**MAKE EXCELLENT FEEDING GROUND**

**SHEPHERDS TO USE THE WEYERHAUSER LANDS FOR GRAZING**

**Shipping Points Are Easily Accessible and Other Advantages Are Great**

J. F. Kimball, local representative of the Weyerhaeuser Timber company, has gone to Portland to attend the national woolgrowers' convention. The principal object of Mr. Kimball's visit is to effect a ten years' lease with some of the big sheepmen of the timber lands of the Weyerhaeuser company in Klamath county.

The Weyerhaeuser company controls the largest portion of the timber lands between Aspen lake and the California line. These, with other holdings that could be brought into the lease would give a range for sheep covering nearly 200,000 acres. With the big ranch of the company at Klamath there would be both summer and winter feed.

Telephone lines now traverse this big tract, and connections could be made with any camps established by the stockmen. In addition to this convenience there would be three shipping points in easy access to the land—one at Klamath Falls, one at Dorris and one at Thrall. This would give the owner of the sheep a great advantage by his being able to get his mutton to the market when the prices are most favorable. Also there would not of necessity be any long hauls of wool, as the shearing corrals could be established near one of the shipping stations without moving the stock off of the leased grounds.

If this deal goes through and a lease is made of this big tract of timber it will bring into Klamath county one of the largest bands of sheep in the state, if not on the coast. Mr. Kimball states that the grazing of sheep on the timber lands will solve the fire problem, which is one of the gravest dangers the timber man has to contend with.

Bly's first flight from a vessel was made last November at Hampton Roads from the deck of the United States steamer Birmingham, and the landing was made on a stretch of beach near.
