TRUST AND TREATY COMBINED IN SPEECH

CHICAGO, June 3.—At the noon meeting of the Western Economic Society here, P. V. Collins of Minneapolis, publisher of the Northwestern Agriculturalist, spoke to some length, charging the steel trust with manipulating the tariff legislation for the purpose of increasing dividends at the cost of the impoverishment of the American farmers.

The speaker included Henry Taft as the steel trust advisor in his charges. He also said that Jim Hill and the steel trust politicians are seeking to exploit the people shamelessly and dangerously.

As a reward for promoting reciprocity, he asserted, certain politicians will receive future favors. Certain lawyers, he said, identified with the government will receive emoluments in dividends.

VISALIA, Calif., June 3.—A. V. Mattos, a rancher living near Tulare, was killed by a Santa Fe passenger train this morning at the city limits of Tulare. The train was going forty miles an hour, when Mattos drove on the tracks in front of it. He was thrown at least fifty feet and his head was crushed. THINGS LIVELY AT THE FORT

BUSINESS DIRECTORY IN PREPARATION — BASEBALL AND BOXING KEEP THE SPORTING FRATERNITY AGOG

Fort Klamath from now on will get in line with the progressive districts of Southern Oregon. The Fort will get on the map, as it were. Arrangements are being made with the advertising man by which a business directory of the business manufacturing and other interests of the Fort will be kept before the public by a display advertisement in all of the local papers of Klamath Falls, and all the events of interest published locally at Klamath Falls and by the Associated Press service throughout the country.

The people of the Fort are making a move in the right direction, and will be benefitted by their wise move.

The Crater Lake National Park will be opened up for the tourists before long. All the roads leading to it pass through the Fort. A little publicity will give the travelers some idea of what the Fort is, and what is doing there, and in many other ways Fort Klamath will become better known throughout the land.

The baseball team got back from Klamath Falls somewhat tired, perhaps, accepting defeat gracefully, but determined to win from Klamath Falls in the big game which takes place at the Fort diamond on the 18th. The Indians are coming up to assault the fans about 200 strong, and it is the opinion of the team and their backers, that with playing on their own grounds, with the continual practice they are taking now and with the warlike whoops of their allies from the Agency, the show for Klamath Falls to win is very slight. In fact, there is money among the backers of the Fort team to say that they will be easy victors.

The Fourth of July will be celebrated by fireworks and many other ways. Walter Reed, the Fort Klamath "white hope," and J. D. Stenson are to meet in a twenty-round boxing contest. As a preliminary Willis, the catcher of the Fort baseball team, is challenging "Roughhouse" Burns for a ten-round contest, offering to make a \$250 side bet, weight to be 122 pounds, ringside. In the event of Burns not accepting, Mr. Willis leaves it open to any other 122-pound man on the Pacific Coast.

The Fort Klamath baseball team will play the Agency next Sunday at the Fort. The Agency team has been greatly strengthened by the addition of several outsiders.

Austin Corbin and E. Edgell, bankers of New York city, accompanied by Frank Frazier, Emmett Barkadell, J. B. Spencer, E. J. Reddy and John Young, reckoned among the men of wealth who have made the city of Medford famous, came into the Fort Sunday evening last and left Monday morning in their big automobile for Crater Lake, their intention being to ride as far as possible and then walk. They left their machine within about three miles of Arant Camp, and then proceeded with their trip, which will not soon be forgotten. Frank Frazier found the traveling so bad that he returned to his machine before arriving at Arant Camp, and waited for the rest of the party till after 7 o'clock. As the hours went by and his party failed to appear he secured a search party to leave the Fort after midnight, thinking that something must have happened to them. At 2 a. m., however, the party arrived, ending the suspense and allaying the fears that another catastrophe had occurred at Crater Lake. It would take a longer volume to relate the many hardships and hair-breadth escapes that the party encountered, mashing the soft snow, tumbling over mountains of ice, crossing streams of water and all other details that almost prevented them from viewing the eighth great wonder of the world. The party will proceed to Medford, via Klamath Falls, today, soon to return again to Crater Lake when the snow has disappeared.
