

FAIR TO BE HELD NEXT SEPTEMBER

OFFICERS GIVE UP IDEA OF HAVING ANY FOURTH OF JULY DOINGS, WHICH MIGHT COLLIDE WITH RODEO PLANS

At a meeting held Friday by E. R. Reams, Louis Gerber and B. St. Geo. Bishop, officers of the Klamath County Agricultural Association, arrangements were made for the annual agricultural fair and race to be held this fall at the fair grounds. The event will take place either the last of September or the first part of October. The exact date will be determined later, as it is desired to have it fall just before or just after the annual roundup at Pendleton. The association at first contemplated holding a fair or some sort of celebration on the Fourth of July, but this idea has been abandoned in order not to interfere with the success of the Elks rodeo, which will occur one month before.

It is announced that the program for the fair will be announced in the near future, so that plans can be made for securing exhibits. The program will include bucking contests, wild horse races, harness and running races, wild steer roping, egg and spoon race, squaw race, log rolling contests and many other features. In addition to this prizes are to be offered for agricultural exhibits, and special prizes will be given the school children for exhibits made in the state contest announced by the state school superintendent. A street carnival for the evenings is also planned.

It is understood, but just whether all three can win appears to be quite doubtful. But they are full of confidence, and electioneering faithfully each and every day. With two democrats and three republicans, possibilities in the race the county certainly has a good market to pick from.

THORNET TAKEN IN NEW MEXICO

YOUNG NURSE WHO HELPED DR. JOHN GRANT LYMAN ESCAPE FROM OAKLAND HOSPITAL, RECAPTURED

Louis B. Thornet, who escaped from the Klamath county jail last September, with several other residents of that institution, no one of which was found, has been captured at Mill, New Mexico, according to a San Francisco wire.

Thornet was caretaker of Dr. John Grant Lyman in an Oakland hospital, from which the famous money-getting medico eloped with the assistance of Thornet. Lyman and Thornet traveled by auto from San Francisco to Lakeview, where they were arrested by Sheriff Warner B. Snider and then brought here by Deputy United States Marshal Paul J. Arnerich of San Francisco, for a hearing before United States Commissioner R. M. Richardson.

Arnerich wanted to take his prisoner direct to the Southern Pacific outbound train the evening of their arrival, but the prisoner insisted on a hearing. He was held for court, and as this had to be done through the Oregon United States district, Deputy United States Marshal Frank Beatty took him to Portland, where he was given into the jurisdiction of the California district, which tried him and sentenced him to the federal prison for attempting to escape, which is a penal offense. He was not tried on the original charge of using the mails fraudulently, the principal witness against him having died in Denver, Colo., while on the way back from South America to testify about a South American land scheme the doctor had fathered. The witness' death occurred while the doctor was loitering around in pink pajamas in his hotel in this city, trying to get well of an ankle he had broken while attempting to escape from officers in the Golden Gate city before he escaped from the hospital. He had gone to the hospital on account of this injured limb.

Thornet escaped on a Sunday morning from the main room of the jail, Lyman having been confined in another room. Thornet will now have to answer two charges—assisting a federal prisoner to escape, and himself escaping.

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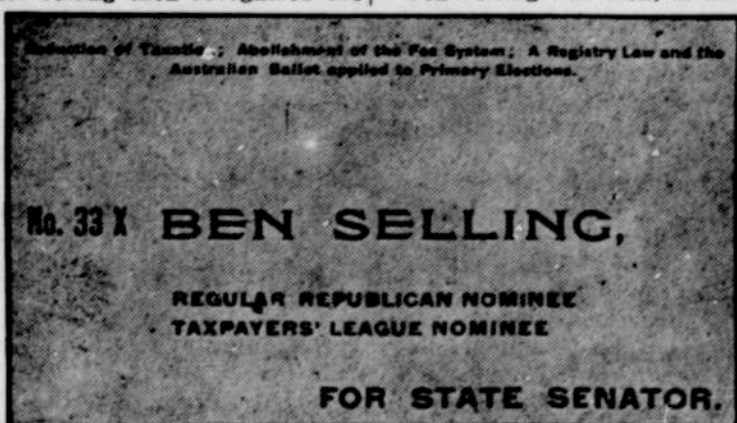
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Selling One of First Advocates of Progressive Legislation

PORTLAND, April 6.—The campaign for United States senator is growing so warm in the state that even historical facts are being unearthed at this time. An interesting bit of history is herewith produced. It is a photographic reproduction of a campaign card used by Ben Selling in 1896, when he was running for state senator from Multnomah county. Mr. Selling then recognized the

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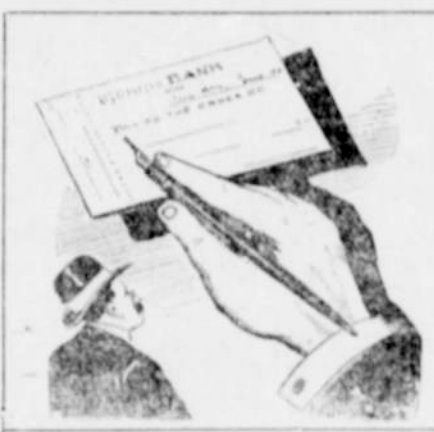
