

DEATH TAKES MARY G. EDDY

CHRISTIAN SCIENCE LEADER
PASSES AWAY

CAUSE OF DEMISE IS NOT KNOWN

Leaders Claim That the Church Organization Will Not Be Affected in Any Way

BOSTON, Dec. 5.—The actual cause of Mary Baker G. Eddy's death at Chestnut Hill has not been determined yet, as no medical examination has been made. Dr. West called at the home after Mrs. Baker's death, and will file a certificate this afternoon. Regarding this visit to the Eddy home yesterday, Dr. West said:

"The body lay in the bedroom in which Mrs. Eddy died, and apparently her death was peaceful. Her features were impassive, but 99 years tell, and her age showed clearly. I was told that she was sick for several days, but her illness was nothing specific, merely an indisposition. No physician treated her, and I do not know the exact cause of her death. There is not the slightest sign, however, that her death was anything but natural."

The body is lying in state at the Eddy home on Chestnut Hill. George Glover, Mrs. Eddy's son, is en route here, and the funeral arrangements will probably not be made until his arrival.

The leaders will not admit that the organization has suffered through Mrs. Eddy's death. Alfred Farlow, the publicity agent, made the following statement:

"We lose the counsel of our leader, but the church organization is complete. It is perfectly understood that no successor to Mrs. Eddy will be named."

The leaders will not discuss the disposition of the Eddy fortune, which is supposed to be large. In 1909 she announced that she had settled \$245,000 on George Glover and \$45,000 on Ebenezer Foster, Mrs. Eddy's adopted son.

The funeral will be private, and will be held from the residence Thursday morning.

PREDICTED THAT THE CHURCH WILL NOT SURVIVE

Schisms Are Expected to Develop and a Struggle for Leadership Will Ruin the Organization

CHICAGO, Dec. 5.—The collapse of the Christian Science church as a result of Mrs. Eddy's death is predicted. Leaders in theological thought assert that schisms will soon rend the church. Bishop Cheney, of the Reformed Episcopal church, said:

"I have always believed that when Mrs. Eddy died a struggle for leadership in the church would follow. I believe Christian Science will not survive its founder many years, as its teachings are repugnant to the Scriptures. I have read the 'Science of Health' and found it ridiculous."

Bishop Samuel Fallows of the Episcopal church said:

"There is none other to take Mrs. Eddy's place, and the church will probably be managed by committees, in which the personal element will not be a factor."

Rev. J. L. Jones said: "She laid hold of the truth, but overworked it. The vitality of her message has met the supreme test now, and I expect the church's slow decline."

SHARP DROP IN MERCURY DRIVES LUMBERMAN WILD

REDDING, Calif., Dec. 3.—Living next to nature in a section where the thermometer went down to 30 degrees during the last few days, and where snow was flying, caused the farmers in the Round Mountain section to be alarmed for the sanity of Frank Kelly, who was brought to this city this week by Constable Williams.

Kelly, who is 50 years of age, was working in a lumber camp when he suddenly levitated for the woods, and discarding all his clothing, camped in the open air. He persisted in refusing food.

HILL MAKES STRONG DENIAL

STORY OF NEW ROAD DISCREDITED BY REPRESENTATIVE

E. P. Shannon Says That Rogue River Valley Line Will Not Be a Part of Hill System

PORTLAND, Dec. 3.—According to the Oregonian there has been an absolute and unqualified denial of the report published in a Southern Oregon paper to the effect that the Hill interests contemplate building a line of roadway from Klamath Falls through Medford and Jacksonville to Crescent City, a port in Northern California, is made by E. P. Shannon, assistant to John F. Stevens, president of the Spokane, Portland and Seattle, and head of the Hill lines in Oregon.

The report referred to stated that the portions of the Pacific and Eastern already constructed would be used as a part of the line, and that the Pacific and Eastern survey from Klamath Falls to a pass twenty-two miles south of Crater Lake would be utilized. The Pacific and Eastern is now a Hill line, having been purchased from John R. Allen. The fact that G. A. Kyle, formerly a prominent Hill official, is consulting engineer for a mile of new road being built by the Rogue River Valley Railroad company up Jackson Creek is taken as an indication that that road is also to become a part of the supposedly new line.

"There had been some talk of such a line being built," said Mr. Shannon, "but the plan has been definitely abandoned. We would not be likely to use Mr. Kyle, one of our former officials, if we really intended to build such a line and wished to shroud our movements in mystery, as is supposed. John R. Allen is not connected with the Hill interests. He bought the Pacific and Eastern and we purchased it from him. That is as far as the connection goes."

INCREASES AVERAGE 15 PER CENT

ARE NOW CONFERRING WITH
GENERAL MANAGERS

Involves Sixty Western Roads and Will Be Several Weeks Before the Matter Is Settled

CHICAGO, Dec. 3.—Demanding a wage increase that will aggregate \$5,000,000 annually, the representatives of 55,000 conductors and trainmen, employed on sixty of the Western railroads, are conferring with the general managers of the roads. The increases average 15 per cent, and the negotiations are expected to continue for several weeks.

President Garretthorn of the Railway Conductors and President Lee of the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen, and eighty-five chairmen of the various railroad organizations, represent the employees.

J. F. KIMBALL DELEGATE TO CONSERVATION CONGRESS

J. F. Kimball and wife left last Saturday morning for Spokane, where Mr. Kimball goes as a delegate from the Klamath-Lake County Forest Fire association to the conservation congress which is to be held in the Washington town on December 5th and 6th.

The congress is a meeting of the timber owners of the West, and matters relating to forest preservation will be discussed by practical men. Fire prevention, patrol organization, public and private co-operation, reforestation, taxation and legislation are some of the topics which will be discussed. J. R. Farr, the United States officer who has just been inspecting the reservation timber, will attend the congress with Mr. Kimball.

MASON WILL GET CONTRACT

HIS BID THE LOWEST ON DRAINAGE DITCH

Three Bidders and Local Man's Figures Were \$63,000—Now Up to Washington

A local contractor will in all probability be awarded the contract for the digging of the drainage canal, which is to carry the waters of Lost river to the Klamath river, the bids for which were opened in Portland Wednesday of this week. W. H. Mason of this city was the fortunate man, and his bid has been recommended as the one to be accepted.

There were three bidders, and the figures follow: W. H. Mason, Klamath Falls, \$63,000; George Cooke & Sons, Spokane, \$71,800; Mr. Brogan, Wisconsin, \$92,300.

The bids have been sent to the secretary of the interior at Washington with the recommendation that Mason's bid be accepted, and the contract will probably be signed and returned here by the first of the year. The terms of the contract are that work shall be commenced within a month after the contract is signed.

The canal will be 7½ miles long, and be forty feet wide on the bottom. Bids for the dam will be opened in Portland December 15th.
