

## PROJECT LAWYER VISITS KLAMATH

## RUSS ARMY ON FRONTIER CAUSE OF MUCH COMMENT

LONDON, Nov. 10.—Russia's military activities along the Caucasian-Armenian frontier have perturbed the chancelleries of the European powers. It has been definitely ascertained, despite official contradiction, that Russia, taking advantage of the Turkish situation, has been quietly but effectively reinforcing her troops in that quarter.

Authentic information comes from Kars that the Caucasian commander-in-chief has been on the frontier in person for the past two weeks, superintending the disposition of troops.

At least 45,000 soldiers have been distributed along the border in the past month, together with huge quantities of war stores.

## CRATER LAKE NATIONAL PARK SEASON CLOSES

FORT KLAMATH, Nov. 10.—Superintendent W. F. Arant of Crater Lake National Park, yesterday moved to this town from his camp near the lake, and the park is now closed for the winter. The heavy snow has set in, and already is several feet deep. It is expected that the present snow in the vicinity of the lake will remain all winter, and that all travel over the mountains will be stopped.

The present season has been one of the latest in years, and Mr. Arant had everything in readiness to move out on the shortest notice.

The planking on all of the bridges had been removed some weeks ago, and late visitors to the lake have been making the trip on horseback.

## MORE SCHOOL BONDS TO FINISH BUILDING WITH

000 bond issue voted upon to complete the new high school carried by a large majority of the taxpayers, and the work will be carried on at a rapid rate from now until the first of the year, when the building will be ready for occupancy.

The total cost of the building will be \$65,000, and it is one of the finest structures for a town of 1,500 population to be found in the state. The equipment is modern, and many new branches of study will be taught, among them being agriculture, which is the most valuable course here, as many can avail themselves of a primary college course by attending high school.

## LYMAN KEEPS UP FIGHT IN COURT

**CONFIDENCE MAN WITH MEDICAL TRIMMINGS, STILL ON CRUTCHES, TRYING TO GET BAIL REDUCED BY JUDGE**

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 10.—Both Dr. J. Grant Lyman and his suits dragged wearily in court. Lyman, still on crutches, hobbled into the United States district court at 10 o'clock. Judge De Haven set December 7th for his trial on the charge of conspiracy in reference to his hasty and sensational flight to Klamath Falls, Oregon.

C. M. Courtwright, the guard detailed by Marshal Elliott, indicted on a charge of conspiracy, entered a demurrer to the indictment. Judge De Haven intimated that he thought the indictment perfect, but ordered Courtwright's attorney to file authorities. On Courtwright leaving the United States district court at the close of the session he was rearrested on an indictment which had been placed on the secret file, charging him with allowing a prisoner to escape. He was later released on the second charge by his relatives putting up another bond of \$1,000.

Carroll Cook, attorney for Lyman, made another appeal to Commissioner Krull to have his client's bail reduced, which was refused. Krull entered December 8th as the date of taking testimony on the removal of Lyman to Los Angeles on the charge of having used the United States mail for fraudulent purposes.

## "SPY FEVER" GETS TO COURT AND BEAUTY IS INVOLVED

men, the former already sentenced, have come under the ban.

Trials of two of the men begin in a few days. Germaine Thiron, the woman, is a beautiful French language teacher. Curiosity got her in trouble. She asked indiscreet questions during flirtations with German army officers and got eight months in prison.

H. A. Rogers, erstwhile publisher of the "Summit Lookout" at Weed, has left the paper, also the junction city, and J. M. Potter, trustee for the creditors, has undertaken to look after the interests of the paper, with James A. Power as manager.

## TAFT MAY PRACTISE LAW NOTES POSSIBLE NEED

## CAMPBELL TITLE BEING DISPUTED

**THEREFORE REALTY MAN ASKS COURT TO SETTLE OWNERSHIP OF FIFTY ACRES ALONG OREGON EASTERN RAILROAD**

D. B. Campbell, through Attorney Thos. Drake, has entered suit against John and Marie Hagelstein and J. C. and Althea Beach, guardian of the person and estate of John C. Beach, an incapable person, and Fred and Gus Melhase, to quiet title to lot 4, section 13, township 37 south, range 8 east, Willamette meridian, about 50 acres through which runs the right of way of the Oregon Eastern road.

Campbell claims to own the land, and that the defendants have set up some claims to ownership, the basis of which he knows not.

## MUCH MINERAL WEALTH UNITED STATES GETS

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 10.—According to figures recently made public by the geological survey, nearly a third of a billion dollars was added to the wealth of the United States from the mineral production of the Western states during the year 1910.

This includes about \$66,000,000 worth of coal. The total figures of Western mineral production, as compiled by the survey are \$313,944,881. This is about one-fourth of the total agricultural production of the same area, the proportion between mineral and agricultural production being about the same for the entire United States. The agricultural production of the Western states, derived from figures of the department of agriculture was approximately \$1,394,791,000. The area considered includes the belt from the Dakotas south to Texas and the territory westward.

## FEES TO INSPECT CREDIT CHARGED LOAN APPLICANTS

BERLIN, Nov. 10.—Otto Klorus, an apprentice tailor, got a get-rich-quick idea of his own, and launched a "loan bank." Each applicant was charged for "investigating their reliability."

But invariably the report shown the clients declared them unsafe.

But two instances of loans were found, one a widow, charged 1,300 per cent for a loan of \$7, the other, a washwoman, charged 3,000 per cent. He received over 200 fees for the "investigation," it was testified.

## EQUAL PAY FOR MEN AND WOMEN IN NEW YORK

NEW YORK, Nov. 11.—New York school ma'ams are today enjoying the fruits of a nine-year battle for equal pay to school teachers of both sexes. The increased cost in salaries for the elementary schools resulting from placing the fair sex on a financial par with men is estimated at \$3,134,949 a year, and for the high schools at \$372,480.

## ANTI-FOREIGN OUTBREAK IS FEARED BY LEGATIONS

## LYMAN INDICTED ON THREE COUNTS

**IS SUBSTANCE OF OFFENSE WHICH LEADS TO TRUE BILLS IN CASE OF SMOOTH SWINDLER WHO WAS HERE RECENTLY**

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 9.—The federal grand jury has returned three indictments against Dr. John Grant Lyman, promoter of the Panama Development company, for fraudulent use of the United States mails.

While Lyman was escaping to Lakeview, his "manager" for the Panama enterprise, Lambert Smith, who is asserted to have been innocent of any wrongful intent, and who was to have been the chief witness against the promoter, died in Denver on his way from Panama to Los Angeles, where he intended to appear before the federal grand jury. The story goes that Smith, sent to Panama by Lyman, found that the "company" owned no lands there, and was broken hearted over the affair.

Lyman's wife left him at Los Angeles about the time of his arrest, together with another woman, who had been living with the Lymans.

Mrs. Lyman is alleged to have returned to their home at White Plains, N. Y., and there sued for a divorce from the swindler.

After he left her in Los Angeles and went to San Francisco, he is alleged to have lived in the Golden Gate City with an innamorata, a Miss Lehman, alleged to be a New York heiress, who was missing when Lyman was caught.

She is supposed to have returned to New York, from whence she sent him \$1,000, with which he is alleged to have paid his attorney's fees and other incidentals of his efforts to gain freedom.

"Doc" Lyman, as he is flippantly referred to, escaped from a hospital in Oakland, Calif., accompanied by L. B. Thorne, an attendant, and both were caught in Lakeview, whither they had gone by hired automobile.

They were brought to this city about the last of September, and Thorne, with four other prisoners, escaped from jail the following Sunday, none of the quintet being caught.

Lyman, however, with his broken ankle, using crutches, could not make the getaway, although he tried to bribe his guard, Fred Morley, at the Livermore hotel, as well as his jailer at Portland after he was taken there by Deputy Marshal Frank Beatty.

His attempt to bribe his Portland varden led United States Marshal Leslie M. Scott to take all surplus bedding away from Lyman, as well as most of his clothing, so that his lack of ordinary attire, combined with his lameness, would make escape hard for him. This peeved the medical man a lot.

He did not escape, and was finally taken to San Francisco shortly afterward.

## FINE SPUDS OFF TO SACRAMENTO

**CARLOAD OF WHITE BURBANKS, FIRST SHIPPED FROM KLAMATH COUNTY, STARTS FOR SACRAMENTO—BRING GOOD PRICE**

Klamath Falls today shipped a carload of fancy white Burbank potatoes to Sacramento, being the first car of tubers ever shipped from Klamath county. The spuds, which went to Sacramento, were purchased from the Altamont ranch by R. C. Klepper, representative of Wood, Curtis & Co., and the unusual price of \$20 per ton was paid.

## ROYAL CHILD HUNTER CONTRACTS BRONCHITIS

## NO SANTA CLAUS MAIL WELCOME AT POSTOFFICE

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 10.—The postoffice department has announced that it will give no co-operation to benevolent persons who desire to spread Christmas cheer to poor children who write to "Santa Claus." An order has been issued by Postmaster General Hitchcock which distinctly forbids any postmaster to distribute "Santa Claus" letters to any charitable organization or benevolent persons.

The postmaster general explains that in December, 1907, permission was granted postmasters to turn over to charitable persons such letters, but many abuses arose from the practice, and the order has not been renewed for that reason. All letters of this character will be stamped "fictitious" and sent to the division of dead letters this year.

## SNOWSHEDS COST RAILROADS MUCH

**ELABORATE SYSTEM OF PROTECTION OF SOUTHERN PACIFIC'S ROUTES OVER SIERRA NEVADA MOUNTAINS, 35 MILES**

Thirty-five miles of snow sheds over the summit of the Sierra Nevada mountains, costing an average of \$203,615 each year to maintain and protect from fires, is the record shown from a recent complication of the operating expenses of this important part of the Southern Pacific lines. The average of \$203,615 was reached by the use of the operating expenses for the years 1907, 1908, 1909 and 1910.

On account of fires in the snow sheds the annual expense is placed at \$46,565. Renewals on account of wear are placed at a little more than \$67,000. The repairs to the snow sheds cost an average of more than \$40,000 annually. They will be much heavier this year on account of the heavy storms of last winter. Patrolling and watching the sheds cost \$25,000 annually, and \$24,000 is set against the item of fire trains.

The Southern Pacific maintains one of the most complete fire organizations in existence for the protection of these sheds. Throughout the entire thirty-five miles the Gamewell fire alarm system has been installed, an alarm box being placed at distances a little more than a mile apart from one end of the sheds to the other. First class fire stations with complete fire fighting apparatus are maintained at Blue Canyon, Truckee and Summit, and at the first indication of a fire these stations are notified through the alarm system. A fire train is also maintained at Clasco, within the sheds, and although Clasco is not an alarm station the engine from that point is usually first at the scene of a blaze, notification being sent by telephone from the lookout station on Red mountain, this lookout station commanding the entire westerly view of the thirty-five miles of sheds.

The lookout station is equipped with a powerful spyglass and a charted map of the sheds, and at the first sign of fire the lookout is able to direct the Clasco station to the immediate location. During the four years mentioned above fires within the snow sheds have cost the Southern Pacific \$136,262.17. The officials estimate that it would cost more than \$2,250,000 to replace these sheds, should they be destroyed by fire at any time.

## HAUNTED HOUSES DO NOT EXCUSE TENANTS PAYING

LONDON, Nov. 10.—Haunted houses will be no plea for evading the rent collector hereafter. Judge Harrington of the Wandsworth county court, ruled so.

William Atkinson was sued for rent.

He claimed the house was haunted by a grayheaded ghost. It banged on his head and bed at night, slapped his daughter's face, hurled articles about the room and pattered through the halls locking and unlocking doors.

But the tenant was ordered to pay—and a precedent is established.

## WILLIAM SPENCE NO MORE

A telegram was received Monday announcing the death that day at Orland, Calif., of William Spence. The deceased was well known in Klamath county, having been a resident of this county for a period of eight years until about five years ago, when he removed to California. He was formerly owner of what is now known as the Oak place, near Pelican Bay. He is survived by two sons and three daughters, one of which, Mrs. John Alexander, resides at Dorris.

Mr. Spence was a charter member of Klamath Lodge No. 127, I. O. O. F.
