The newspapers haven't mentioned it, but it is a fact, that the socialist party have nominated for congress a former resident of Klamath county, Mr. Charles W. Sherman, Jr., now a resident of Jackson county, and he will probably receive the full vote of his party at the November election.

Hank O'Brien has been busy for some weeks assembling the materials for enclosing his barn, and also for a flume and a gasoline engine, with which he expects to irrigate a large portion of his farm. He intends to build a reservoir near Buck Creek, fill it from the waters of that stream when they come down in the spring, and at the proper time pump this water into the flume, thus carrying it into ditches at the further side of his place and thus irrigate the land. It's a good scheme if the water does not seep out before it is needed.
