JUDGE CHILDS TALKS ON HARBOR IMPROVEMENT

Judge John L. Childs, of Del Norte county, one of California's most progressive and enlightened citizens, is on a visit to Klamath Falls, Sunday and Saturday he was the guest of Judge H. L. Benson, his friend of twenty years' standing. During the session of court on Saturday Judge Childs occupied a seat with Judge Benson on the bench.

Judge Childs is here to interest the people in the proposal to improve Crescent City harbor.

"This," said Judge Childs, "is the logical deep sea outlet for all Southern Oregon. It is 200 miles from here. It is 500 miles from here to Portland and 100 miles from there to the sea. It is 436 miles from here to San Francisco. If we get harbor improvements it will certainly bring a railroad from this territory, and vice versa. The Hill lines will undoubtedly come in here. The Hill line is going to Medford; from there to Grants Pass, and from Grants Pass to Crescent City. The people of the Rogue Valley will build if some company does not. Del Norte will present, \$250,000 to any company that will build, and Josephine and Jackson counties will give much more. There are 100 miles of road only to build. We have four steam schooners coming to Crescent City regularly, and we can give the people of Southern Oregon better freight service than they are getting today with our harbor just as it is."

MORE TROOPS TO GO TO SAN DIEGO

SAN DIEGO, June 23.—The news of the sending of federal troops here is a surprise to the revolutionist leaders, who are saying that the surrender of Mosby here yesterday disbands the last of the forces of the revolutionists in Lower California.

Jaurez Forces Go to San Diego
EL PASO, June 23.—Sixteen hundred federals at Jaurez are transferring to Southern Pacific trains, which will bear them to San Diego, across American territory. It is possible that some will enter Mexico before the coast is reached. General Gordillo Escudero having the option of changing his plans en route.

Colonel Steever is sending an American detachment with each train. It is feared than an attempt will be

made to dynamite the expedition which is en route to crush out the revolution in Lower California.
