## THE NEW COURT HOUSE

THE present status of the new court house building, which is so sadly needed, was very plainly set forth in the communication of the county court which was published on Saturday. We do not believe that there is a voter in the county who will deny the necessity and great need of a new court house building. All must realize the necessity of this building at the earliest possible moment.

The only question, it seems, is one of location. The court, apparently, favors the acceptance of the free site offered by the Klamath Development company, and the turning over of the present site to the city for a public park and rest resort for the benefit of both the people of the city and those from the country. This to be used by the city free for a period of ten years, when it could be purchased, if desired, at a proper valuation. It is impossible for the city to purchase a suitable site at this time, and by using the site offered the city would have ten years in which to secure another site and grow the necessary shade trees, in case the present one should be considered too expensive.

The question to be determined now, however, is whether any other desirable site can be secured, or whether the county court would be allowed to build on the Hot Springs site without protest. If there is anyone who would oppose the free site offered to the extent of enjoining the county court from building thereon, we believe that it would be their duty to so inform the court, so that no further time should be wasted. It should be understood that one taxpayer could enjoin the county from building on the Hot Springs tract, and in that case nothing further could be done towards a new building for two years, or until after the location has been decided by the people at the regular election in 1912. Let the taxpayers be as open and frank as the county court, and say just where they stand on the matter.

## DORRIS FEELS ASSURED OF GETTING NEW BOX FACTORY

Agreement Has Been Reached Between Promoters of Enterprise and the Sawmill Men

After many meetings between the promoters of the box factory and the sawmill men an agreement has at last been reached that proves to be satisfactory to all concerned. Enough lumber has been contracted for to answer the needs of the factory and immediate construction of the buildings will be started. George A. Pratt and E. A. Blocklinger spent several days in Dorris trying to close up affairs, and on Thursday evening the necessary contracts were signed. The two gentlemen left on Friday, but Mr. Pratt intends to return shortly and assume the active management of affairs. The factory will have a monthly payroll of \$6,000, and will employ seventy-five men in the summer and forty in the winter. The building of a box factory in Dorris means an era of prosperity to everyone here, and the circulation of \$6,000 each month among our business men means a big item to them. They have all labored hard in securing this industry, and feel jubilant that it is now an assured fact.—Dorris Booster.

## MISTAKE OF DIAGNOSIS ENDANGERS MANY LIVES

Doctor Says High School Girl Died From Tonsillitis When She Had Diphtheria

MEDFORD, March 28.—Owing to the fact that a local physician diagnosed a case of diphtheria as tonsillitis, and after his patient died allowed the assembled high school students to attend the funeral, Dr. E. Barton Piekol, of this city, a member of the state board of health, has declared a strict quarantine of many of the high school pupils and of the intimate friends of the deceased. As the schools close next week for the annual Easter vacation, they will not need to be dismissed.

Miss Wray Curry, a high school girl of this city, was the victim. Her case of bad throat was diagnosed as tonsillitis and the home was not quarantined, but her friends came and went. She died, and immediately afterward her sister was afflicted.

## WAR DEPARTMENT GETTING BUSY

DECLARES IT MUST COME WITHIN THIRTY DAYS

All Regiments at San Antonio Are to Be Recruited to Full War Strength

SAN ANTONIO, March 28.—Francisco Madero Sr. has predicted peace in Mexico, possibly within the next ten days, and certainly within thirty days.

He told the United Press that the Mexican government has agreed to enter into peace negotiations.

In the meantime, the war department has notified Lieutenant Colonel Ladd, adjutant general of the division here, that every regiment must immediately be recruited to full war strength, and prepared for indefinite stay in the field.
