TRI-POWER WAR SEEMS IMMINENT

FRENCH GENERAL CLAIMED TO HAVE PREDICTED WAR WILL BE ON IN EARNEST WITHIN TWO MONTHS

 PARIS, Sept. 19.—According to a story heard here today, war between France, Germany and England will be declared in less than two months.
 The informant, whose good faith cannot be questioned, says the editor of one of Paris' most influential morning papers, a general in the French and a cabinet member, were having luncheon in a restaurant where they believed themselves unknown.
 The general, who was not in uniform, talking earnestly to the other men, remarked in a low voice: "War will be declared in less than sixty days."

TAFT ON RECALL ROLES GOVERNOR JOHNSON

MERCHANTS IN FRANCE HOLD BACK FOOD STUFFS, HOPING WAR TIME PRICES WILL SWELL THEIR PURSES

 PARIS, Sept. 19.—The "high cost of living riots" now convulsing France are said to be indirectly due to the prospect of war between France and Germany.
 Germany is known to have made tremendous bulk purchases of cattle, butter, eggs, etc. in France, and merchants are said to be holding back food stuffs speculating upon war time prices they expect to get.
 The French government also is cornering food products and prices are soaring all over the country.
