THREE HUNDRED LIVES LOST

MANY CHARRED BODIES TO BE BURIED

Estimated Loss Is Ten Million Dollars and Five Hundred Miles of Timber Destroyed

WARROAD, Minn., Oct. 11.—A private message to the Minnesota International railroad says that 300 forest fire bodies must be cared for at Rainy River, and that the village is packed with refugees. Ragley and Clearbrook are threatened. Today's estimate of the loss is \$10,000,000 and 500 miles of timber burned. Thousands of settlers are rendered homeless.
