"I have always believed that when Mrs. Eddy died a struggle for leadership in the church would follow. I believe Christian Science will not survive its founder many years, as its teachings are repugnant to the Scriptures. I have read the 'Science of Health,' and found it ridiculous."

Bishop Samuel Fallows of the Episcopal church said:

"There is none other to take Mrs. Eddy's place, and the church will probably be managed by committees, in which the personal element will not be a factor."

Rev. J. L. Jones said: "She laid hold of the truth, but overworked it. The vitality of her message has met the church's slow decline."
