WORDEN AND THE SOUTHERN PACIFIC

Much has been said about W. S. Worden and the Southern Pacific, and the handing over of the county to the control of that corporation. The Republican is no more desirous of having Klamath county in the clutch of the Southern Pacific than the most enthusiastic anti-corporation advocate. Wherever any railroad, Southern Pacific, Great Northern, Rio Grande, Pennsylvania or any other, has secured a grip on the affairs of a community, there has been only one result—absolute despotism. The same would be true here if the Southern Pacific could have it that way. The Republican, however, believes that under present conditions it is absolutely impossible for any railroad or other corporation to get the upper hand. In the first place W. S. Worden is powerless to help them as county judge. To be perfectly fair, you must ask yourself the question: "What can Mr. Worden do to help the railroad?" Then answer it fairly. You will, we think, find that he can do absolutely nothing.

But supposing he could help them; supposing he could deliver this county over to that corporation. Have we not the recall—the weapon that removes all obstacles to the will of the people? In the matter of laws have we not the initiative and referendum? These measures make it impossible for any corporation to get the upper hand in city, county or state affairs. These are facts that the people will have to consider when they are disabed up a lot of stuff about Worden giving the county to the Southern Pacific.

There is a reason for this great noise about railroad control. It is done for the purpose of turning the mind of the people away from that which they so much desire—the acceptance of the free courthouse site. Those who are crying railroad control would have you think of nothing else but the railroad. In the hopes you would forget that a site worth \$90,000 and perpetual heat for the new courthouse have been offered to the county absolutely free of charge. Worden is pledged absolutely to the acceptance of that site. Captain Lee is pledged equally as strong against it. To use his own words, "I would see the shingles rot on the old courthouse before I would accept the site."

That is the reason, Mr. Voter, that the cry of Southern Pacific is raised. Anything to kill off talk about the courthouse. The Republican does not believe that the voters of this county are so blind that they cannot see the nigger in the woodpile. They realize that Mr. Worden's election means a square deal; they realize that Mr. Lee's election means a continuation of the power of the men who practically ruined this county.

POLITICIANS TRADING ON THE COURTHOUSE QUESTION

Are the voters of this county to be euchered out of a courthouse site that means to them a saving of \$90,000, as well as perpetual heat for the new courthouse, free of cost. That is a question that must be considered by the people of this county during the next three weeks. Every effort has been put forth to smother this issue, for the sole reason that the people wanted it. Trades have been made, and the powers that be have gotten together and schemed to keep the matter of the courthouse out of the campaign. Every pressure possible has been brought to bear on this paper to have it drop the matter, but that was a waste of time. The Republican is simply demanding that the people get a square deal, and it is going to fight for that if it has to oppose the whole Republican ticket to get it.

So far as this paper is concerned, it is not going to respect party lines when it comes to a question of party or the rights of the people. It will support such candidates as it believes will best promote the interests of the majority. During the past week there has been a scheme on foot to trade votes—an old political trick—the purpose being to bring about the election of Captain Lee. The persons interested in this trade care not so much for Captain Lee as they do to defeat W. S. Worden, for they realize that his election means the free site will be accepted and the new courthouse erected thereon. The Republican wishes to advise the politicians that it will respect no deal of any kind whatever that has for its purpose a trading away of the rights

of the people. They want that site and they are going to have it.

WILL R. KING, JUDGE OF THE SUPREME COURT

Candidate for Re-Election, Six Year Term, Whose Place is Sought by Geo. H. Burnett, Assembly Nominee

Judge Will R. King has been a resident of Eastern Oregon for nearly forty years. He moved to Malheur county from Umatilla county in the spring of 1878 and, with the exception of six years, when he was located at Baker City, has been a resident of Malheur. After graduating from a law school in the East he entered the practice of law in Vale, in June, 1892. He was at that time elected to the legislature, and served six years, two in the house and four in the senate, during which time he secured the passage of many bills of especial benefit to Eastern Oregon.

Judge King was author of the Irriga-

tion District law. His decisions during the four years he has been on the Supreme Bench are classed by the bar with those of the most eminent justices. His decisions upon irrigation law are recognized as leading cases upon that branch of the law. His familiarity with and knowledge of all the conditions of Eastern Oregon make it extremely important that he be retained upon the bench and not be replaced by a man from the Western part of the state, who knows little, if anything, of our needs.

Judge King is supported by the bar throughout the state with few exceptions. To say nothing of the special reasons why he, as an Eastern Oregon man, should be retained, the platform urged in his support by the non-political judiciary movement, started by the Oregon Bar association, that "Merit and not politics should govern in the selection of judges," is sufficient grounds for his re-election. See on this subject pages 21 to 24 of pamphlet to be issued and sent by the secretary of state to all the voters. In the election of judges politics ought to be disregarded and the selection made upon the ground of merit only.

Jury lists are chosen without regard to party and there is no more reason for inquiring into the politics of a judge. There is no good reason why "good judges should be put off the bench on account of politics and other judges put on the bench in their stead on account of politics.

The judicial office is the last place that should be used for the purpose of party rewards.

The political opinions of a lawyer do not form one of his qualifications for the bench.

Judges King, Slater, McBride and Moore, all present members of the supreme court, are running upon the principle that political opinions do not relate to judicial duties.

Geo. H. Burnett and Henry J. Bean are seeking places on the supreme bench upon the opposite principles.—Paid Adv.

DAIRYING THE GREAT INDUSTRY

KLAMATH COUNTY ESPECIALLY SUITED FOR IT

HOGS ALSO SHOULD BE RAISED

Experts From the Great Northern Railroad Pleased With the Possibilities Here

"The Klamath country is especially suited to dairying and the raising of swine," said Thomas Shaw, the agricultural expert of the Great Northern railroad, who is making a tour of the state in the interests of the Hill roads, investigating the agricultural possibilities of the regions to be traversed by that system. He and his son, William T. Shaw, who is a professor in the Washington agricultural college at Pullman, Wash., arrived Tuesday from a trip across the state from Idaho, and investigated the agricultural resources of the Klamath country.

"I understand that you have over 100,000 acres of land tributary to this city that is capable of irrigation, besides a much larger area that can be cultivated but not irrigated. That is an enormous area, and from what I have seen of it it is capable of producing abundant crops. This portion of the state is especially suited to dairying, and I believe that if all the irrigable land is utilized for dairying and the raising of hogs that more money will be realized in that way than in any other. I believe that by following those lines the irrigated land will easily pay good interest on \$100 an acre.

"On the dry land I believe that thirty bushels of wheat could easily be grown to the acre if winter wheat is sown. Turkey Red seems to me to be the best variety. To have success with winter wheat and rye the land must be summer fallowed and the seed sown early enough to have it get a good start before the snow falls.

"This may possibly be a good fruit country," said Mr. Shaw, "but that remains to be demonstrated. I would, however, recommend that the attention of the farmers of the irrigated land be directed to dairying and the raising of hogs, as this country is especially suited to those industries, and there is always money in both of those."

"The land that is not under irrigation could easily be made to produce abundant crops if dry farming methods were used, and this part of the state is also especially favored in that respect, for there is more rainfall here than in some other localities."

Mr. Shaw had the supervision of forty-five six-acre experiment farms in Montana along the line of the Great Northern road, and as Mr. Hill is greatly interested in the increasing of the productiveness of the farms in the territory tributary to his roads he could probably be induced to establish similar farms in this state if the requisite interest were shown by the residents of the communities where it is desired that the farms be located.

The visit of Mr. Shaw to this part of the state and the trip that Louis W. Hill and the other great Northern officials have made in the past few months lead to the belief that the Oregon Trunk line will be constructed through this territory at a no late date, and that the great railroad builder recognizes that the Klamath country is rich in prospects for future development.

That the Hill road will come to Klamath Falls, and that soon, is more than a probability.
