MEDFORD AND ASHLAND VISITORS MORE THAN PLEASED

THEY JOURNEY TO WILLIAMSON RIVER

Excursion Given by the Knights of Pythias to Visiting Members of Order Was a Success

A part of the entertainment provided by the members of Klamath Lodge No. 99 Knights of Pythias, for the visiting Knights and Pythian Sisters from Medford and Ashland, who arrived here Sunday night to attend the district convention of that order, was an excursion on Upper Klamath lake to the shore near Williamson river Monday.

The Klamath left the dock about 9 o'clock, and after skirting the shore of the lake stopped for a few moments at Eagle Ridge. From there the steamer with its load of merry Pythians and their wives and daughters, sailed across the lake to the shore near the mouth of Williamson river, where a substantial lunch of hot roast beef, beans, potato salad and bread and butter and coffee was served, and to which all did ample justice.

COL. E. HOFER SPEAKS HERE

ADDRESSES QUITE A CROWD NEAR POSTOFFICE

Outlines His Reasons Why He Should Be Elected and Asks Voters For Their Support

He stated that he was opposed to the state-wide prohibition amendment and also to the assembly. He was in favor of State-ment No. 1, and that one of the first things he would do if elected would be to get a law giving the state power to construct good highways.

SURVEY RUNS NEAR THE BAY SHORE

HILL'S ENGINEERS WORKING IN HARRIMAN TERRITORY

Surveyors Are Working on Pacific & Eastern Right of Way in This County

PORTLAND, Sept. 1.—James J. Hill's surveyors are staking a line through Pelican Lodge, the estate of the late E. H. Harriman, for the right of way of the Pacific & Eastern railroad tracks. This forcibly brings out the fact that Hill is invading the Harriman territory. The surveyors assert that they could not avoid cutting across the estate.

The line runs between the Lodge and Pelican bay, and skirts the base of the mountain.

The Oregon Trunk surveyors are working from the Medford side of the range to Upper Klamath lake, and their camps are located on Williamson and Sprague rivers, and a line has been run across the straits connecting Agency and Upper lake.

While the engineers themselves will not tell what is being done, the work so far accomplished is of such a nature as to leave no doubt of its permanence.

SECURE LIMIT BAG OF GAME GETS NOMINATION BY FRAUD

PARTY RETURNS WITH BOAT LOADED WITH BIRDS

Shoot Two Hundred and Ten Ducks and Thirteen Geese—Could Have Got Many More

A party of Klamath Falls hunters, consisting of G. Heitkemper Jr., Judge A. D. Miller, A. Hardenbrook, James Hansbrough, J. A. Houston and H. E. Crane, went down the Klamath river in Mr. Heitkemper's launch Thursday and returned Friday with the limit for each of the hunters. The launch was loaded to the water line with 210 ducks and 13 geese, and the hunters could have shot many more if they had cared to.

The limit bag of ducks is thirty-five for any one week, and the party will not hunt any more this week, as they got the limit in the two days' shooting.

FACTS WERE DELIBERATELY PERVERTED

ROOSEVELT DECLARES STATEMENTS FALSE

Never Received Money From Harriman for Any Purpose—The Post Replies

NEW YORK, Sept. 1.—Today's Outlook contains Colonel Roosevelt's reply to the Evening Post's editorial in its recent attack on him and says: "In the struggle for honest politics there is no more place for a liar than a thief. In the movement it is designed to end the thief's domination. Little good would be derived from his assistance. If an objection is made to my use of this language the answer is I used it merely scientifically and descriptively, because no other terms would express the facts with the necessary precision. In the article which the Evening Post defends those politicians in the republican party in New York whom it affected, whoever wrote the article in question knew this. The statements in the Post were not only false, but malicious, not only a direct contradiction of the facts, but were such that could only have been made by a man who, knowing the facts, deliberately intends to pervert them. Such an act I have opposed in the past. The Post, through whatever editor who personally wrote the article, practiced every known form of mendacity. So far as I am concerned, every man who visited the White House did so openly, E. H. Harriman and others included. I took no money from Mr. Harriman, either secretly or openly, to buy votes with or for any other purpose."

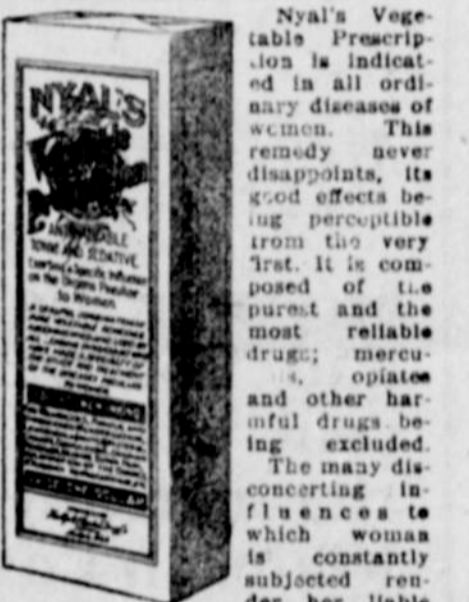
