SECRETARY OF THE KEOKUK COMMERCIAL CLUB SAYS OREGON ATTRACTS MANY OF THE FARMERS OF HIS STATE

PORTLAND, Aug. 21.—William R. C. Kendrick, secretary of the Keokuk (Iowa) Commercial Club, predicts that the next few years will see a large influx of people into Oregon from his state.

Mr. Kendrick is in the city for a few days visiting with his brother, A. A. Kendrick, and he proposes to see as much of Oregon as his time will permit before leaving for Los Angeles. FLOATING CORPSE POINTS TO CRIME

BODY OF CHARLES LYONS, HIS SKULL CRUSHED AS THOUGH BY AN AXE, FOUND TODAY IN OAK STREET CANAL

Was Charles Lyons murdered and his body thrown in the Oak street canal? Could he possibly, in an intoxicated condition, have fallen from the Bridge of Sighs in such a manner as to so badly cut his head that death resulted either from the wound or from drowning?

The above are two of the many questions which are bothering the officers of the law, both city and county, as a result of the finding of a man floating in the Oak street canal, opposite the city jail Monday afternoon by Jesse Hunsaker. The body was floating with the left side down.

After Coroner Earl Whitlock had been summoned, the body was taken from the water, and evidence of death by violence rather than drowning was disclosed in a horrible gash on the left side of the head. This extended from the middle of the skull to a point just in front of the left ear.

James Crowley, who was arrested Monday because he had been seen drinking with Lyons, said that he has been here but a few days, coming from Ashland. After working in the country a few days, he came to town Thursday night.

GAS FRANCHISE GRANTED BY A UNANIMOUS VOTE

After difference, revisions and squabbles extending over a period of three months or more, the city council has at last taken the final step for a gas plant for this city.

The vote on the matter was unanimously in favor, all six of the councilmen present, Wilkins, Alford, Owens, Hanks, White and Cristler answering "aye" when the vote was taken.

As a result of the action taken by the council last night, the city is assured of a gas plant here within twelve months after the gas company accepts the franchise, as they have agreed to forfeit \$5,000 if the work is not completed in that time.
