

JOHN BULL ASKS FOR AN APOLOGY

REPORTS OF "TRUTH" AND AMERICAN ENGINEER ON ATROCITIES IN SOUTH AMERICA ARE DECLARED TRUTHFUL

LONDON, June 26.—Practically declaring as true the reports of horrible atrocities perpetrated in the rubber country of Peru, Ecuador and Columbia, the British government has asked the Peruvian legation in London to apologize to "Truth," a weekly newspaper, and W. E. Hardenberg, an American railroad engineer, for having accused them of participation in a scheme to blackmail the Peruvian Amazon company, with headquarters in London.

"Truth" had printed statements by Hradenberg in which he described conditions existing in the company's rubber territory as worse than those found in the Congo. The foreign office has told the Peruvian legation that unless it does apologize relations between it and the British government will not be friendly. The truth of Hardenberg's charges were proven by Consul General Max Casement, the British representative in Brazil, who penetrated into the rubber country, known to rubber collectors as "the Devil's Paradise." Casement found that the rubber collectors had committed the most horrible crimes. He asserted:

That they reduced the natives to a condition worse than formal slavery;

That they made them work without pay;

That they stole their crops;

That they stole their women and children to satisfy their own passions and avarice;

That they sold the natives into slavery, wholesale and retail;

That they flogged men and women until their bones were laid bare;

That the victims were left without medical attention, eaten by maggots, until they died, when their bodies were thrown to the dogs;

That they mutilated by cutting off ears, fingers, arms and legs;

That they tortured by water, fire and crucifixion with the head downward;

That they chopped victims to pieces with machetes;

That they soured their victims in kerosene and lighted them to form living torches.

According to the latest advices the Peruvian government has promised to do all in its power to put an end to barbarities in the "British-owned Congo." Soldiers have been sent to the camps only to find that the worst offenders among the rubber collectors have fled.

The attitude of the foreign office here suggests that it intends to keep the Peruvian government to its task.

PICTURE MACHINES FOR WARDS OF THE STATE

SALEM, June 24.—Apparently laboring under the impression that the state of Oregon is intending to provide an up-to-date motion picture show in all of the state institutions for the benefit of the inmates, picture machine firms in all parts of the country are writing to Secretary of State Olcott asking for the privilege of bidding on the contract to install outfits. Although provisions have been made to install picture machines in the reform school and the state insane asylum, it has no intention of equipping all the institutions with this amusement device, and the secretary is so informing the bidders.

The board had nothing to do with installing the two picture machines other than to recommend and suggest that the members of the different fraternal societies interest themselves in the entertainment of the inmates of the asylum and reform school, and the Woodmen of the World and the United Artisans orders contributed a new piano and the machines as gifts to the inmates.

MORE KLAMATH INDIANS ARE UP-OVER MARRIAGES

PORTLAND, June 23.—Can the Indians marry according to their tribal customs, which is simplicity itself, or must they be married white-man fashion? This is a problem for the federal court to decide. The government objects to the marriages of Joseph Jackson and Lou Wilson and John Cole and Ellen Parazoo, Klamath Indians, and is desirous of trying them on a serious charge. Attorney John H. Stevenson protests and contends that the Indians have a right to marry according to their own customs, and that the United States government has no authority to interfere in the work of Cupid as conducted among the aborigines. Monday the quartet of defendants will have to enter a plea.

ECONOMY IS THE PLEA FOR CHANGES IN ARMY

WASHINGTON, June 24.—The first meeting of the senate military committee to investigate changes in departments was held today.

General Murray, assistant chief of staff, contended the proposed change would make thirty-one officers now at department headquarters available for duty with their commands, and would effect a saving in clerical expenses and permit supplies to be bought in cheaper markets.

He asserted there was no opposition to the changes in the war department which sought to place the army on the most economical basis possible. The hearing will be continued next Tuesday.

STILL NO CLUETO THE ROBBERS

CHICO, Calif., June 24.—Great mystery still surrounds the identity of the robbers who took every cent from the Stirling City Bank. A search of the woods on both sides of the track for thirty-five miles, between Chico and Stirling City does not show any sign of the hand car. The team and wagon which drove to the bank to get the swag, has also disappeared.

Among the loot was a \$700 diamond belonging to W. P. Lynch, an official of the bank, and \$1,000 in Los Angeles school bonds. A Bankers' Association detective is expected today. The value of the loot will reach \$9,000.

LUMBER TRIALS WILL COME UP IN NOVEMBER

CHICAGO, July 24.—The lumbermen will be tried before Judge Landis in November. Those indicted will be permitted to surrender to the federal marshals of their districts, who will be furnished with certified copies of the indictments. They will be arraigned before the federal commissioners, and will be permitted to secure bonds.

MORE UNITED MINERS ORDERED ARRESTED

DENVER, June 24.—Judge Whitford has ordered the arrest of eleven more United Miners on a charge of violating an injunction preventing interference with strikebreakers in the Northern coal fields. They are held under bonds to appear June 29th.
