TELEPHONE OFFICIAL TAKES LIFE WHILE INTOXICATED

Crawls Through the Skylight and Throws Himself to the Pavement. Leaves a Wife and Child

# BANDITS HOLD UP STREETCAR

COMMIT DARING ACT IN SAN FRANCISCO

Robbers Secure \$150 From the Victim and Beat Them Until Unconscious When They Resist.

SAN FRANCISCO, August 29.—Three men, masked and armed, held up Motorman B. C. Reimer, conductor of A. B. West and F. Van Horn, H. Daley and John Coleman, passengers on the street car, at 3:30 this morning, and secured \$150 from them. Reimer resisted the robbers and was severely beaten. The others then resisted and were also beaten until they were unconscious. The robbery occurred on Mission road near the outskirts of the city. There is no clue to the robbers.

# EDISON SHOWS MOTION PICTURES THAT TALK

NEW YORK August 29.—A successful exhibition of "talking moving pictures" was given last night by Thomas A. Edison in his laboratory at Orange, New Jersey.

The enunciation of the "performers" was natural and clear, and agreed with every movement of the screen actors. A motor horn was squeaked, a ball was dropped, and other noises duplicated perfectly.

Edison's latest wonder consists of two instruments, one phonographic, and the other photographic. Both machines are "locked" together, making their action simultaneous.

The invention was shown to good advantage when a ballet girl was thrown on the screen. The accompanying music was rendered as though coming from an orchestra just below the toes of the dancer.

Mr. Edison said that he will need another year to make the invention absolutely correct. He expects to so improve the mechanism as to give grand opera as on the stage.

# HUNDRED THOUSAND VISITORS THERE

STREETS OF COLORADO'S CAPITAL ARE THROGGED

Guest of Honor at a Chuck Wagon Dinner—Food Prepared in Genuine Cow Camp Style

DENVER, August 29.—Colonel Roosevelt arrived at 11 o'clock this morning. The streets were jammed with a noisy crowd. It is estimated that there are 100,000 visitors here.

The presidential salute of twenty-one guns announced Colonel Roosevelt's arrival in Denver, and he was met by Governor Shafroth, Mayor Speer and committees representing the Spanish-American war veterans, Indian Fighters' association and civic organizations.

At noon the Press club escorted him to Overland Park, where he was the guest of honor at a "chuck wagon" dinner. There were real chuck wagons from an old cow camp, and cooks prepared the viands according to true roundup style.

At 2 o'clock he addressed 15,000 persons in the auditorium at a convention of the Livestock association; at 4 o'clock he addressed a special session of the legislature briefly in the house chamber; at 5 o'clock he returned to the auditorium and addressed the Spanish war veterans. Tonight he will be the guest of honor at the Livestock association banquet.

Before the Livestock convention Colonel Roosevelt delivered the longest address he has made on this journey. He talked of the conservation policies, and said that they did not mean to prevent the natural rights of man to natural resources, but that they were acting for the general welfare of the public as a whole. He said there were many cases where only federal authority would preserve the rights of the people.

# BELIEVE UNITED STATES AND JAPAN WILL FIGHT

Koreans See Impending Conflict Between the Two Nations Within Five Years

NEW YORK, August 29.—The belief is general in Korea that the United States will be drawn into war with Japan within the next five years, according to Dr. S. H. Kimin, formerly an attache of the Korean delegation at Washington, and now representative in this country of Korean "insurgents" who are waging a guerrilla warfare in Korea against Japan annexation.

"The patriotic uprising in Korea," says Dr. Kimin, in a statement issued from his office here, "is kept alive largely by the conviction that in the near future Japan will find herself with a more powerful enemy on her hands when Korea can regain her 4243 year old independence and throw off the yoke of annexation."

"It is probably not generally known that Korea is making a bitter struggle against the Japanese plans of annexation. The true state of affairs is kept concealed largely by the strict Japanese censorship over the telegraph and mails. It is impossible to get a letter from Korea that hasn't been opened and duly censored. We are compelled to rely for our advice upon letters carried by spies and members of the revolutionary party or messages transmitted by runners by word of mouth to the watchers outside the frontier.

"As a matter of fact, the 20,000,000 of Korean people are resting under the yoke and it will take but a spark to set them off into a war of liberation. We believe that spark will be struck when the United States and Japan engage in war and that the war will come within the next five years."

# STEAMER KLAMATH BREAKS BLADE OF PROPELLER

Has to Have Other Blade Broken Off Before the Boat Can Make Much Speed

The steamer Klamath had the misfortune to come in contact with the bank while on its trip on the Upper lake Sunday, and in doing so broke one of the blades of the propeller. The steamer finally got back to Shipplington, but before it left on its trip on Monday Mr. Doty was called and broke off the opposite blade to the one which had been lost on Sunday. The steamer did not leave her dock until this was done, as it was impossible to make much headway with one blade of the propeller gone.

# LIQUOR MEN ARE RELEASED

REED AND SHAW ARE NOW FREE FROM JAIL

Serve Their Sentences of Twenty-five Days and Pay Their Fines of \$350 and \$300

Carl L. Reed and Gideon T. Shaw, who pleaded guilty to selling intoxicating liquor, and were sentenced to twenty-five days in jail and a fine of \$350 and \$300 respectively, finished their time in jail and were released last Saturday. They also paid their fines, and are now free men again.

They are subject, however, to punishment on the remaining three counts in case they ever violate the law again.

# DR. CRIPPEN IS ARRAIGNED

HE AND LENEVE CHARGED WITH MURDER

The Girl is Also Charged With Assisting a Fugitive From Justice. Will Plead September 1st

LONDON, August 29.—Dr. Hawley H. Crippen and Miss Ethel Leneve had their hearing before Magistrate Marshall this morning, and were formally charged with murder and an additional charge of "assisting in maintaining and harboring" a fugitive from justice was made against Miss Leneve. Both of the prisoners were cheerful. After a formal presentation of the evidence the prisoners were remanded to jail until September 6th, when they will be asked to plead. Thousands of persons outside the building attempted to rush the guards surrounding the prisoners.
