The Commercial Club of Medford is not content to wait for the colonists to come to them, but have sent a delegation of three men to Portland to meet the colonists as they arrive from the East. In that way they are turning a large number of homeseekers from other parts of Oregon and bringing them to Medford.

If it was possible for Klamath County to have one or more men at Portland to meet the arriving colonists, we believe that hundreds of settlers could be secured for this county. With the great opportunities we have to offer to people of moderate means it should be easy to interest these new arrivals who are looking for homes in the West. It is claimed that the Hill road is bringing the greater number of colonists, and naturally these come by way of Portland instead of San Francisco and the southern route. Therefore, Portland is where we should use our greatest efforts.

ARMY'S SIZE NOT VERY MUCH LARGER

MANY APPLYING FOR ENLISTMENT ARE BELOW PHYSICAL STANDARD — ONLY 14 PER CENT ENLISTED LAST YEAR

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 5.—Though some recruiting officers report big increases in applications for enlistment in the army since the beginning of the military demonstration on the Texan border, army officers predict that the actual increase in the army will be small.

They base this prediction upon the small percentage of applicants who are accepted from among the vast number applying. During the last fiscal year only 14 per cent of those applying were finally enlisted in the military service. In fifty-eight main recruiting stations 94,121 men applied for enlistment, of which 78,777 were rejected. Of the 15,344 accepted at the recruiting stations, 2,387 were later rejected at the recruiting depots. These figures do not include the vast number, probably several hundred thousand, it is estimated, who were rejected without examination by the recruiting officers at all the stations. These include men of obvious physical defects, men plainly under or over age, and others who bear the stamp of immorality or tramping. No record is kept of these rejections.

It has been the experience of the army recruiting officers that applications for enlistment are increased by any series of events which bring the army into prominence, especially if it seems likely that there will be opportunity for field service. The most extensive increases, however, appear when volunteers are called out. Not only are civilians more attracted to volunteer organizations than the regulars, but also a greater proportion are accepted, because the examination of applicants is not nearly so rigid and searching. The regular recruit examiners are experts, trained to detect every imperfection in the physique of health of applicants.

Blosser who was found dead in bed yesterday in their Sellwood home, has divulged the fact that the woman had committed suicide by taking prussic acid. The body was discovered lying across the bed by Miss Pearl Blosser, a sister-in-law, shortly after the husband had left the house to come to Portland.

Mrs. Blosser had threatened numerous times to end her life. A child one and a half years old is left. The family lived at East Seventeenth street and Maiden avenue.

EDWARDS WINS FROM TUCKER

KNOCKS OUT OPPONENT IN THE TENTH ROUND

Bout, Though One-Sided, Was Exciting, and Was Hard Fought Throughout

Bruised and bleeding, his features almost unrecognizable, C. T. Tucker went down to defeat at the hands of Frankie Edwards of Oakland in the tenth round of a one-sided, though hardfought bout Thursday night. It was the same story of a good boxer who is past his kid days taking off a great deal of flesh and going in the ring against a fast young man in a lighter class. The strain of training down from 145 to 138 plainly told on Tucker, as he was not his old self at all from the first round till the end of the match.

Though he at times rallied and fought like a demon, Tucker's blows were woefully lacking in force and he swung wildly. In order to recover himself he rushed into clinches, and it during these that he did his best scuffling, landing several blows that made Frankie wince.

Edwards, on the other hand, was in even better shape than when he defeated McLellan here in January, and proved himself to be wonderfully well versed in the boxing game, landing almost at will. From the middle of the first round till the end it was only a question of how long Tucker could withstand the terrible punishment meted out to him.

Edwards, from the beginning, landed viciously with his left to Tucker's face and body, and before the close of the second round had cut Tucker's face and started his nose bleeding. Only in the fifth and eighth did Tucker make any showing, and in both of these he tore into Edwards like a tiger. Edwards retaliated, and Referee Jack Crawford had all he could attend to to tear the men apart in the clinches.

Edwards led with a left to the face in the ninth, and Tucker rushed him to the ropes twice, landing each time and going into clinches. After these two rushes, Tucker seemed to lose his power of guarding, for the Oakland lad pummeled him repeatedly, sending him to his knees. Tucker got up at the end of the count, and just as the gong sounded Edwards landed on him again, knocking him to the floor. The blow landed after the gong sounded, but as Edwards had started before the sound the blow started before the sound, it could not be stopped. While the incident caused considerable uproar in the house, the referee very properly declared it unavoidable, and ordered the boxers to continue.

In the last round Edwards started in for a knockout, and Tucker put up a plucky, though futile fight to hold him off. Thrice Tucker went to the floor, and took part of the count before Edwards, landing again on the face with his awful left, could knock him out.

A large crowd, in fact, one of the largest in the history of the ring game in Klamath Falls, had assembled by the time Dave Burling, the official announcer, introduced Tobey Miller of Oakland and Kid Gallagher of Redding, the first preliminary boxers. He also stated that all of the contestants had been examined by Dr. Hamilton, and found to be in first class condition.

A challenge from Jack Linkenbach to Tucker at 145 pounds was announced, as was a challenge to the winner of the night's match from Eddie Madison of San Francisco.

J. S. Greenburg refereed the Miller-Gallagher mix which went two rounds. Although he was the lighter, Tobey did most of the fighting, the Indian

seeming to be only able to rush wildly. Miller showed himself to be a clever milt wielder, and landed on the redskin at will. In the second round, after battering away, Miller landed a hard right to Gallagher's wind, sending him to the floor, where he remained till counted out.

The bout between Frank Williams of Merrill and Kid Span of Berkeley was one to which the fans looked forward with interest as a result of their former encounter, when Williams, after having his man practically whipped, lost to the colored man on a foul. The announcement by Williams that Span did not care to box, owing to their match in Merrill on April 15th, came as a distinct disappointment.
