

THE SCHOOLS ARE THRIVING

KLAMATH COUNTY OFFERS FINE EDUCATIONAL ADVANTAGES

Assistant to State Superintendent Ackerman Lands System in This Vicinity

SALEM, Nov. 16.—E. F. Carleton, assistant to State Superintendent of Public Instruction J. H. Ackerman, has returned from Klamath county, where he took occasion to investigate school conditions, and he was more than pleased with what he found. Referring to the schools of Klamath Falls and Klamath county, Mr. Carleton said:

"The schools of Klamath county are among the most progressive in the state. To this condition is due no small part of the credit for the remarkable growth of Klamath Falls. Only a short time ago a small village, now it is a city of about 3,000 inhabitants."

"A substantial class of business men and farmers is being attracted to Klamath county, and as usual the first question is, 'Have you good schools?' The question is answered as one alights at the station. In the center of the city is the large county high school, a beautiful brick building; to the right is an eight-room building of brown sandstone, and to the left is another eight-room grammar school, built of brick. The city schools are under the supervision of Superintendent R. H. Dunbar. He is assisted by a very efficient corps of teachers."

"W. E. Faught is principal of the county high school, and his teachers are all specialists, each one a university graduate. The chemical laboratory and the physical laboratory are well arranged and liberally supplied with all necessary apparatus. "It is quite a pleasure to know that the schools of the county are keeping pace with those in Klamath Falls. The county superintendent, J. G. Swan, was for the five years previous to his election the principal of the county high school. He has been working for better salaries for the teachers and good school buildings for the children. As a result they have high class teachers throughout the county."

SENATORIAL AND ASSEMBLY DISTRICTS TO BE CHANGED

California Legislature to Re-Appoint the State—Southern Part Will Have the Advantage

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 16.—A re-appointment of the assembly and senatorial districts is to be the program of the next legislature. The constitution provides that the legislature shall re-appoint the state following the announcement of the federal census, which will be used as a basis for the re-appointment. The ratio of the growth of Southern California is so much greater than the northern part of the state that it is expected the increase of representatives from the south will be at the expense of the northern portion of the state. The constitution says there are to be only forty senatorial and eighty assembly districts. Therefore the legislators necessarily will be compelled to increase the average of population in each district throughout the state. The districts showing the lesser increase will suffer over those showing the greater increase in population.

CORONER'S JURY RENDERS VERDICT IN MUNK CASE

Decide Munk Came to His Death by Colliding With McCoy—Latter Is Exonerated

WHEELING, W. Va., Nov. 15.—The coroner's jury in the Munk football case has rendered a verdict, which states: "We find the evidence confusing, but believe Rudolph Munk died November 12th by colliding with Thomas McCoy." It is believed that the verdict exonerates McCoy, and will probably end the case.
