## WHAT HE HAS DONE FOR THIS CITY

A Plain Statement That Should Be Fairly Considered by Friend and Foe

It is only fair to give every man his just due, and that is all that W. S. Worden asks from his fellow citizens. Ever since he became a resident of Klamath Falls he has been found in the front ranks working for the welfare of the city, and on every hand are to be found evidences of the success that has met his efforts. What he has done for this city is great enough to at least merit the thanks of the people. He is now a candidate for the republican nomination for county judge. In this he should have and is entitled to the support of every voter in Klamath Falls.

It was through Mr. Worden's efforts that the California Northeastern railroad was started. For twenty-five years or more efforts had been made to bring a railroad to this city, but it remained for the indefatigable energy of this young man to break through the cordon of prejudice that capital had, and secure sufficient funds to start the work. As this progressed he realized that if the Southern Pacific could be interested in the project and extend the road north so as to make it the main line it would prove of inestimable benefit to this county. He went to work on this, and the result of his efforts can be seen today. When the question of the erection of a depot was under discussion he quietly went to work and succeeded in getting the magnificent structure that greets the visitor to this city.

It was through his urging that the work of securing the rights of way for the Modoc Northern was started. It was through his effort that a wide detour was taken and Merrill was placed on the railroad map. It was he who pleaded the cause of Klamath Falls before the powers that be, and caused a new survey to be run making Klamath Falls the terminus of the Modoc Northern instead of Midland.

It is for this that he is being accused of being a corporation tool; it is for this that the charges of corporation control are being made against him. Give him a square deal. Even though you are opposed to his election, state the reason honestly and fairly. There is hardly a man who would be opposed to Mr. Worden if the courthouse question were eliminated from the campaign. There is not a man who will not tell you that Mr. Worden is thoroughly honest. Every man will tell you that he is thoroughly fitted for the place. The only argument so far advanced is the one of "railroad influence." Let it be a fair campaign and not one of lies. Mr. Worden has done too much for Klamath Falls to be the victim of so much ingratitude.

Aside from the work he has done in railroad lines Mr. Worden has been the means of bringing to this city thousands of dollars' worth of other capital. At no time in his career can he be accused of pulling back. He is in a better position today to help Klamath Falls and Klamath county than ever before. He is the logical man for the nomination. He is the best fitted man before the voters. Purely business reasons should compel his support, and the Herald believes that when sober thought is given to the matter there will be very little, if any, opposition, either to his nomination or election.

## CLAIM TAFT IS THE REAL LEADER

His Friends Say That Roosevelt's Seeking Meeting Shows He Realizes Executive's Power

## LEE IS SILENT AS THE TOMB

THE CAPTAIN TOO BUSY ROUNDING UP COUNTRY VOTERS

His Silence Is Causing His Friends in This City Some Uncomfortable Moments

Where is Captain J. P. Lee? And why has he failed to answer the questions propounded to him by Mr. Taxpayer? These are two questions that is beginning to cause his friends in this city some uneasiness. The letter from Mr. Taxpayer, published in these columns a few days ago, contained some very pointed questions—questions that should be answered if the Captain wishes to satisfy the curiosity of the voters of the county. This paper will gladly publish anything he has to say, and places no restrictions on him. If he is going to answer those questions he should do so in time to give Mr. Taxpayer another chance before the primaries. Both sides of the issue should be heard.

One question asked by Mr. Taxpayer was whether Captain Lee would resign his office as assessor in case he was elected county judge. It has not occurred to the people generally that Mr. Lee could hold both offices under the law; and that if he did so he would thus constitute two-thirds of the board of equalization. The Herald does not claim that the Captain would fail to give everyone a square deal, but if his judgment was in error he should not be so situated as to enforce his decisions. The board of equalization should have a full membership and no two offices should be held by one man.

The Captain has been making a strong campaign, but he has not been making the headway his supporters believed he would make. It is admitted that he is one of the best campaigners in the county, but this time he hurt himself seriously because of the fact that he already holds an office. If he were running for reelection or out of office he would defeat Sanderson easily. But the democrats seem to feel that they want to try out some new timber, and the indications now are that Sanderson will have a good-sized majority over the old warhorse.

OUTNUMBER DEMOCRATS MORE THAN TWO TO ONE

Ballots Are Printed and Everything Is Ready for the Primaries Next Saturday

Deputy County Clerk Charles De Lap was busy Thursday, Friday and Saturday of last week, classifying the registered electors of this county according to their political beliefs as expressed by themselves when they registered and according to the statements made by the voters registered the republicans outnumber the democrats more than two to one. The total number of voters registered was 1,553, divided as follows: Republicans 988, democrats 414, socialists 73, independent 50, prohibition 8, no party 8, refusing to state their political beliefs 13.

At the end of each week the county clerk has had to send to the secretary of state the names and addresses of the voters registered that week, and at the close of the period of registration he must classify all of the voters according to their political beliefs and send that statement also to the secretary of state. It was a tedious and particular piece of work to classify all of the voters, and the county clerk's office force was glad when the job was out of the way.

Everything is in readiness now for the primary elections next Saturday, and the contest for the nomination for the different offices promises to be a keen one.

In Snow precinct, in the vicinity of Pokegama, there were no registrations owing to the fact that there was no notary public or justice of the peace before whom the voters could register.

## CHILD DASHED FROM FAST TRAIN ESCAPES INJURY

PORTLAND, Sept. 19.—The 4-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. H. C. Mills of Pittsburg, Kans., fell from the vestibule of an eastbound Oregon Shortline train near Caldwell and escaped injury.

With her parents she was going from the diner when a lurch of the car threw her from the open vestibule. A speeder was sent back from Caldwell and the child was found and placed on the speeder. On the way back the speeder collided heavily with a handcar carrying the parents. The two men on the speeder were seriously injured and are now in a hospital, while the little girl for the second time within the hour escaped unhurt.

## Attacks Candidate for Judge
