The Luther letter was written in 1521 during the reformer's return journey from the Diet of Worms and described the proceedings and defended his attitude. The letter never reached the Emperor, as its contents were such that no one dared deliver

## MANY DEATHS FROM THE HEAT WAVE

IN MARIETTA, OHIO, RISE IN TEMPERATURE EXPLODES A BIG SUPPLY OF NITRO-GLYCERINE IN WAREHOUSE

MARIETTA, Ohio, July 3.—The temperature, 108 in the shade, caused the explosion of 2,000 quarts of nitro-glycerine in the warehouse of the Marietta Torpedo company. The explosion razed the boiler house and three other buildings.

The loss is \$30,000, and the city was badly shaken up. No workmen were in the building, and there were no casualties.

Over seventy deaths and hundreds of prostrations throughout the country have been reported in the last twenty-four hours. At New York the temperature reached 98 degrees, the highest July mark since 1899. At many points the mercury is over the hundred mark, and suffering is most intense.

### Gotham Suffers

NEW YORK, July 3.—The thermometer registered 88 degrees at 9 o'clock this morning in the shade on the Brooklyn bridge. The indications are that there will be more deaths than yesterday, when ten succumbed. It is estimated that 400,000 went to Coney Island and slept in the sands last night. The East Side is suffering the most.

### Jumps From Window

CHICAGO, July 3.—G. A. Wright, an executive officer of the United Order of Foresters, became crazed by the heat, and leaped from the fifteenth floor of the Masonic Temple. He landed in the inner court at the feet of Miss J. Whitman, a stenographer. He was instantly killed.

### Four in Philadelphia

PHILADELPHIA, July 3.—Four more deaths from heat are reported, making six in two days. The mercury is at 98, and is rising.

### Chicago Expects Breeze

CHICAGO, July 3.—Cool breezes from the northwest promise a slight relief tomorrow. Twenty-five died here within four hours. The thermometer stood 91 degrees at 9 o'clock this morning, and is mounting slightly. The weather bureau expects a hotter day than Sunday, probably 100 degrees by 3 o'clock this afternoon. The humidity is low, and is partially relieving. The parks were jammed last night. The infant mortality is alarming.

SALEM, June 30.—In order that the cause of good roads in Oregon may not be jeopardized by the confusion of too many initiative bills, Governor West at the request of many promi-

nent citizens and organizations of the state, has named a committee representative of every county in the state to meet at an early date and frame a bill which will suit the people of the state. Dr. Andrew C. Smith of Portland, was named chairman of the committee and he is to call a meeting at an early date.

In view of the fact that the State Grange has a good roads committee appointed, the members of the Grange committee were placed on the governor's committee with the end in view of gaining the co-operation of the Grange in this general state wide committee. The Oregon Development League is working on the roads problem and C. C. Chapman will be asked to co-operate with the state committee in framing a good roads measure which will meet with the general approval of the people.

Whether this committee shall initiate a bill or submit one to the next legislature will be left to the committee. In the event an appointee is unable to attend the committee meeting he will be asked to name someone in his stead. The personnel of the state wide committee follows:

### CHEAPER RATES FOR LIGHT AND POWER JULY 1

Commencing July first, cheaper lighting and power rates will go into effect, according to an announcement made by the Klamath Falls Light & Water Company. The rates as announced, will be those of the Sisaiyou Electric Power and Light company, the firm that recently purchased the local concern from C. S. and R. S. Moore.

According to the new rates, the flat rate for electric lighting will be reduced from twenty to thirty per cent, according to the number of lights used, the maximum meter rates will be reduced from fourteen cents per kilowatt hour to ten cents per kilowatt hour. One sixteen candle-power lamp in a residence will cost \$1.00 a month after the first, while the price for six lamps of the same candle power, the number generally used in residences will be \$1.70 a month.
