

OFFICER SHOT; PRYCE MISSING

ABSENCE OF CHIEF FROM THE
REBEL CAMP AT TIA JUANA
HAS CAUSED NO LITTLE CON-
STERNATION DOWN THERE

SAN DIEGO, May 31.—According to a report received here this morning, Captain Francisco Visa, commander of the Mexican troops under General Pryce, was shot at sunrise. A court martial convicted him of shooting and killing an American in his command. The affair caused dis-sension in Pryce's command. The execution took place near Tia Juana.

General Pryce has left the camp, and it is reported that he had gone to Los Angeles to visit the junta. Captain Tamila has been appointed commander in his absence. Visa demanded that Mexicans form the firing squad. He said he was friendly to the white men, and did not want them to kill him. He was led to the hills outside of Tia Juana at sunrise, five Mexicans forming the firing squad.

Visa taunted the frlers, saying that they had hidden in the streets during the time of battle. His body was left lying where it fell, no person touching it.

The flight of Pryce has caused consternation in the rebel ranks, but there were no deserters today.

MANY IMPROVEMENTS AT UPPER LAKE RESORTS

Mrs. Griffith can well be proud of her culinary department, as it is the talk of tourists and sportsmen from San Francisco to Puget Sound.

Charles Wilson has had all of his rowboats freshly painted and ready for the coming throngs. New buildings have been erected at Rocky Point and about three miles of fine road has been built by Mr. Wilson this spring, to permit the automobiles of the Crater Lake company to go direct to the Klamath landing, where passengers will be taken to view the eighth wonder of the world (Crater Lake). This beautiful body of water, situated in the crater of Mount Mazama, will be visited by hundreds of tourists this season, and is a spot Klamath Falls can boast of as being one of the most beautiful sights one would wish to behold.

The steamer Klamath has been thoroughly overhauled this season by Captain Reed, and she is now ready for the traveling public. She has an oil burning plant, which has been installed at a cost of several hundred dollars, making her the fastest and most up-to-date passenger boat on Upper Klamath Lake.

She will run Sunday excursions every Sunday the rest of the summer to Rocky Point and Eagle Ridge, stopping three and a half hours at Rocky Point to permit of fishing, boating or other pastimes for which this resort is famous.

The automobiles of the Crater Lake company will begin making daily trips to the crater about July 1st, or sooner if the snow disappears, so that traveling can be made in comfort.

A number of passengers came down from Eagle Ridge, among them being Mr. M. R. Titcomb and family. Mr. Titcomb is the district engineer of the Southern Pacific company.

Robert Clay and Mrs. Wing of Woodbine came down for a few days. Both Mr. Clay and Mrs. Wing have fine homesteads at Woodbine, and are making numerous improvements on them this spring.

MADERO JUBILANT;
TO START SOUTH SOON

MEXICO CITY, May 26.—De La Barra was today sworn in in the Yellow Parlor of the national palace, pledged to rule only until order is restored and a president and vice president are popularly elected. The city is tranquil, and Madero is acclaimed as a savior.

Word is awaited from General Figueroa and Miranda, controlling Cuernavaca. It is expected that they

will come here when Madero arrives. De La Barra has issued a proclamation that he is not a candidate for president or vice president.

Diaz's condition is reported as very grave, and his intimate associates virtually admit that his recovery may not be sufficient to permit leaving the country. The unchecked jubilation over his resignation is reported to have depressed Diaz.

Madero Makes Statement

EL PASO, May 26.—Madero jubilant over his success, made the statement to the United Press that "Diaz is gone, and from their backs the Mexican people are removing the heaviest burden they have ever bore. I will go to Mexico City in seven or eight days. I have already sent Frederico Garza, Pino Suarez and Manuel Uruquid to the capital to arrange for my coming.

"I, too, shall resign. I am no longer provisional president of Mexico, only a citizen, ready to aid the reconstruction of my country. If the people want me, I shall run for the presidency at the new election, which is to be ordered by the president pro tem, De La Barra."

FLOATING POPULATION STRIKES BERRY FIELDS

HOOD RIVER, May 26.—The cosmopolitan floating population that makes Hood River county its home during the berry picking season is beginning to arrive. Many Indians come here from the Yakima reservation. The squaws apparently are the only workers. The bucks spend the money, however, and the moving picture shows, of which they are fond, reap a harvest. At the height of the berry season it is estimated that there are as many as 500 Indians in the county.

All classes of people are represented among the pickers. The poorer classes from Portland often make the occasion a kind of self-sustaining outing. Tramps suspend the regulations of their society, and earn a little money. This city is at present experiencing the unpleasantness of an epidemic of hoboos. The "jungsles" along the Columbia afford them a convenient retreat, and the city authorities have a difficult task keeping them moving.

CHICAGO SWELTERS UNDER THE VERY HOTTEST MAY DAY

CHICAGO, May 26.—Four deaths and a score of prostrations were reported up to noon. No relief is visible. It is predicted that today will be hotter than yesterday, and that it will be the hottest May day since the weather bureau was organized. The temperature is 94 1/2, and the humidity is intense.

THINK TOBACCO TRUST WILL DELAY LONG BEFORE DISSOLVING

WASHINGTON, May 30.—In its tobacco decision the United States supreme court has laid the basis for criminal prosecutions of individuals creating the monopoly, and in the strongest language the court urged such prosecution.

This is the construction placed on the phrases recurring throughout Chief Justice White's opinion.

If the court had merely affirmed the decrees of the court below and ordered a dissolution, criminal suits would be barred, but it reversed the judgment, and held directors and officers as parties to a conspiracy, and significantly referred to the manifestation as "conscious wrongdoing."

Lawyers construe this as an intimation that it is the government's duty to proceed with criminal prosecution. It is expected that the decision will force another year of litigation before the trust is finally dissolved.

The American Tobacco company and its subsidiary companies is probably the most versatile octopus of modern business trusts. It involves sixty-six corporations carrying on every conceivable business connected with the tobacco industry, and twenty-nine individuals.

Companies for the manufacture of cigars, cigarettes, chewing tobacco, snuff, licorice, pipes, cigar boxes, tin foil, vending machines, stationery, signs, stogies, and corporations for the purchase and holding of tobacco properties in Cuba and Porto Rico are the component parts of the combine.

It was first attacked by the government in the suit filed before the circuit court of the Southern District of New York on July 10, 1907. A monster complaint covering several hundred closely printed pages, and embodying the work of several years of collection of evidence by department of justice agents, recited that the "trust" had been formed by a coalition of five cigarette companies in 1890, and had gradually grown in power through unfair competitive methods, until it dominated the tobacco world.

It was alleged that by a co-operative arrangement with foreign trusts, the American combine apportioned the tobacco business of the world; that it manipulated markets to suit its own purposes; controlled pseudo "independent" companies—concerns that advertised themselves as "not in the trust," when they were absolutely owned by the combine—that it imitated standard independent brands and absorbed or destroyed competition by price cutting.

As in the Standard Oil case, the tobacco litigation went to a master for the taking of testimony. Nearly a year was consumed in this task. It was on November 7, 1909, that the lower court rendered its opinion, partially upholding the government's contentions. It adjudged the tobacco combine a "trust in restraint of trade," but it dismissed as not proved the complaint against the United Cigar stores company and the foreign tobacco monopolies. The government charged that the United Cigar Stores company was the retail outlet for the vast business of the combine, and that although the foreign companies were doing their principal business abroad, they also operated in the United States.

Both the Tobacco company and the government appealed from the decisions—the former seeking to have the entire decision set aside, and the government in the hope of having it affirmed and strengthened by the inclusion of other companies.

The appeal was heard by the supreme court last spring, but only seven of the nine members of the bench being present, was ordered re-argued. The new argument was made beginning January 4th, and covered five whole days. Attorney J. C. McReynolds, who has been associated with the case since its inception, and Attorney General Wickersham appeared for the government. DeLancey Nicoll, John G. Johnson, W. B. Hornblower and others argued for the tobacco company.

SAYS DYNAMITE WAS FOR BURGLARS

SAN FRANCISCO, May 30.—Chas. Pickard, of Oakland, who surrendered to the police today, said that he made the burglar trap which blew up his home yesterday, injuring several officers. He said that shortly before his wife left, burglars entered the home, and he desired to give them a hot reception. He placed a revolver in such a position that upon opening the door it discharged a blank cartridge, which ignited a trail of loose powder leading to a can of black powder. He said that he was sorry because the officers were there, but that they had no business to attempt to open the closet protected by this trap. He also admitted making the other bombs found in the home, and said that he did it just to kill time.

PELICAN BAY LUMBER COMPANY TO BUILD ROAD ALONG UPPER LAKE

Within thirty days work will commence on the construction of the first logging road to operate in the timber on the shores of the Upper Klamath Lake. The road is to be built and operated by the Pelican Bay Lumber company, which recently incorporated with a capital stock of \$150,000. The company has purchased 103,000,000 feet of timber, situated in the Cascade forest reserve near Pelican Bay on the Upper Klamath Lake. The company will begin logging this summer, and will build about three miles of track this year. Donkey engines and cable will probably be used in yarding the logs, which will be hauled on cars to the lake.

The dredge will soon begin work on a big ditch about half a mile long, in which the logs will be dumped and stored as they are brought from the woods.

Work on the foundation for the mill at Hanks at the lower end of the lake is far advanced. The company has acquired sixty-three acres at this point, to be used as a mill site and yards, and early in August they expect to have in operation one of the most modern saw mill plants on the coast. The mill will be operated in two shifts of ten hours each, and will have a capacity of 180,000 feet every day. The machinery will be furnished by the Murray Manufacturing company of Wausau, Wis., with the exception of the saws, which will be the famous McDonough band, manufactured at the McDonough foundry at Eau Claire, Wis.

One novel feature of the plant is what is probably the largest privately owned canal in the country, which the company will use for the storage of logs at the mill. This canal is fifty feet wide at the lake front and ninety feet wide at the mill, and is 1,600 feet long. It is estimated that it will be able to accommodate 3,000,000 feet of logs at one time. Tracks from the Southern Pacific line have been constructed to the mill, and after the lumber has been yard dried it will be loaded onto cars and shipped east. Most all of the upper grades will be marketed in Kansas City.

The company now owns sufficient timber to run the mills for more than five years, but they expect to buy large quantities in addition. Some of the men identified with the company already own large tracts of timber in Klamath county, and they figure on a continuous operation for twenty-five years at least.

The officers of the Pelican Bay Lumber company are all big men financially, and well known throughout the United States by the big lumber interests. Harold Mortenson is president, W. P. Johnson vice president, and G. D. Hauptman, secretary and treasurer. In addition the directorate includes Jacob Mortenson of Chicago, and S. M. Hauptman of San Francisco.

Albert E. Gilbert, formerly of Portland, is the superintendent of the plant. Mr. Gilbert has been connected with the Hauptman interests in their plant at Aberdeen, Wash., and is a practical lumberman from start to finish. He will have charge of the operations of the company. The management of the business will be divided between Mr. Mortenson and Mr. Hauptman, as on account of other heavy interests they both will not be able to be here all the time.

In addition to the Pelican Bay Lumber company, Mr. Hauptman, who is here at the present time, is heavily interested in something like six other big lumber concerns, operating in Eureka and San Francisco, Cal., Portland, Ore.; South Bend and Seattle, Wash. He was first educated in the lumber business in Saginaw, Mich., his former home, and is well known in the lumber world of Chicago, St. Paul, Minneapolis, Kansas City and the large cities on the coast.
