### STUDENTS' PLAY ENJOYED BY ALL

"The Devil takes good care of his own," is a saying that has been passed out for lo, these many years, by the herried ones when the stories of the miraculous escapes of some of the young rascals are told, and those who were at the Senior play Tuesday night at the opera house found out that the old saw still holds good, for "The Devil's Disciple" escaped hanging after he had mounted the gallows, first, because George Bernard Shaw, who wrote the play, intended it to be so; second, because his satanic majesty himself seemed to think it necessary to step in.

In the closing scene of the play three minutes before the fatal noon hour, when the Disciple was to have been launched into eternity, the rope which was to have encircled his neck gave way, and two minutes before 12 something went wrong in the power house, and the theater was in darkness, as was the whole city. The students proved equal to the occasion, and lighted candles for footlights, and the play went on. Even then, the disciple did not hang, for the minister he had impersonated came in and made known his identity.

The play was a three act drama of Revolutionary times in six scenes, and was very creditably produced by the students. There were several places where real dramatic talent was called for, and the Seniors always rose to the occasion. The work of the women in the play was excellent, and too much cannot be said of Myra Carter as Mrs. Dudgeon, Roxa Shive as Mrs. Anderson and Jessie Telford as Essie. In the title role Wilbur Telford demonstrated some real histrionic talent, as did Horace Cox as Rev. Anderson, the fighting minister. These two were assigned the most difficult roles in the bill, and did much toward making the production a success.

While their parts were not as strong nor as prominent, John Siemens as General Burgoyne, a gentlemanly officer, Jack Edwards as Major Swindon, a stickler for military discipline, Roy Nelson as the sergeant and Virgil De Lap in two minor parts, all did good acting, and carried out their parts in a realistic manner. The High School orchestra, under the leadership of Prof. Wirtz, rendered splendid music.

## FIRE IN EWAUNA HOUSE TUESDAY

### QUICK WORK ON THE PART OF THE FIRE DEPARTMENT SAVES THE BUILDING FROM TOTAL DESTRUCTION

At 2:15 p. m. Tuesday fire was discovered in the Ewauna house on the corner of Main and Fourth streets. Before the alarm was turned in flames were issuing from the rear of the building and heavy smoke was coming from the windows of the upper story. At first it was believed that there was not a hope of saving the building from total destruction, yet within eleven minutes from the sounding of the firebell water had been turned off and the fire practically extinguished. It was some time later, however, before the fire boys had cut through the partitions and put out the fire smoldering between the ceiling and roof.

The building is owned by Frank Ward, and was insured for something like \$1,500, which is sufficient to cover the damage to the building. It was occupied by Mrs. Bogardus as a rooming house, and her loss will be about \$300, as no insurance was carried.

It is not known how the fire originated, but it is presumed that it started from the kitchen stove. Mr. Bogardus was in the court house yard at the time, attending the memorial services. She believes that possibly fire still remained in the stove since the noon meal was prepared. There was no other fire in the building during the day.

Mrs. Bogardus lost all her personal effects, even to her clothes, as they lived in the room in the rear of the building adjoining the kitchen. It is hard to estimate the loss to Mr. Ward, as on account of the building being located within the fire limits, it may be impossible to repair the damages. This matter cannot be determined until after the debris is removed, as the necessary repairs may not be of sufficient importance to interfere with the fire ordinance. In that case the damage will not be so great, as the greater portion of the furniture, owned by Mr. Ward, was removed with comparatively slight damage.

## MEMORY OF DEAD HEROES OBSERVED

### GRAND ARMY RELIEF CORPS, VETERANS, LODGES AND CITIZENS UNITED TO MAKE THE OBSERVANCE MEMORABLE

The observance of Memorial Day in this city Tuesday was one of the most fitting exercises held in any city in Oregon, and the members of the various committees in charge have a right to feel justly proud of the success of their commendable efforts. Every business house in the town closed, and schools, churches and lodges united with the veterans in the services in memory of those who fought and died for their country's cause.

At 10 o'clock that morning Officer of the Day E. B. Ramsby, with Sheriff W. B. Barnes as aide and Percival Sholl as musician, started the parade for the cemetery. The parade was led by the splendid Klamath Falls Military band, and included in the line of march were the Grand Army, Women's Relief Corps, Indian War Veterans, Spanish War Veterans, Veterans of other wars, Sons of Veterans, Grammar School Cadets, Pioneers of Klamath Basin, children from the public schools and members of the following fraternal orders: Woodmen of the World, Knights of Pythias, Women of Woodcraft, Pythian Sisters, Odd Fellows and Rebekahs.

Arriving at the cemetery, the impressive ritualistic services of the Grand Army of the Republic and of the Women's Relief Corps were held, and the graves of the soldiers were decorated. The cemetery, thanks to the work of O. A. Stearns and his assistants, looked very presentable.

After returning from the cemetery the Grand Army, Women's Relief Corps and Indian War Veterans marched to the Link River bridge, where the services in memory of the dead sailors were held, and flowers were cast upon the water.

A large crowd gathered in the court house square at 2 o'clock in the afternoon to hear the exercises, the program of which follows:

### PARK COMMISSIONERS HOLD MEETING SOON

In accordance with the vote of the people at the last city election in favor of the appointment of a park commission for Klamath Falls, Circuit Judge Benson has appointed the following commissioners: Dr. C. V. Fisher, Judge George T. Baldwin, Frank Ira White, Rufus S. Moore and Alex Martin Jr. In addition to these Mayor Fred T. Sanderson and City Engineer Don J. Zumwalt are ex-officio members.

Mayor Sanderson has announced that a meeting of the commission will be called within a few days. At that time the work of electing officers and in other ways effecting organization, will be taken up. The plans of the commission will also be outlined, and some course of action decided upon.

The park commission was created by the state legislature a few years ago, and the people of a town, when they vote for such a commission, give them full power to select a suitable site and to arrange for the payment for the same.
