

STONE SUMS UP SCREEN QUESTION

FISH AND GAME COMMISSIONER SAYS THOUSANDS OF FISH MEET DEATH BY ENTERING BIG IRRIGATION CANAL

Deputy Game Warden L. Alva Lewis has served notice on the local office of the reclamation service, asking that proper screens be placed at the intake of the main irrigation canal within thirty days' time to prevent fish from getting into the big ditch and going to certain death by this means.

"There is no disposition on the part of the district attorney or state fish game commission," said State Game Commissioner Charles F. Stone today in summing up the situation, "to get in a quarrel with the reclamation service, but as things stand at the present time more trout are being destroyed through the lack of proper screens at the intake of the main canal than from any other agency in the county or state."

"It is only necessary for one to inspect a section of the main canal to see the number of small trout along its course. When a trout goes into the ditches it means certain destruction. A great many of the fish are carried on into the laterals, and people report to me of finding hundreds of small fish on their alfalfa fields. From this you may easily see the absurdity of watching for the angler or trying to protect the trout from the average loss as a result of fishing out of season, when thousands of trout are lost by lack of proper protection on the part of the reclamation service."

"It would appear that the government should be more particular in this matter. Its officers are usually prompt to arrest people who are violating the law, and it is certainly not unreasonable to expect them to comply with a plain provision of the statute. It has been stated by high officials of the reclamation service that the law would not apply to the matter of screens for the reclamation ditches, but it seems unreasonable that the government would raise any such a provision or attempt to test the law in a matter of such vital importance."

"However, we have given the reclamation service office notice to properly screen the intake of the large ditch, and we feel certain that this will be attended to promptly. Of course, if it is not, we will prosecute all persons who may be responsible for the destruction of fish by this agency."
