

WIDOW TO GIVE BIG UNIVERSITY

**RAILROAD MAGNATE'S MILLIONS
WILL BE FREELY SPENT ON IN-
STITUTION—CALIFORNIA LIKE-
LY LOCATION.**

NEW YORK, May 29.—Mrs. E. H. Harriman, America's richest woman, is to be the founder of a great university in the West as a glorious monument to the memory of her husband.

It became known that Mrs. Harriman, casting about for some means of disbursing her great fortune in a way that would be of benefit to the people of the country, had decided upon the establishment of an institution of learning as affording the best medium for such disbursement. Her plans are not fully developed, but in a tentative way she has decided to found a university that will be second to none in the country in the point of curriculum and endowment.

Millions as needed will be supplied from the Harriman estate to make this the greatest educational enterprise in the world.

The institution will be called the Edward H. Harriman University. Speculation as to the exact location of the Harriman University favors Southern California. Mrs. Harriman has not divulged her plans in this respect, except to say that the institution will be on the Pacific Coast.

It has been assumed that either Nevada or California would stand the best chance of securing the great foundation, but this is only conjecture.

OREGON STATE NEWS

PORTLAND, May 29.—Portland will be pretty much given up to its Rose Festival for the next ten days. Business affairs will be relegated to the background quite generally, and the queen flower will rule with undisputed sway.

This year's spectacle promises to set a new mark, with better displays, more gorgeous pageants and better decorations of city streets and buildings than ever before. Other Oregon cities will participate to a larger extent than formerly and out-of-town people have announced their intention of coming in large numbers.

The city delegation will distract attention to some extent from the festival on June 5th, opening day, but with that out of the way the remainder of the week will be given up to enjoyment. Portland rose gardens promise to produce a wealth of perfect blooms next week.

Members of the Esperanto Association of the Pacific Northwest will gather at the Portland Commercial Club for a grand rally July 19-21. A big attendance is expected from Oregon and Washington particularly, while other states will be well represented. The association is now one year old. At least twenty-five of the leading cities of this state will have regular Esperanto classes. On June 4, local Esperantists will hold a picnic at Tualatin.

A systematic campaign for German immigrants has been outlined by the Commercial Club, acting with the German speaking societies of Oregon. A conference on the subject was held recently, and in future more attention will be paid to securing this immigration.

Dayton has been presented with historic Fort Sheridan by the government, and the old structure will be removed to the Dayton city park. The old blockhouse is an interesting relic of the days when the pioneers were subduing the wilderness.

Baker and Oregon City are two places that will have postal savings banks, such institutions already started in this state having proved highly successful. The postmaster general has designated these cities as depositories, and they will begin operations at once.

Oregon's importance as a fruit-growing state can be better understood from the figures in the biennial report of the Oregon State Board of Horticulture, lately issued. President W. K. Newell places the total valuation of last year's fruit crop at \$6,662,500. Apples lead the list with a value of \$2,500,000, and dried prunes stand second in importance, with a value of \$1,680,000.

An interurban railway from Baker through the Powder River Valley to Haines and North Powder is a project dear to the heart of the Baker Commercial Club, and efforts will be

directed on work to bring about this scheme during the coming few months. The projected line would open up a remarkably fertile country, as well as give access to much timber wealth.

GAVE WOOD ALCOHOL TO BABY, JUST FOR FUN

SPOKANE, Wash., May 26.—"Just to see what baby would do," little Eldon Beck, two and a half years old, poured wood alcohol down the throat of his nine-months-old sister. The mother, Mrs. A. C. Beck, had left the children in the kitchen while she was in another part of the house, and little Eldon, tiring of "minding the baby," saw in the bottle a new diversion. He seized it and gave the infant a drink. The cries of the little one brought the mother in haste, and a call was sent for half a dozen doctors. Soon antidotes had followed the deadly drug down the throat of the babe with such good results that its recovery is expected.

DARROW PREPARES FOR GREAT DEFENSE

LOS ANGELES, May 26.—Attorney Darrow today began active preparation for John McNamara's trial. He plunged into work at the office of Job Harriman, familiarizing himself with the California code, so as to be ready to take advantage of every point. He refused to say anything definite about whatever has been planned, saying that he was endeavoring to find out how the people of Los Angeles feel regarding the case.

At present Darrow is planning the defense for the preliminary hearing, which has been set for June 1st. He admitted that it was probably that he would attack the validity of the indictments, and seek to quash them.

HORSE STEALER TAKEN UP NORTH

Hugo Albright, the youth who stole a watch from his roommate and pawned it, and then stole a horse from the reclamation service, was brought before United States Commissioner R. M. Richardson Friday afternoon on the latter charge.

Richardson bound the prisoner over to the federal court in the sum of \$1,000. Albright waived examination and left on the train Friday for Portland, in custody of Deputy United States Marshal Hamlin.

The horse was taken Saturday night from the stable of Fritz Keihl, who keeps the gates of the canal at Shippington. Albright was arrested at Kenby by Deputy Sheriff Harry Pearson Sunday.

Martin Sr. Is Here

Alex Martin Sr. arrived in the city Saturday evening from his home in Oakland, Calif., looking as hale and hearty as ever. It is over two years since Mr. Martin has been able to visit Klamath Falls, and he was hardly prepared for the great change which has taken place in the city during his absence. Mr. Martin will visit here for several weeks. Yesterday he took a ride around the city with his son, Alex Martin Jr., in the latter's automobile, to note the growth which has taken place in the past two years. Mr. Martin has no objections to the auto, but he is just as much a lover of a good horse as ever.

Are Here to Invest

Otto Kuttouc and his brother Fred are in Klamath Falls with a view to investing. They come from Humboldt, Neb., The former is a prominent banker, and has achieved considerable notoriety as the baby member of the Nebraska State House of Representatives, from Bryan's home country. He was one of the leaders in the fight which beat Mr. Bryan in his entrenched position on the county option movement, which is another name for prohibition. They are being entertained here by Dr. Cooper.

Goes to Kansas

City Superintendent R. H. Dunbar of the public schools left Sunday morning for Kansas, where he will meet his father, and together they will go to Delta, Ohio. Mr. Dunbar expects to be absent about a month. Mrs. Dunbar and son, Fred, will leave next week, after the close of high school, for Portland for the summer.

Return From California

Harry L. Pitzer, lessee of the Baldwin cafe, arrived in this city Sunday night from San Francisco, accompanied by Mrs. Pitzer, who is much improved in health since she went to California several months ago for medical treatment. Mr. Pitzer will at once assume charge of the cafe, and conduct it along first class lines.

Another Concrete Walk

Frank Roberts has taken the contract to lay a concrete sidewalk for W. S. Slough in front of the latter's property on the south side of Main, between Fifth and Sixth streets. The material for the work is on the ground now.

TROUT LAKE CANAL READY NEXT MONTH

TROUT LAKE, May 29.—Work on the Trout Lake Power & Irrigation Company's ditch will be completed by June 10, when water will be turned in to give the land below Guler irrigation. This ditch is one of the largest in the Valley and will furnish water for many ranchers not now under the ditch. Workmen are engaged in the completion of 800 feet of flume, to carry water from the dam to the canal below. When completed the canal will be about five miles long and will be probably extended later.

The Lost Creek Water Association contemplates improving its ditches and laterals before the dry season begins, by enlarging the main canal and turning all of Lost Creek into it. Lost Creek rises in Skamania County, runs above ground a short distance, then sinks. Where it comes up again it is in Klickitat County, and is utilized by local irrigators.

The Government gave local people the right to take the water from Lost Creek for irrigation purposes. This canal carries water past Ice Cave, but trouble has been experienced in the past by the water finding its way into caverns on route. This leakage will be prevented by cementing the various fissures and saving some water to be used in the settlement. The water comes a distance of 14 miles, a gravity system being afforded settlers in the valley.

PRODUCTION OF SANSTONE SHOWS A GREAT INCREASE

WASHINGTON, May 29.—The value of the production of sandstone increased from \$7,594,091 in 1908 to \$8,610,454 in 1909, according to figures compiled by Ernest F. Burchard, of the United States Geological Survey. The three greatest producing States were Ohio, \$1,639,006; Pennsylvania, \$1,637,794; and New York \$1,430,830. No other State produced sandstone to the value of half a million dollars. In 1909 both Ohio and Pennsylvania increased their output over that of 1908, but New York's production showed a decrease.

COMMISSIONERS WILL VISIT KLAMATH FALLS

State Fish and Game Commissioner C. F. Stone returned to this city Saturday evening from Salem, where he attended the meeting of the commission, and he stated that July 6th the members of the commission will be here to look over the trout hatchery question. Mr. Stone is positive that the hatchery will be established, once the body looks over the field.

NEVADA INDIANS DON WAR PAINT

RENO, Nev., May 26.—Eager to revenge the killing last February of Red Mike's band, which murdered four stockmen, a large band of Shoshone bucks are going on the war path near Lion Rock canyon, 150 miles from Reno.

A band of Indians from the Duck Valley reservation who are camped near Soldiers Meadow are holding a war dance. Couriers are out warning the settlers.

JACKSON COUNTY MAN WAS WELL KNOWN HERE

Word was received here last Friday morning of the death of G. P. Lindley at Medford from dropsy of the heart. Mr. Lindley, who was a pioneer of the Rogue River Valley, was known in local financial circles, as he was vice president of the First Trust and Savings bank, and one of the organizers of the First National bank. He was also an officer in the Jackson County bank at Medford.

'FRISCO DOES NOT GET OLYMPIC GAMES IN 1915

NEW YORK, May 27.—James E. Sullivan, secretary of the American Athletic Union, cabled yesterday from Budapest that the Olympic commission has awarded the 1916 Olympic games to Berlin. San Francisco's offer to hold the Olympic games in 1915 was rejected.

CRUSHER BREAKS DOWN; PAVING IS SUSPENDED

On account of a breakdown at the sick crusher on the west side of the river, the Strange-Maguire Paving company has suspended operations on Main street. They expect to have the machinery repaired and to commence work again Monday.

FIVE KILLED IN COLLISION OF AUTOMOBILE WITH CAR

LOS ANGELES, May 29.—Hazel Kaufman, aged six years, is the sole survivor of an auto party of six, whose machine was run down near Whittier by a Los Angeles-Pacific electric car. She has a chance to recover, despite the fact that she is suffering from a compound fracture of the skull, her eye is torn from the socket, and both arms are broken.

The five killed instantly were Jos. Kaufman, his wife and son Harry, aged 9 years, and Harold Hollingsworth and his wife.

The force of the impact was most terrific, and the dead were all instantly killed. The machine was smashed to fragments.

The Kaufmans came here from Cedar Edge, Colo., and the Hollingsworths were from Denver a fortnight ago.

Motorman Linda, who had charge of the electric car, has been arrested. An inquest will be held Thursday.
