

AFTER MONEY TO IMPROVE SECOND

COMMITTEE WHICH HAS IN CHARGE RAISING OF FUNDS FOR BOULEVARD ON STREET BEGINS WORK

The committee which has in charge the collecting and disbursing of money for the improvement of Second street, began actual work Saturday in securing subscriptions. The committee consists of G. W. White, Alax Martin Sr., Fred Melhase and John W. Siemens.

The object of the movement is to secure private subscriptions to the amount of about \$10,000 to be used in the improvement of Second street from Klamath avenue to Lake Ewauna, and to lay out and construct a boulevard along the water front of the lake to the city limits. The subscriptions are being pledged with the understanding that only 25 per cent of the amount subscribed by each is to be collected at a time, and that this is to be used in carrying on the work before other payments are to be collected.

The construction of a boulevard along the water front south of the city is one of the most important and beneficial moves ever started for the good of the entire city. There are very few localities on the coast with the natural advantages for the building of a beautiful city as has Klamath Falls, and it is surprising that the property owners not only in the business district, but on the hill, between the bridge and Fifth street, have not sooner realized the great benefit of a beautiful driveway out Second street, and taken action.

A great many beautiful residences have been erected on the hill in the past few years, but the value of this property would be greatly enhanced in value of the magnificent view down the lake and valley was not obstructed by a mass of trees, as at present. If sufficient financial support can be secured it is the plan of those starting the movement to convert these tree lands along the lake into beautiful, rich, producing gardens, and construct a boulevard lined with shade trees through them.

COURT HOUSE SITE QUESTION NOT DEAD, JUST SLUMBERING

Up to this time the county court has not signified what action, if any, it has taken, or will take on the subject of the tender by the Klamath Falls Commercial Club of the site for a new court house at First and Main streets.

The club has received no communication from the county board, and it looks as though both sides were playing a waiting game, each standing pat to let the other make a move. No plans for the proposed new court house building on the Hot Springs site have as yet been invited by the county court, and it is uncertain, at least in the public mind, when any will be.

The club members say they have given the court something to think about, and further than this they will not go, except to use verbiage which indicates that there will be considerable interesting developments in case the court starts ahead with putting the new building on the ground it decided on in its announcement made about three weeks ago.

REED COLLEGE IS STARTED AFTER LONG PREPARATION

PORTLAND, Jan. 15.—After five years of preparatory ground was broken, the past week for the first building of Reed college, the new \$3,000,000 university to be built at Portland. The college will open next September. It is expected to rank with the best similar institutions in the country.

LABOR IN CONGRESS NOW STRONGER THAN IN PAST

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 15.—Trades unionism is more adequately represented in the Sixty-second congress than in the history of the Union movement. According to a list just made public by the American Federation of Labor here, there are fifteen representatives in the house who carry union cards, and who meet frequently to discuss legislation affecting the workmen. No attempt is made to formulate measures at these conferences, and there is no "lobby" formed—the members merely meeting for discussion of matters of interest to union labor. The meetings are also held on the specific understanding that the participants are not pledged to the support of various measures.

VIENNA, Jan. 13.—Manufacture of cartridges is likely to be revolutionized by a device invented by Captain von Henrichs, an Austrian artillery officer. Ten of the machines have already been ordered by the Austrian government.

Cartridge case, powder and bullet are poured into three funnels of an automatic machine, which measures the powder, loads the case, adds the bullet, controls the length of the cartridge and finally rejects faulty products and piles up the perfect result. Three men work the machine, which makes 15,000 cartridges an hour.

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 15.—Detective Bert Franklin, charged with attempting to bribe McNamara jurors, was subpoenaed to a grand jury order returnable today. Starting develop-

The summoning of J. Veenhuysen, an official of the German American Savings bank, led to the belief that the jury was tracing the money disbursed from the McNamara defense fund.

PORTLAND, Jan. 15.—One of the most important conferences of the new year will be a logged-off congress, to be held in Portland within the next two months. This will be the most exhaustive study of the subject ever held, and will be under the auspices of the Oregon Development League. The Portland headquarters is making arrangements.

The latest investigations along this line will be given for the benefit of settlers and the best method of removing stumps thoroughly explained. It is believed this meeting will be of state-wide benefit.

THE INDEBTEDNESS IS INCINERATED

BUNCH OF CERVUS ALICES DECIDE TO CELEBRATE FACT THAT DAMOCLESIAN SWORD OF L. O. U. HANGS NOT

On January 26, 1912, Klamath Falls Lodge No. 1,247, Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks, or cervus alices, will celebrate the event of the cremation of their indebtedness with an old-time masquerade ball at the Pavilion rink. Any old make-up will do, according to the invitation, but the invitees and their "company" are expected to mask. Speaking in the language of woodmen and denizens of the forest, one buck will be necessarily prepared at the door. Those wanting suits are required to see J. V. Houston before January 20. If he is any judge, no non-suits will be allowed.

"HOLY SPIRITS" ADVICE GIVEN TO CHAMP CLARK

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 15.—Four hundred and fifty pages of advice from the "Holy Spirit" in microscopic handwriting have been placed at the disposal of the legislative branch of the government, through Speaker Champ Clark of the house.

"Irene, the Maiden Prophet," who says she is 68 years old, declares it took her a solid year to write the book, which is an account of her "trance visions, in communion with the Holy Spirit."

Among other interesting information, Irene communicated to the speaker the formula for the long-sought Elixir of Life. It follows:

"Two ounces sugar of lead; three ounces of oil of camphor, one ounce of caustic bromide of lasein; thirty grains of chloride of gold; one quart of boraxide of potash and three gallons of water."

Irene is certain that the use of this elixir in the bath will preserve life from 100 to 200 years.

Irene recommends "dried snow" for food, and gives a formula for drying the product without melting it. Cheese from straw, shoes from the skin of dogs and salmon, stone from sand, fogs made luminous by electric current, and a score of other wonders are described in the manuscript. A personal letter to the speaker from Irene, whose earthly name is Irene Love Van Sant, or Mrs. Judge F. T. Reid of Seattle, Wash., accompanied the manuscript. It read as follows:

"Dear Chairman—I will send you seven or eight more of the records containing a copy of the word I trusted to my care, just as fast as I can get it copied. I want you to allow W. J. Bryan, Mr. Taft, Teddy Roosevelt, Secretary Cortelyou, the Chief Justice, the secret service and all statesmen to know and have copies of this and all the other books that will be sent to you. It takes a year of constant writing to make a book. This copy of the dictated 'Word of the Holy Spirit' voiced through me in trance sleep for the last nine years, belongs to the heads of the government. It is statesmanship. If allowed it will glorify our country. If disobeyed, America is doomed to follow Sodom and Gomorrah. I am commanded to distribute this word as did God's scribes and servants, the apostles. Your loving spiritual mother in Christ, 'IRENE.'"
