THE TELEGRAPH OPERATOR IS BEING SUPPLANTED

LINE BETWEEN HERE AND WEED

Circuit Covers 206 Miles and Extends From Ashland to Red Bluff-Dispatcher at Dunsmuir

NEW YORK, Nov. 12 .- Supplanting the telegraph, which was considered the standard for handling train movements for a great many years, the Southern Pacific has joined the ranks of railroads now using the telephone for dispatching trains. Telephonic apparatus is now in operation over the Shasta Division, with a total of 291 miles of circuits. Copper wire of extreme weight and especially, drawn for service in a mountainous region is being used.

The telephonic circuit during sixteen hours out of the twenty-four is cut into two sections, and during the third "trick" the entire circuit is operated by one dispatcher. This circuit covers a 206 mile section of the main line between Ashland, Ore., and Red Bluff, Calif., and a branch from Weed, Calif., to Klamath Falls, Ore. The dispatcher is located at Dunsmuir, Calif., which is 98 miles from Red Bluff, the southern terminal of this circuit. There are twenty-five stations on the entire circuit, twelve being located between Dunsmuir and Red Bluff, nine between Dunsmuir and Ashland, and four between Weed and Klamath Falls.

Passenger and freight trains on the Southern Pacific are equipped with portable telephone sets, enabling the train men to get in touch with the dispatcher from any point along the

ABANDON HOPE FOR ENTOMBED MINERS

Recovery of Bodies Will Be Long and Expensive Task-Mine About Worked Out

SEATTLE, Nov. 10 .- The recovery of the bodies of the fifteen Italian. Belgian, Austrian and Polish repair men who were killed by the dust explosion in the Lawson mine of the Pacific Coast Coal company promises to be a long and expensive task. The explosions destroyed the timbering of the slope, which is 2,200 feet deep, and permitted the overhanging shale rock to cave down into the slope. It may be necessary to rebuild the entire shaft to reach the bodies. The mine is so nearly worked out that it will have to be abandoned after the bodies are removed. If the explosion
