

DISPATCH TRAINS BY TELEPHONE

THE TELEGRAPH OPERATOR IS BEING SUPPLANTED

LINE BETWEEN HERE AND WEED

Circuit Covers 206 Miles and Extends From Ashland to Red Bluff—Dispatcher at Dunsuir

NEW YORK, Nov. 12.—Supplanting the telegraph, which was considered the standard for handling train movements for a great many years, the Southern Pacific has joined the ranks of railroads now using the telephone for dispatching trains. Telephone apparatus is now in operation over the Shasta Division, with a total of 291 miles of circuits. Copper wire of extreme weight and especially drawn for service in a mountainous region is being used.

The telephonic circuit during sixteen hours out of the twenty-four is cut into two sections, and during the third "trick" the entire circuit is operated by one dispatcher. This circuit covers a 206 mile section of the main line between Ashland, Ore., and Red Bluff, Calif., and a branch from Weed, Calif., to Klamath Falls, Ore. The dispatcher is located at Dunsuir, Calif., which is 98 miles from Red Bluff, the southern terminal of this circuit. There are twenty-five stations on the entire circuit, twelve being located between Dunsuir and Red Bluff, nine between Dunsuir and Ashland, and four between Weed and Klamath Falls.

Passenger and freight trains on the Southern Pacific are equipped with portable telephone sets, enabling the train men to get in touch with the dispatcher from any point along the road.

THE POSTAL SAVINGS FUNDS

THE PLACE OF THEIR DEPOSIT WORRYING TRUSTEES

Bankers Are Anxious That the Standard of Solvency Be Determined on Impartial Basis

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 12.—While the locations of the first postal savings banks, one in each state and territory, have been chosen, and it is probable that the banks will be opened at the beginning of 1911, much work remains to be done in the development of the system, according to one of the trustees.

A problem that is taxing the trustees, and the solution of which is awaited with great interest by bankers, concerns the deposit of postal funds in banks. The law provides that 65 per cent of the funds "shall be deposited in solvent banks, whether organized under national or state laws, being subject to national or state supervision and examinations." The word "banks" includes savings banks and trust companies.

The solvency of national banks will probably be determined by the comptroller of the currency, who has charge of the national bank examiners. The best method for ascertaining the condition of other banks has not been determined. One plan suggested provides for the co-operation of the comptroller or some other governmental agency with the state banking departments.

There are many bankers who are anxious that the method for determining the question of solvency shall be thorough and guarded, to protect impartially the interests of all banks. Unless that is done they fear that some future board of trustees may possibly make the power to decide as to solvency a basis for favoritism in the distribution of postal funds.
