STORES CUT OFF

FEW HOURS WORK

It's a good rule the local folks wear stores have adopted, to close at 6 p. m. every day but Saturday. Most folks, if they have enough money, and try to spend it with care and celebrity, can buy enough clothes on a Saturday night to last them a week. At least this seems to be the conclusion reached by the local merchants, and they have united in an effort to cut off some of the extra hours they and their clerks have been putting in behind the counters. Those who have joined in this movement are Hector's Department store, Golden Rule Department store, Atkinson's, Walk-Over Shoe store and the Portland store, of which K. Sugarman is the proprietor.

The owners of the establishments believe they can accomplish just as much, take care of as much trade, treat folks just as courteously and fill all reasonable needs during the ordinary business hours of a weekday, saving for a longer Saturday. Saturday night open stores are an accommodation to people who are paid on that day, or have not the time to get their goods during the day. The merchants believe that they will lengthen their lives, feel more cheerful, and be able to eat, sleep and enjoy life just as much under the new rule as they have been heretofore. In fact they contend that they will have a few more hours a week in which to enjoy life. It's a good rule, and everybody should congratulate the stores on the reform. The change will be in effect until further notice, and clerks hope the notice will be deferred, saying it will not make their hearts sick.

PADDOCK TALKS TO

HIGH SCHOLARS

Bishop Paddock gave an excellent talk Friday morning in the auditorium of the high school, principally on education.

He spoke of the evolutionary development that was being put into use, and said in substance that in the development of man the life and habits were far different than of the animal, from the fact that man had a soul. He also deliberated more vividly from the view point that the human race should be lifted to a higher plane especially in the social, physical and moral sense. It ought to be the ambition of the high school student of today, he said, to study now so that he can best develop and conserve his powers in such a manner as to be beneficial in a way to the future generation. So many of the people of the present generation are contented to satisfy themselves with their present mode of life to such an extent that they do not look forward to benefiting mankind who shall fall in their footsteps.

The bishop spoke at length on the social side of life, and gave some good advice to the high school student who finds himself confronted with the grave problems of life after leaving school. He said that to lead a pure, clean and moral life one must abstain from the things that will tend to corrupt his life morally and physically. He gave an example of how a person may be induced on the downward path by being a good fellow. As one thing led to the next it would not be long before he would find himself an outcast.

The speaker strongly advocated all forms of athletics, and the manner of knowing how to play. Play is not the only thing, but how to do the right kind of playing. So many men go into athletics to beat the other fellow instead of trying to win. There is great satisfaction in being able to take defeat, and if one cultivates the right kind of spirit he will go into a contest not only to win, but to bear defeat, should he meet it.

LONG QUERY INTENDED TO DEFEAT TESTIMONY OF WITNESS IS BARRED OUT BY JUDGE HENRY L. BENSON

In the trial of Nobel Faulder for the killing of Louis Gebbert, the defendant's attorney, C. M. O'Neill excited considerable interest by drawing from W. A. Donnell, a laborer living in Poe Valley, the admission that during the intermission of the court Friday afternoon Donnell heard Fritz Christensen tell Charles Gentry, who is to be one of the defendant's witnesses, not to say anything on the stand about one of them getting whiskey from the other on the day of the killing. The question did not make clear which way the whiskey passed.

During Saturday morning Mr. O'Neill moved the court to dismiss the case on the ground that the prosecution, on whom it rested to prove that the defendant was guilty beyond a reasonable doubt, had not connected him with any criminal agency. During the presentation of the motion the court had the jury withdrawn from the room in the custody of Bailiff Clarence O. Morgan. The court, after hearing the motion, denied it, and also denied the motion made on Thursday by the same attorney to dismiss the case on the ground that the crime was committed on the Indian reservation, which, he alleged, carried the case out of the jurisdiction of the state courts.

Dr. H. C. Carruth, who was company physician at the Erickson & Peterson camp at the time of the murder, testified Friday afternoon and on Saturday morning, the state on Friday resting after cross-examining him. The doctor said that on the way from the camp to this city with Faulder, after the defendant had shot himself following the killing, Faulder told the driver of the team and the physician that after he found his dog dead he asked the cook if he had poisoned it, and that the cook denied it, adding that there were several dogs around the camp that ought to be killed. This, he said, angered him, and caused him to shoot.

Saturday morning Mr. O'Neill asked the doctor to describe the condition of Gebbert. Witness said the man had a rapid pulse, was in pain, and suffering from profound shock, but recognized witness, and said "Hello, Doc." The wound of entrance was between the sixth and seventh ribs, three inches to the left of the median line. It had drawn together as any bullet wound would, leaving a 3-8-inch discolored area. He described a shock as the physiological and pathological result of injury to the muscular and bony tissues.

"What effect has it on the bowels?"
"Not always the same."
"What effect had it on the condition of the defendant?"
"He had dilated pupils and some action of the bowels."

"Did you within a couple of weeks write a letter to Miss M. Brandon in which you asked her to write and tell you what was doing in the Faulder case, as you were anxious to know, and saying you did not know anything about the case, one way or the other?"

District Attorney Dell V. Kuykendall objected to this as having no materiality or relevancy.

Mr. O'Neill said he proposed to show that the woman had burned the letter and that the purpose was to impeach the witness. Proceedings were stopped while Norman Faulder, brother of the accused, went out to summon the woman, but when she arrived she was not called to the stand, and Dr. Carruth was permitted to tell that he had written a letter to Miss Polly Brennan, as he gave her name, saying he had not been summoned here February 15 (which was a date previously set for the trial). He said he wrote her that he wanted to know the time of the trial, as he expected shortly to take a place as ship's surgeon to Panama or China. He was at the time in Oakland, Calif.

Then he was asked a long question involving the following: If he wrote her saying that he might be called to Portland as a witness in the murder case of William Judah Jim and would get witness fees from Klamath Falls to Portland, and return and would stay up there, so if he were called here for the Faulder trial he would get witness fees from Portland here and back to Portland, as that was the only way to get money out of the case; if he did not have a conversation with J. D. Carroll about January 15th, while sitting in a buggy in front of the Monarch grocery, in which Carroll asked him if it was the bullet wound or the medicine he gave Gebbert which killed him, replying that he did not know, and when on telling Carroll of that on the night of the shooting he had laid down about 2 a. m. Carroll asked him if that had not been fatal to the man.

The doctor and nearly everybody else in the court room laughed at this. The court sustained an objection to the question.

W. A. Donnell was called and testi-

mony was drinking with Jack Barry's Fort Klamath saloon a night shortly before the killing. Witness said he had been in the saloon until 2 or 3 a. m. the night in question. He said Faulder always had an unusual stare when drinking. He said that at the time Faulder was drinking with Joseph Speltel, and "had a very peculiar look on him."

Dr. Thomas Parker was seated by Attorney O'Neill during the morning, and whispered with the attorney while questions were being asked of Dr. Carruth.

Others seem to be of the opinion that Merrill will have to travel astride a nag's spinal column (if a horse has a spinal column, which, in haste, is taken on trust as a fact) and among those who opine that way appears to be John Ellis. The gentleman from Fort Klamath writes to the Herald as follows:

SALEM, March 2.—When seen today Governor Oswald West stated that he does not want to butt into Klamath case unless the county court requests the appointment of a committee.

MERGER OF KLAMATH DEVELOPMENT COMPANIES

W. Paul Johnson, general manager and secretary of the Klamath Development company, was interviewed in the Portland Telegram Tuesday, and at which time it was announced that not only had all the companies which have been identified with the concern has been amalgamated into the new Klamath Development company, but that the Pioneer Press Publishing company continues as a component part of the corporation. The Telegram says:

"The Klamath Development company, with which Mr. Johnson is identified, is one of the greatest industrial concerns in the West. It is a consolidation of seven big corporations in which S. O. Johnson, W. P. Johnson, G. X. Wendling and several others are interested, together with the interests of Herbert Fleishacker of the Anglo-American and Anglo-London and Paris national banks of San Francisco and the interests of Mortimer Fleishacker, president of the Great Western Power company, of which the late Edwin Hawley was former president.

"Together with his brother, S. O. Johnson, W. P. Johnson controlled the old Klamath Development company, the Hot Springs company, the Buena Vista company, the Pioneer Press Publishing company, the White Pelican Mineral Springs company, the Klamath Investment company, the S. O. Johnson company and the White Pelican Hotel company.

"These companies have all been merged into the new Klamath Development company. The S. S. Johnson company is responsible for the development of large tracts of timber land in Southern Oregon and Northern California, and together with the Weed Lumber company owned a large part of the timber of that section of the Pacific coast. It is estimated that the combined interests in the new corporation represent more than \$50,000,000 in lands, timber and securities."

ATHLETIC MEET STIRS INTEREST

HIGH SCHOOL BOYS GETTING BUSY TO PERFECT THEIR PROWESS IN VARIOUS DOINGS OF TRACK AND FIELD

A great deal of enthusiasm is being manifested at the high school over the coming athletic meet at Eugene in May. It is expected that a large number of athletes will be assembled there to compete for honors in track as well as field. The local high school is endeavoring to select a track team which will represent the school here at the meet, and as a result the boys are trying out for the various places on the team. Of course at this time of the year they are somewhat handicapped by the fact that there is no place to train out, but it is hoped that before long a place will be provided, so that training may be commenced immediately. Nothing of this sort has ever been indulged in to any great extent in the school, consequently the boys are very enthusiastic over the fact that they will have an opportunity of getting a chance to show what they can do in the way of athletics. Judging from the showing which has been made on the terrace up on the hill by the students some good material is in the rough.

The baseball bug is buzzing about, and to say that it has left its hypnotic power among a majority is not far amiss. It is expected that by the first of next week a captain and manager will be elected so that active training will start very soon. A list of names of those who expect to try out for places on the team has been secured so that an estimate may be made to get an idea of the amount of interest in this line of athletics. About half the regular team which did themselves so proud last year by winning so many games, have left the school, so that new men will have to be put in their places.

Mr. Hawley, who has charge of the athletics of the high school, is giving considerable time to trying to arouse the enthusiasm of the students. He expects to turn out a bunch of athletes this year that will be second to none to any of the high schools in Oregon. Much credit will have to be given him for the basketball team, which carried off the honors in the competitive contests this year.
