

MOTSCHENBACHER MAKES SHOWING

HE AND P. M. COLLIER WIN VICTORY FOR STATE UNIVERSITY IN DEBATE AT STANFORD SATURDAY NIGHT

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, April 3.—Students of the University are jubilant as a result of the debates at Stanford University and the University of Washington, both of which were won by the Oregon teams. "Resolved, That the United States Should Adopt a System of Ship Subsidies" was the question debated at both places. Zimmermann and Ray supported the affirmative at Seattle, while P. M. Collier and Vernon Motschenbacher took the negative stand at Stanford.

The showing made by all of the debaters was splendid. Especial attention was given to the showing made by Vernon Motschenbacher, the freshman from Klamath Falls, who established a new precedent at the University by being selected for the debating team during his first year at college.

As a result of the two victories Saturday night, University of Oregon stands at the head of the Pacific Coast Debating League.

WOOL FIRST ON LIST

President Taft's Message to Congress Will Be Very Brief, Dealing With Reciprocity

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 3.—Bryan and Harmon are in this city, watching closely the final preparations being made by the Democrats before the opening of the extra session of congress tomorrow. They seem busily engaged in their work.

According to Chairman Underwood of the Ways and Means committee, the revision of the wool schedule will be the first to be taken up by the members of the two houses. Many lobbyists are here for the purpose of making a hard fight to retain the present rates.

The Canadian reciprocity treaty and the reapportionment measure will be up for consideration at an early date, according to promises made.

Up till noon today President Taft had not written his message to the new congress. The document will be very brief. In all probabilities it will be confined to the reciprocity measure.

The republican house members will hold their caucus tonight. It is reported that Cannon will present Congressman Mann's speaker candidacy to the caucus. The principal business tonight is to decide how the minority members of the committees are to be chosen.

EXTRA SESSION APPEALS NOT TO LIBRARY CLUBS

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 3.—Much as many congressmen may dislike to return to Washington for an extra session that bids fair to extend through the hot summer months, their grief is not greater than that of the employees of the Congressional Library.

When congress is not in session, a position in the big \$6,000,000 library is more or less a sinecure. Save for a few scattered students, the big reading rooms are practically deserted, and the clerks have a hard time finding work to occupy them.

But when the statesmen and near-statesmen get busy things are different. Then the library clerks earn every cent of their salaries and more besides. There are constant calls for copies of the old "Congressional Globe" which was the name of the present "Record" half a century ago. Unusual books tucked in out-of-the-way places are demanded—and the employees declare they encounter few congressmen in whom patience is a notable virtue.

"We were just getting ready to have a nice long rest when the President had to go and call an extra session," declared one woman clerk. "I think President Taft is just too mean for anything."

ALL ARE CONFIDENT

Merriam Has Spent \$52,000 and Harrison \$17,000 in Their Race for the Office

CHICAGO, April 3.—Merriam and Harrison have ended their mayoralty campaign with whirlwind tours and both are confident of election.

Harrison, it is believed, will win two to one.

William Rodriguez, the socialist candidate, expects to poll from 50,000 to 75,000 votes.

FRENCH SAY LARGER ARMY ASSURES PEACE

PARIS, March 30.—French newspapers complacently vie with reorganization of the British army, now in progress, declaring that England's activity foreshadows the development of increased peaceful relations between France and Great Britain. The entente cordiale already existing is expected to merge into a defensive alliance of the French and English navies and later may be followed by a similar convention regarding their armies.

PHEASANTS FOR KLAMATH

GAME WARDEN WRITES TO A LOCAL SPORTSMAN

There Is a Possibility That the County May Also Receive Shipment of Reeves Pheasants

J. D. Cochran is in receipt of a letter from State Game Warden R. O. Stevenson, replying to Mr. Cochran's request for a shipment of Reeves pheasants, the newest game bird to be introduced into this state. In his reply he states that there are inquiries galore as to the pheasant, but that Mr. Cochran's letter has been placed on file for future action.

In the letter Mr. Stevenson also takes occasion to express his pleasure that the China pheasants he sent Mr. Cochran withstood the winter so well, and he says that Klamath county has a good chance to receive more of the birds during the coming fall. He states that it is the policy of his department to distribute birds in all parts of the state where the residents show a proper regard for the game laws. Otherwise, he says, it is but a waste of money.

Determined to get all the game birds possible for Klamath county, Mr. Cochran has also written the game warden for a shipment of wild turkeys.

After laying in cold storage for 10, these many months, the Water Wagon made its appearance on Main street Thursday, and it paraded up and down that thoroughfare until all the dust had been settled. STAGE COACH UPSETS; DRIVER KILLED BY FALL

One passenger, a woman, had her leg broken and side crushed. Hitchcock was an experienced driver, but the stage was heavily loaded, and upset coming down a grade.

TO POSTPONE THE ATTEMPT TO FLY ACROSS THE OCEAN

KIEL, Germany, April 3.—Joseph Brucker has decided to postpone until next fall his attempt to cross the Atlantic in the dirigible balloon Suchard. The voyage had been planned for this or next month, and the delay is to permit of trials of the balloon and its machinery overlaid before the trans-Atlantic trip is undertaken.

IN TWO MONTHS \$133,869 HAS BEEN DEPOSITED

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 30.—After two months' operation the net amount on deposit at postal savings banks in forty-eight second class post-offices on February 28th was \$133,-

\$69. Figuring at this ratio the amount of deposits in the same postoffices after one year will amount to \$803,214. The combined population of the forty-eight towns in which the depository offices have been established is 372,000, which represents but 1-245 portion of the nation's population.

If after the postal savings banks are established at all money order postoffices so as to extend this facility to people throughout the entire country, the service is patronized in the same proportion as it has been at the forty-eight depository offices now in operation, the total amount, after one year of operation would be nearly \$200,000,000.

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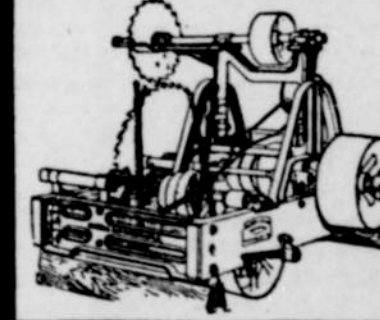
