Charles Horton was in the Valley Monday, looking over his prospective irrigation project at the north end of the Valley, but says the scarcity of hay and grain will make it impracticable, if not next to impossible to begin work on the dam till new hay comes in—that is, July or August. He expects to irrigate 2,000 acres at \$40 an acre, giving the landowners ten years to pay for his work, and then to turn the property over to them without further charge.

Preparations are going forward for starting the Slack sawmill, which is located north of the Donnell place. If expectations are realized far more and better work will be done the coming season than was done last year.

Evidently men are not expected to take out licenses for catching suckers, at least nobody has done so that I know of, and almost everybody has engaged in that luxurious sport. In view of the fact that the dam will be built across Lost River near the Willson bridge this summer and the connection be thus cut off from Tule Lake and the upper river, most people thought this would be their last chance for catching suckers as they come up the river to spawn. The opportunity for catching them at the upper gap was extensively improved, and large numbers were landed. It is expected that hereafter, when Lost River is made to empty into Klamath River by means of the dam and ditch, that trout and salmon will take the place of the suckers in that stream, so there will be some real sport in taking them. I predict that in future years Lost River will become as famous a fishing resort as the Williamson River now is, and that the ripples at Bonanza will be daily lined with fishermen, whipping the waters for trout.

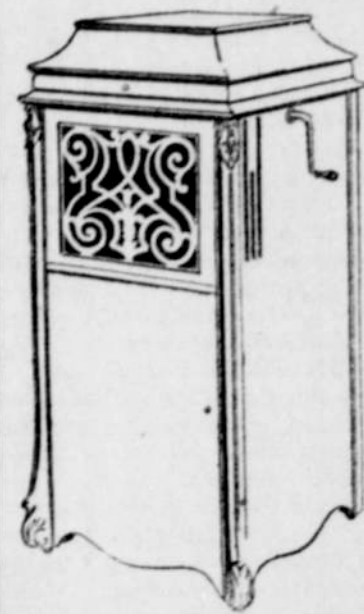
