

STATE FORESTER NOW ON THE JOB

OREGON FOREST FIRE ASSOCIATION STATE FOREST SERVICE AND OTHER BODIES ARE ACTIVE THIS SUMMER

PORTLAND, July 17.—Patrolmen employed by the forest service, private timber owners and the Oregon Forest Fire association are now stationed in all parts of the state, although the full force will not be in the field for a few days.

Already 350 fire wardens have been given state appointments as provided by law. These men, while receiving no compensation from the state, are responsible to the state forester for enforcing the fire laws, are authorized to issue burning permits and, if necessary, arrest those guilty of setting fires. It is safe to say that not less than 500 men will be actively engaged in patrolling Oregon's timbered area the coming summer.

The state forester has appointed twenty supervising wardens who are under state pay, and devote their entire time to suppression of fires and the enforcement of fire laws. The counties in which these men are located are Benton, Clatsop, Clackamas, Columbia, Coos, Crook, Douglas, Jackson, Klamath, Lake, Lincoln, Linn, Marion, Multnomah, Tillamook, Union, Wallowa, Washington, Wheeler and Western Grant, Yamhill, Baker, Harney, Malheur and Eastern Grant.

These wardens will issue permits where there is no local fire warden available, act as referee in case of any dispute over the advisability of issuing permits, and keep in touch with the volunteer fire wardens. In addition to this they will frequently inspect locomotive and logging engines burning fuel other than oil, and see that proper spark arresters are maintained, as well as make sure that old slashings are kept in the safest possible condition.

Copies of the law and other fire literature is being freely distributed in the state by the government, state and private interests seeking to reduce the fire damage. This, together with a better public sentiment in favor of suppression of fires should result in their being far less frequent and damaging this summer than during previous years.

FOREIGN UNDESIRABLES ANNOYANCE TO ENGLAND

LONDON, July 15.—England has been considerably exercised about her alien population since the recent siege of the East End anarchists, who held the police and troops at bay. With the aid of the census returns a calculator has been working out figures to show how much London and other cities are affected.

While there is nothing like the cosmopolitanism of New York, or indeed most American cities, it is shown that the alien population in England is a serious item, owing to the pressure of competition in an old and thickly populated land. In the whole of Britain there are about 300,000 aliens, of which Russians and Poles are about a third, with Germans a sixth and Americans a tenth of the whole. London has by far the greatest numbers, though there are over 20,000 in Scotland, mostly miners. Colonies also exist in Manchester, Liverpool, Leeds, Cardiff, Sheffield and Birmingham.

M. J. Landa, who has made alien immigration a specialty is convinced that any country gains by admitting healthy and efficient alien citizens and he concludes that even overcrowded England gains rather than loses by it. But his critics point to the fact that the flower of the British youth are going overseas, while their place is taken by the dregs of foreign slaves. And they contend the census returns are illusory, since the alien Schlesinger has a habit of becoming "Sincclair" soon after arrival, and a recent notorious criminal, calling himself Morrison, was proven to be a Russian named Morris Stein when he first landed at Dover.

PRIM WEEKS ARRESTED AT HOME WITHOUT TROUBLE

Indian Policeman Abraham Charlie, Edwin Wilson and Jim Johnson came down on the train from Chiloquin Saturday, bringing with them John Stokes and Vugil Wilson two Indians who are charged with introducing whiskey on the reservation. Prim Weeks, the Indian who shot Allie Harding near Weeks' home as a result of a quarrel said to have been prompted by whiskey, was also brought in.

Edwin Wilson, when asked about the arrest of Weeks, stated that the prisoner made no attempt to evade arrest, or to resist the officers. He says that he was placed under arrest

and allowed to stay at his home till the time set for bringing him here for a hearing before United States Commissioner R. M. Richardson. Weeks, said Wilson, claims that he shot Harding in self defense.

It had been reported that Weeks intended to kill the first man who attempted to arrest him. Wilson's story of Weeks' promise to be taken into custody whenever the authorities desired explains why he was not molested, as he is known to be a man of his word.

THIRD BUILDING FOR THE COLLEGE

CORVALLIS, July 14.—Work on the new mechanics arts building, which, with the horticulture and farm mechanics buildings, makes three now in process of construction on the campus, is rapidly progressing, and the foundations are nearly complete. It is expected to have it finished, with the equipment installed by the opening of the first semester this fall, September 29th.

The building is to be divided into three shops, one for wood working, one for plumbing and a foundry. The foundry will occupy an area of 60x35 feet, and will contain a cupola for melting iron, a brass furnace, a core oven, the necessary melting tools, and all the equipment of a modern foundry.

Adjoining the foundry will be the plumbing and pipe fitting shop, occupying some 34x24 feet of space. Instructional work here will be supplemented by much of the repair work of the college—a saving of a considerable amount of money to the state in keeping up the college plumbing.

The rest of the building will be given over to the wood working department which has hitherto been much cramped for space in the old shops. Lathes will be installed, and in addition to the instructional work done there, much of the furniture and other equipment needed by the college in its offices, class rooms and other departments will be constructed here at a much smaller expense than they could be bought.

When the building is completed the three shops will almost double the capacity of the present shops. They are erected on the ground formerly occupied by the old greenhouses, between the engineering building and the shops.

SACRAMENTO JOBBERS WILL MAKE A TRIP TO KLAMATH

A trade extension excursion to Klamath Falls, Oregon, was projected yesterday at a meeting of the board of directors of the Jobbers' association of the Sutter Club. The excursion will be held some time in September under the auspices of the Chamber of Commerce. The Jobbers' association met at the request of L. S. Upson, president of the Retail Merchant's association to discuss the possibilities of a trade extension excursion to the north country.

S. Glen Andrus, secretary manager of the Chamber of Commerce, was an invited guest at the meeting, and assumed the responsibility for getting up the excursion, with the co-operation of the other civic bodies. The meeting was enthusiastic, and resolutions were adopted by the jobbers endorsing the proposed excursion and pledging their aid in carrying out their part of the work.—Sacramento Union.

From the above article it would seem that other merchants are to follow the lead of the San Francisco party who visited here in May. It is becoming well understood that the best way to cement trade relations with customers is to have the heads of the wholesale firms meet them personally.

Should the Sacramento jobbers come at the time they mention they will be enabled to have even a better time than did the San Francisco delegation, as Crater Lake and other side trips will then be opened to travel.

PINCHOT SAYS THE ENTRY WAS CROOKED

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 15.—Gifford Pinchot today confirmed the story going around to the effect that the maps showing Ryan's Controller Bay entries were filed with the war department only fifteen days after the entry had actually been made.

He said it would be impossible for such a bonafide map to reach Washington from Alaska in that length of time.

"Miss Abbott," said Pinchot, "asked me to inspect the map with the war department on December 15. As the survey of the land was not concluded until December 1 with Secretary Stimson, I discussed the map with Stimson and looked over it."

LEMON GROWERS ASSOCIATION HAS NEW MAIN SQUEEZE

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 14.—Hall to the tiller of the soil. He has won the respect of the world. Perhaps you have noticed that it isn't so common to decry his occupation as it

used to be before Uncle Sam discovered it to be a science. Now young men are flocking to the agricultural schools and colleges and many of them are graduating into professorships or into positions as experts with the government.

One of the latter has just returned to Washington after spending two months in Spain and Sicily investigating lemon growing. He is G. Harold Powell, whose work for the department of agriculture in the investigation of causes of fruit decay in cold storage and in transit attracted such wide attention. The citrus fruit growers of California held his talents in such esteem that they tried to get him to go out there.

When they got up to an offer of \$10,000 a year salary he succumbed, and he is now secretary and manager of the Citrus Protective League of California, a model business organization of agriculturalists, which has been fighting for a tariff on lemons that will permit the industry to survive. Having secured that tariff, the organization is now combating the organized campaign of the Sicilian importers to have it reduced. The latter have raised a big fund to influence public opinion in this country, and to affect legislation.

TRADE CHILDREN IN THE VACATION MONTHS

BERLIN, July 14.—Though only started five years ago, the system of exchanging children between families in Germany, France and England has attained wonderful proportions. This year in Berlin alone, 1,500 children have enrolled themselves as applicants for reception as guests abroad. In the whole empire there are thousands of eager youngsters with the same ambition.

France and Germany, in spite of their traditional bitterness, are the greatest participants in this scheme, but the English, under the direction of Lord Weardale, are trying to extend their operations in the same direction. Curiously enough, however, there is less activity in England in the pursuit of a foreign language than anywhere.

The working of the scheme entails no risks. Each country has a committee which reports on the fitness of any family to receive a foreign guest. When a family is approved in this way it sends a little boy or girl at its own expense to a German or French family for the holidays, receives in exchange a child from this family for the same period. In that way languages are made easier in acquisition and, incidentally, a better understanding among the nations is established.

MRS. McMANIGAL UP TODAY FOR CONTEMPT

LOS ANGELES, July 17.—Mrs. McManigal appears this afternoon to answer a charge of contempt for refusal to testify before the grand jury in the dynamiting case. In case she is held, her attorneys will advise her to go to jail rather than answer the grand jurors.

TO NIPPON IT LOOKS LIKE TRIPLE ALLIANCE

TOKYO, July 15.—Many hail the revised Anglo-Japanese treaty as practically a triple alliance between Japan, Great Britain and America. Public opinion is somewhat divided, but all agree as to the unavoidability of the modifications. Professor Tomizu also advocates a closer approach to Russia.
