## ONE MORE REPRESENTATIVE

RE-APPORTIONMENT TO GIVE STATE ANOTHER CONGRESSMAN

Change May Put Klamath and Lake Counties in the Third or Eastern District

PORTLAND, Dec. 12.—In the opinion of Representative-elect Lafferty, Oregon is certain to get three Representatives in Congress as a result of the census just announced. He also believes that the new apportionment bill will pass Congress in time for the Oregon Legislature to act in the matter of redistricting the state at the session which meets at Salem next month.

"That Oregon will elect three Representatives at the next election is a foregone conclusion," said Mr. Lafferty last night. "The new apportionment bill will probably pass Congress in time for the Oregon Legislature to re-district the state during the session which meets in January. Otherwise the extra representative we will be entitled to will be elected at large in 1912."

"The last apportionment act was passed by Congress January 16, 1901, following the census of 1900. If Congress acts as promptly on the census of 1910, the new apportionment act should become a law not later than January 16, 1911. The Legislatures of the various states convene in January and generally remain in session for several weeks. If the new apportionment act shall be passed by the middle of January or thereabouts, it will give the Legislatures ample time in which to re-district the states at their approaching sessions. No doubt Congress will take this fact into consideration and pass the apportionment bill early next month.

### Redistricting Is Question.

"No one can foretell just how our Legislature will divide up the state in order to make the three districts. One arrangement will suit me as well as another, and should I make good my first term, and in consequence be a candidate for re-election in 1912, I would just as soon be a candidate at large as to be a candidate from any given district.

"It is probable, however that the coming Legislature will create three separate districts. Many favor putting all of Eastern Oregon into one district, that is to say, all the terri-

tory lying east of the summit of the Cascade Mountains. This would result in detaching Multnomah, Columbia and Clatsop counties from the present second district. It would also necessitate the cutting of Klamath and Lake counties off from the present first district and adding them to the Eastern Oregon district. Should this arrangement be followed, Multnomah, Columbia and Clatsop would doubtless form one district, while the present first district minus Klamath and Lake counties would form the other district. This would give the Eastern Oregon district a population of 142,889; the district composed of Multnomah, Columbia and Clatsop, 252,957, and the present first district, 276,935.

### FIVE MILLIONS LOST BY CUSTOMS FRAUDS

Government Said to Have Been Cheated Out of Vast Sums by the Art Dealers

NEW YORK, Dec. 10.—Five million dollars is the amount of duties out of which the government was defrauded by Duveen brothers, art importers of 302 Fifth avenue, so it was reported today in the customs house invoices showed. The members of the firm, Benjamin J. Duveen and his uncle, Henry J. Duveen, were arrested on October 13th for alleged undervaluation of goods. It was estimated then that the duties lost through this means would aggregate \$1,000,000. Seizure of the books of the firm revealed by comparison with the customs house invoices that the loss will be five times that figure, it was said.

It came out today that Henry J. Duveen, head of the firm, had been permitted to depart for England, after he had deposited a money bond of \$75,000 with Commissioner Shields. He went ostensibly to raise money to lift the \$500,000 bond that has been imposed on his Fifth avenue store. The government took possession immediately after the arrests, and expects to recover at least \$1,000,000 from the stock.

### SOUTHERN PACIFIC HITS HOT SPRINGS AT GILA

Railroad Opens a Remarkable Well That Promises a Big Water Supply

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 10.—After years of difficulty in obtaining even a limited water supply in an extremely dry region, the Southern Pacific railroad today opened one of the most remarkable wells in the country at Gila, Ariz., at a depth of 1,280 feet. After months of hard drilling a heavy flow was encountered, and in a moment a column of hissing steam shot high above the derrick, almost scorching the men at work about the machinery. It continued a number of minutes, and finally settled down to a steady puffing.

When the tools were removed the water was within 112 feet of the surface and still rising, and numerous tests showed an even temperature of 115 degrees hotter than the healing springs of Carlsbad, and but seven degrees cooler than the Arkansas Hot Springs. The properties of the water have not been determined, but an expert chemist has already been sent from this city to make analyses for the company. A new health resort in the desert may be the result. Meantime the Southern Pacific will require little fuel to make steam in its boilers in that locality.

### ORGAN GRINDER

LEAVES \$30,000

Fortune Accumulated by Monkey John and Smian Is Distributed

ST. PAUL, Dec. 12.—An estate valued at more than \$30,000 accumulated by an Italian with a hand-organ and a monkey, is in the Hennepin County Probate Court to be divided between charity and well-to-do relatives.

The property is that of John Zignego, who died November 19 at the home of Joseph Zignego, a nephew. He was known to thousands only as "Monkey John." The Catholic Orphans' Home at Minneapolis is to get \$10,000, but the bulk of it goes to two aged sisters in Italy.

### UNWRITTEN LAW PLEADED AS DEFENSE TO KILLING

Indiana Man Is Acquitted of Shooting a Millionaire Who Ruined His Home.

VINCENNES, Ind., Dec. 10.—The trial of Menlo Moore, a paroled incident to the Shaw case, ended yesterday by a verdict of acquittal. Moore shot Charles Gibson a millionaire, October 3rd, after his wife had confessed her intimate relations with Gibson. Mrs. Moore's confession was repeated at the trial and it is believed cleared her husband. The "unwritten law" was pleaded as a defense.

## CRIMINAL CASES NEXT MONTH

WELCH TRIED ON THE 3rd AND ALEXANDER THE 10TH

### NO DATE SET FOR THE YORK CASE

Judge Calkins Will Probably Occupy the Bench Here, Changing With Benson

On Monday the docket was called in the circuit court and several of cases were set for hearing. The trial of George Welch, charged with murder for the killing of Fred Alexander, was set for January 3rd.

Charles Spencer, who is up for larceny, will have his hearing on January 6th. On January 10th, Tom Alexander, who killed "Red" Powell in the Elite saloon September 13th, will be tried.

There is no date set for the trial of F. B. Houston, or Thaddeus York, as he was then called, on the charge of obtaining \$9,000 from Fred Melhase of the American Bank & Trust company. The two cases of Cantrall against Carroll, and that of Doctor Fisher against the Southern Pacific railroad, the Oleone Livestock company against John Slade, and a number of other cases will, with the York case, be heard by Judge Calkins of the first judicial district, who will come here for the purpose of sitting in the cases, while Judge Benson will probably occupy his bench.

Judge Benson cannot hear these cases because his firm was at one time attorney for some of the parties.

### GOVERNOR ELECT JOHNSON TALKS

NOT TO BE OVERLOOKED IN LAW MAKING

Believes Colonel Roosevelt Is One of Our Most Famous Citizens Praises Him Highly

NEW YORK, Dec. 10.—Governor-Elect Johnson of California, as he sat in the Outlook offices awaiting Colonel Roosevelt said: "For ten years we seem to have gone crazy protecting the property of corporations. The individual has been a minus quantity. This is to be changed. Hereafter, in California at least, the individual is to be considered and not treated as a machine. The other states will soon follow."

He discussed the radical legislation that the California legislature is to enact during the coming session and said: "The initiative, referendum and recall, the absolute control of public service corporations, a comprehensive employers' liability act, and the abolishing of the fellow servant clause are laws that will undoubtedly pass. Large property owners and corporations will be protected, but we will compel the corporation to respect the rights of the individual. California intends to take a progressive stand in really regulating corporations."

Johnson praised Colonel Roosevelt most enthusiastically. He met the Colonel for the first time today and discussed the election but not commenting on the interview publicly. Governor Johnson said: "Colonel Roosevelt is the most popular man in California today. The Californians appreciate him. He and men like him, made the battle against corporation control possible. When he comes to the Pacific next March we will show him what we think of him."

### HONDURAS IS ON THE VERGE OF AN UPRISING

Large Portions of the Republic Placed Under Martial Law by Davila

GUATEMALA, Dec. 12.—A revolutionary outbreak is threatened in Honduras and intense excitement prevails throughout the country. Martial law has been proclaimed in the capital and in the larger cities of the republic, and the jails are filled with political prisoners.

Wholesale arrests of persons suspected of having some connection with the threatened uprising are being made on the orders of the President.

There are extra Government troops at Puerto Cortez and Celiba, and the well-to-do residents are flocking across the border into Guatemala. No passenger is permitted to land in Honduras without a passport, signed by the Honduran Consul in the port of sailing.

## GETTING READY FOR THE CONCRETE

EXPECT TO BEGIN POURING THIS WEEK

### FINISHING THE BRISTOL BUILDINGS

Plastering Those Between the Boston and Portland Stores and Windows Are Being Put In

The work on the Bristol buildings is being rushed and as soon as the rock is delivered the concrete will be poured in the moulds of the structure on Main street between Fifth and Sixth, and it is expected that this will be done the last of this week. The elevator to raise the concrete is being put up today and it is the expectation that the crushed rock will be delivered and the work the concrete will begin within the next few days.

E. J. Evans has the forms for the building completed and it will be but a few days now before the concrete part of the structure will be finished.

In the building on Main street between the Portland Store and the Boston Store, the finishing touches are being made. The room next to the Boston Store, and which will be occupied by that company, is plastered and in a few days the wall between it and the building at present occupied by the Boston Store will be torn away so as to make an archway between the two rooms and then they will both be occupied by that enterprising firm.

The cornice is already in place on this building and it is now being painted. Carpenters are at work on the window frames and the glass has already been put in in the two east rooms.

One thing commented most favorably on by those who have inspected Mr. Bristol's buildings, is the height of the ceilings. They are sixteen feet from floor to ceiling and give a sense of largeness not found in rooms of lesser height.

### TO BRING TOBACCO UNDER PURE FOOD LAW

WASHINGTON, Dec. 12.—Senator Taylor of Tennessee introduced a bill to extend the provisions of the national pure food law to tobacco in whatever form it may be offered for sale. His bill is designed to prevent the mislabeling or misbranding of domestic tobaccos so that they cannot be offered as imported stocks; to prevent the adulteration of tobacco with any other substance or the treatment of tobacco with any poisonous or deleterious substance.

### Moving Picture Shows Multiply

America's moving picture theaters continue to multiply, and in New York alone there are 250 of these, compared with 70 ordinary theaters. Such vast proportions has the enterprise reached in the State that last year an average of 2,250,000 people a day paid for admission to the picture theaters, producing a revenue of nearly \$60,000,000. The chief combination of manufacturers produces 20,000 feet of new films every week, and Edison's royalty amounts to \$8,000 a week.

Obedient to the instructions in the telegram Postmaster Emmitt left Tuesday morning for Washington, where he will be informed of the manner in which the postal savings receipts are to be handled and such other instructions as may be necessary.
