BAD WEATHER DID NOT DETER THOSE INTERESTED

MADE STRONG AND FORCEFUL TALK

Speaker Cited Many Instances of the Success of Public Ownership of Utilities

Despite the inclement weather, a big crowd gathered at Redmen's hall on Tuesday night to hear the talk on "Municipal Ownership of Public Utilities" by President eGorge B. Frank of the Good Government League. All attending felt well repaid for their visit, too, for Mr. Frank gave a forceful talk, and produced facts and figures from towns and cities using the municipal ownership system to illustrate his points.

In speaking of the possibilities of water plant here Mr. Franks stated that it would not be necessary for the city to purchase the present plant, but that a supply of the clearest and purest water to be found could be brought here from Rock Creek, a distance of eighteen miles, for \$500,000, and that this would furnish water for a city of 500,000 population. An electric light plant, sufficiently large to supply the present demand would cost about \$35,000, and the speaker declared that he could prove that such a plant could furnish power and light for 5 cents a kilowatt hour or lesa.

In speaking of the new franchises introduced at the council meeting on Monday night the speaker scored them, and also the company for not ... leaving the question of deciding their acceptance or rejection to the voters at the May election.


