

SUNSTAR WINS CLASSIC DERBY

WINNER WAS THE MOST HEAVILY BACKED HORSE ON THE TRACK FOR MANY YEARS—AMERICANS FAIL TO SHOW

EPSON DOWNS, England, May 31.—Sunstar, the most heavily played favorite for a decade, won the English classic derby today. Steadfast finished second and Royal Tender third. Neither All Gold nor Adam Bede, the only two American starters, showed.

It is estimated that the bookmakers lost \$5,000,000 on Sunstar. The king, queen and a crowd numbering into the thousands, saw the race.

Sunstar ran easily, and finished two lengths ahead. There was much commotion in racing circles before the start, because of the rumors of an endeavor to pocket the horse to prevent its winning.

The first year German class of ten voices rendered three German songs: "Die Lorelei," "Süße Nacht" and "Schloß, Kinde, Schloß," in a very pleasing manner, and their appearance on each occasion was greeted with great applause. Miss Lillian Van Riper rendered a piano solo in her usual excellent manner, and a quartet, Miss Roxa Shive, Miss Orpha Schallack, Miss Josie Van Riper and Miss Vera Houston, also pleased the audience.

Miss Roxa Shive rendered a vocal solo, and easily convinced the audience that she has a splendid voice. She was forced to respond to an encore. The closing number was a German skit, "Als Verlobte Empfehlen Sich," or, translated, "We Announce the Engagement of —." There were a good many in the audience who understood German, and they greatly enjoyed the bill, speaking highly of the fluent manner in which the students have mastered the Teuton tongue; there were many who do not speak the language, but thanks to the forethought of those preparing the program, they also enjoyed the play, though they did not understand the words. BERLIN, May 31.—Herr Fritz Furse, who is 98 years old, and his wife, who is 91, have celebrated the seventieth anniversary of their marriage at Potsdam, where they have lived in matrimonial harmony for seven decades.

When the marriage took place in 1841, Herr Furse was a working carpenter. He soon established his own business, prospered and became the owner of house property representing a handsome income. Both Furse and his wife are in excellent health.

The Kaiser, who takes a keen interest in the couple as the oldest residents of Potsdam, sent the band of the First Foot Guards to play outside their house in honor of the occasion. Prince Joachim, with all the officers of the same regiment, called on the couple and offered their congratulations, so did the mayor and aldermen of Potsdam. The aldermen also sent flowers.

POPE PIUS CONDEMNS THE PORTUGUESE LAW

ROME, May 31.—An encyclical addressed by Pope Pius to the Roman Catholic bishops throughout the world, strongly deploring the anti-religious attitude of the government of the Portuguese republic, has been officially published at the Vatican.

The encyclical deals with the violent expulsion of religious orders from Portugal; the suppression of church holidays, religious oaths and religious teachings, the introduction of divorce laws, the arbitrary deposition of the bishops of Oporto and Beja, and finally, the law separating church and state.

The Holy See, the encyclical says, has been patient up to now, but cannot longer keep silent, as the law of separation denies to Catholic citizens even common liberty. Such a law, the encyclical asserts, is a spoliation of material goods and a tyrannical oppression in spiritual affairs. Man is deprived forever of a fixed church in which to worship, and the law even violates the will of testators.

Ecclesiastics, the encyclical declares further, are excluded by the law from organization. It prohibits the publication of ecclesiastical acts, forbids religious emblems, and encourages rebellion and the corruption of the clergy, pensioning those who have been punished by bishops or those living with women.

The law aims to detach the Portuguese church from Rome, the encyclical says in conclusion, and, therefore, the Pope condemns it as null, it having no value against the inviolable rights of the church.

LINK RIVER FISHING SEASON ENDS TODAY

Her condition is such that her ravings are said to be worse than those of any insane man's ever sent to the County Jail. The "Tongues of Fire" sect has been holding meetings in North La Grande for several months.

BOY'S SINGLE BULLET WOUNDS TWO LOVERS

TROY, N. Y., May 31.—Tura Lundstrum and his fiancée, Miss Betty Larsen, were practically shot by a single bullet while they were sitting under a tree at Snyder Lake, near here.

The shooting was done by a 12-year-old boy, who was returning from a woodchuck hunt. He had only one shot left in his gun, and he fired that at random.

Both his victims were wounded in the head. The young woman probably will die, but Lundstrum will recover.

DIAZ ON WAY TO OLD SPAIN

NO DEMONSTRATION OF ANY KIND MARKED THE DEPARTURE OF THE DEPOSED RULER FROM MEXICO

VERA CRUZ, May 31.—The Ypiranga, with ex-President Diaz aboard, sailed this afternoon for Spain. Diaz was surrounded by twenty officers, and was escorted to the steamer by a detachment of federal troops. There was no demonstration.

There are 70 idle prisoners ahead of Morris, and until they have all been placed at work, Morris' only duties will be to eat, sleep and take exercise in the "bull ring."

NEW MILWAUKEE TRAIN DITCHED DON FIRST TRIP

SPOKANE, May 30.—The Milwaukee railroad's new transcontinental limited, known as the "Columbia Express," in making its first eastward trip, was ditched at Lind, Washington, today. The engineer and fireman were both killed, according to advices received here. None of the passengers was injured, though the accident occurred when many of them were still in bed.

CONCERNING THE ORIGIN OF ARTESIAN WATER

Whence comes artesian water? It is believed by many persons that artesian water is stored up in the depths of the earth in great reservoirs, or exists as mysterious underground rivers which eventually find their way to the surface. It is true that the water is stored up in underground reservoirs, but not as popularly supposed. With the exception of a few caverns of comparatively small extent such reservoirs bear no relation to open basins of the surface type, but are as a rule rock strata or masses in which the only openings are spaces between the grains or along lines or solution, planes of jointing, cleavage, or bedding, or other fissures.

The probable source of underground waters has been widely discussed, and while every one would doubtless agree that by far the greater part is derived from rainfall, there is considerable variation of opinion

as to the relative importance of the other sources, such as seepage or absorption of water from the ocean, or the release of otherwise unavailable waters in the earth's crust which have been set free by physical or chemical exclusion.

Bulletin 319 of the United States Geological Survey, entitled "Summary of the Controlling Factors of the Artesian Flows," by Myron L. Fuller, discusses the subject of the theory and behavior of artesian wells. A copy may be obtained on application to the Director of the Survey at Washington.

USE BALLOON AS MEANS OF GETTING TO CHURCH

TOPSFIELD, Mass., May 31.—The balloon as a means of conveyance to church was utilized by Charles Glynn nad J. J. Van Valkenburg in a journey of twenty miles from Lowell to this town. The aeronauts made an early morning ascension, promising friends to land near a church and attend services. After floating with a west wind for an hour and a half two church spires were noted. The balloon was brought down three hundred feet from the Methodist Episcopal church at Topsfield.

The aeronauts waited until the hour of service and then joined the congregation. The pastor in his sermon referred to the fact that two of the congregation had dropped into the service from the skies.

WTY THEY KNEW THE REV. OLUTION WOULD SUCCEED

JAUREZ, May 31.—Gustave Madero made the following exclusive statement to the United Press:

"There was little need of fighting; all we had to do was to be ready to fight. The sincerity and power of Francisco Madero was in a moment fully understood in financial circles. Most of the leaders of the world's financial affairs knew months ago that the revolution was bound to succeed.

"When Limantour returned three months ago he stopped in New York, and discussed the financial situation with capitalists. While he apparently resided at the Plaza, he really spent most of his time at the Astor. At the room in the Astor the most effective work for the revolution was done. Father and I went to New York and secretly conferred three times with Limantour.

"We told him that we had great wealth behind us, and also proved to him that he would be conferring a blessing on his country and would avert bloodshed if he advised Diaz and the interests surrounding him that we would succeed. Limantour was fully persuaded that Diaz was doomed to defeat, and when he reached Mexico City he told the truth. This caused Diaz to lose hope and to surrender as unresistingly as possible."

KILLS RELATIVE OVER SCANDAL

SISTER-IN-LAW BOASTS OF INTIMACY WITH YOUNG SON, AND IS SHOT DEAD AS A RESULT OF THE DECLARATION

SAN FRANCISCO, May 31.—Lello Corvino today shot and killed his sister-in-law, Mrs. Johanna Corvino. He alleged that the woman, who is the wife of his brother, loved his 21-year-old son.

Corvino went to her home this morning to expostulate with her over her actions. He told the police that she admitted the attachment, and even boasted of her relations with the boy, saying that she would leave her husband and fly at the earliest opportunity.

The prisoner said that he usually carried a revolver, and angered at such a scandal in his own family, he shot the woman. Corvino and the woman were alone in the house at the time of the shooting.

SCIENTIST ASSUMES AN UNKNOWN GAS

BERLIN, May 30.—An interesting discovery has been made by Professor Alfred Wegener of the University of Marburg, who has already written treatises on the atmosphere.

He has come to the conclusion that at a height of 124 miles from the surface of the earth there exists a space filled with an unknown gas, which is lighter than hydrogen. He has not ascertained whether it is a simple chemical body of a combination. He calls it geokoronium.

SILVERTON, B. C. SWIFT BY FLAMES

SILVERTON, B. C., May 30.—As a result of a fire which broke out here today, five people are known to be dead. The Windsor Hotel and the Victoria Hotel, the leading hostleries, have been consumed by flames, and other buildings in the business section are burning.

CHINAMAN SLAYS MAN WHO SPOILED HIS SUGAR

PORTLAND, May 31.—Because he refused to pay 25 cents for a bowl of sugar, which he had spoiled by pouring a cup of tea into it, Carl Johnson, 19 years old, was shot and fatally wounded by Charley Moy, owner of a chop suey restaurant. Moy is held at the police station, charged with manslaughter. Johnson and two companions ordered chop suey and tea, and when the orders were served, instead of putting sugar in the tea, Johnson emptied the contents of the cup into the sugar bowl. This brought the proprietor, who demanded that Johnson pay 25 cents extra for the sugar he had destroyed. An argument resulted, and when Johnson raised his fist to strike, the Chinaman pulled a pistol and shot him through the temple.

STEALS METAL, SELLS IT TO REAL OWNER

VIENNA, May 30.—The exploits of an individual at Temesvar are so amazing that he has not only surpassed the famous Captain von Kopeck, but has made the German shoemaker a poor second in the act of daring. The Temesvar here engaged a gang of thirty workmen, went to a distillery which was closed, and instructed them to dismantle it. Following this exploit he demolished a fountain and then sold it with the distillery fittings for old metal. Next he turned his operations upon an avenue, and cut down all the trees and sold the wood to a carpenter. Then he vanished into space, and the good people of Temesvar are still in a state of ferment.
