execution asked for and which was denied, the court said in the opinion:

"In the case at bar, however, it must not be forgotten that the defendant entered a plea of guilty to an indictment charging that he purposely and of deliberate and premeditated malice killed Walter Newell by shooting him with a pistol, and that after taking evidence to ascertain the character of the offense the court determined the crime to have been murder in the first degree, and gave judgment accordingly."

The court decided that there was no grounds for an appeal and the stay of execution was denied. Harrell will pay the penalty of his brutal murder of Walter Newell on the gallows on the 9th of next month.

Young People's Societies Have Splendid Trip on Steamer Winema—Beautiful Evening

Thursday night the young people's societies of various churches joined in an excursion and took a ride around the Upper lake on the steamer Winema. They went over to Rattlesnake Point and then rode across to Eagle Ridge, arriving at the dock on their way home about 12 o'clock. The moon was shining clear, and everybody had a splendid time. There were about fifty on board, and not a one but was willing to repeat the trip at any time.

PHYSICIANS WOULD GIVE LIBERALLY

SOME EFFORT SHOULD BE MADE TO HAVE ONE ESTABLISHED

They Recognize the Necessity and Are Doing What They Can to Have One Opened

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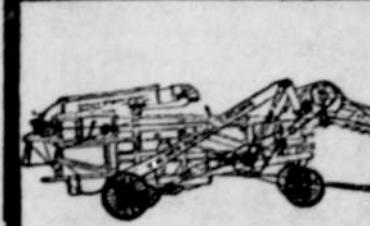
