

ADVICE TO HIGH SCHOOL BOYS

DR. EMMA DRAKE GIVES PRIVATE TALK TO BOYS AT HIGH SCHOOL—STUDY OF BOYS AN INTERESTING SUBJECT

Mrs. Dr. Emma F. A. Drake, the noted physician and educator, who has been doing so much good and giving so much helpful advice to the different clubs and societies, journeyed to the high school Tuesday to give the boys a private talk. She took as her theme "Whether and What?"

Around these as a nucleus she talked at length, varying the subject with apt illustrations and examples of the different walks of life into which people are daily treading. She said it was with the boy that she particularly wanted to speak, and to him alone. She wanted to guide the thoughts which may have gathered there and lead him to see just where to step. No boy is lost in this world but that there is a chance for him to get started right, and that every boy is going somewhere. No matter who his companions are in this world he must have some aim in view, some goal to reach, or a destination that he hopes to attain during his walk in this life. It is his moral training that is the guiding step, and no success can be attained without this essential. Mrs. Drake said that she had studied the boy and his habits, environments, capacity and disposition for many years, and that he was the most interesting subject that she had occasion to deal with. The boy's influences are many more than that of the girl, and what that influence is going to be can only be determined by the careful study of the right and the wrong to which he is daily subjected. If all would master self-control it would facilitate his desire to do that which he thought would be for the betterment of his character. She showed by an example how the ancient Ulysses had been tempted by the fair enchantress and how he had abstained from the temptations which had presented themselves. So in a like manner the boy can best raise his standard of morals to such an extent that he would not be troubled by temptation.

The doctor advocated the pursuance of education as the one great master of self control, and if everyone could endow himself with right associations, with the pure and clean thoughts of life, his would not be in doubt whether to jump on the right side of the fence of life or the wrong. The "what" of life is what we ourselves going to do, to live it the best we know how. What will our daily life be? The boys of this present day are influencing the people of this community as the whole nation, and if he is in the right path it will not only make the best of an impression at home, but just as well abroad. The high school student of the present day is looked up to as an example of what our future great men are going to be. If they set themselves the right kind of standard now it develops into his future life. The doctor quoted the words of Mr. Moody, "Character is what one is in the dark." She said that there was a world of meaning in this, and the whole problem was centered around it. Is the boy of the present day willing to stand by what he does in his every day life? Is he willing to let others know just what he is doing? Is he satisfied that his best friend should know his every action? Our thoughts must be such that were they to be quoted to others we would not be ashamed of what we say. Cleanliness in speech and cleanness of thought should be the ambition of every high school boy, and he should work toward this aim. Refrain from temptations, ignore bad company, disdain to do anything of immoral character and it will be pretty sure to follow that an upright life will be instilled.

The doctor completed her talk by saying that she would answer any question which might be submitted to her. As a result of this was that many of the problems of the daily life were asked her, and Mrs. Drake answered them to the best of her ability.

IMPROVEMENTS TO BE

Efforts are being made to have President Taft pardon Hamilton H. Hendricks, who was convicted of subornation of perjury during the land fraud prosecutions of Francis J. Heney. Copies of the petition were received in Klamath Falls yesterday and will doubtless be circulated soon. Hendricks, a resident of Fossil, Wheeler county, was charged with asking George W. Hawk to testify falsely before the federal grand jury about Hawks' homestead proof. The people of Fossil are circulating the petition, and explain that Hawk has since confessed that Hendricks did not suborn him. The petition to the president says that the Hendricks prosecution was of a political nature because the defendant belonged to the Mitnell-Williamson faction of the republican party and was a friend of Binger Hermann. It is further stated that the jury lists were not made by drawing them impartially from the taxrolls, but that they were prepared by detectives and others acting for the government, with an eye to the conviction of the defendant.
