ASKS FOR B.G. CRUISER FOR NEXT ROSE FESTIVAL

PORTLAND, April 12.—Letters asking that the United States cruiser Maryland, Captain Elliott, be sent to Portland to grace aquatic events of the Rose Festival have been forwarded to the secretary of the navy and the Oregon senators and representatives at Washington by the officers of the Rose Festival Association and the Chamber of Commerce.

Preparations are being made to entertain 200 delegates to the tri-state convention of presidential postmasters in Portland, June 13-14, during the Rose Festival. Dan D. Bush, the chairman of the committee on attendance for the Washington postmasters, has written to say that Washington will send a delegation of 100. Others are to come from Oregon and Idaho.

Mrs. U. B. Hough, secretary of the Spokane Aster show, has sent notice to the Rose Festival that Spokane intends to outdo Portland in the matter of festivals this summer. Answer has been made that Portland welcomes the competition.

AMERICAN PRISONER IN HANDS OF MEXICANS

LOS ANGELES, April 12.—Appealing to friends in Los Angeles, and requesting that his predicament be brought to the attention of United States Senator Works, C. A. Heberlein, a civil engineer of Los Angeles, has written from Mexico with news that he is a prisoner at Jimenez.

Heberlein's letter states that he was fleeing toward the American border when arrested for no apparent reason, in spite of the fact that he carried a safe conduct card and offered adequate bonds. He claims the Mexican authorities at Jimenez have refused to permit him to communicate with the American consul at Chihuahua.

USE NATION CUTOFF, EUGENE TO OAKRIDGE

EUGENE, April 13.—D. W. Campbell, superintendent of the Oregon lines of the Harriman system, accompanied by other officials, made a trip on a special train over the new Nation extension to Oakridge yesterday, presumably preparatory to its acceptance from the contractors. It is understood that the line will within the next few days be turned over to the operating department, and that train service between Eugene and Oakridge will be established.

It is also understood that the officials looked into the matter of extending the Portland-Eugene local passenger train to Springfield, and that of extending the East Side branch local train, which now stops at Springfield, to Eugene. The people of Springfield have petitioned for the change of the Eugene local and the people of Coburg have asked for the change of the Springfield train.

SLOUGH WRITES AS TO CANDIDACY

DECLARES THAT POINT RAISED AGAINST HIS ELIGIBILITY HAS NO BEARING ON PRIMARY ELECTION

The following letter explains itself: "Relative to my candidacy for the nomination for the office of county school superintendent, I wish to say: That I have conducted a clean campaign; that I have done everything required by law to entitle me to have my name printed on the primary election ballot; that the county clerk's office prepared the ballot with my name printed thereon; that after a copy of the ballot had been delivered to the printer my competitor raised a technical point as to my eligibility for a place on said ballot; that the point raised has no bearing on the primary election as the recently published opinion of Stone & Barrett shows (* * *) the question of the qualification of the candidate * * * cannot be a proper subject of inquiry by the clerk at the time of placing the name of the candidate on the nominating ballot."—Stone and Barrett; therefore, my name ought to be on the ballot now being distributed.

"Of course, it is the privilege of any voter to write my name in the blank space under the name of my competitor. I have been urged to push a vigorous campaign in this direction, but shall not do so, because of the stringent provisions of the primary election law against electioneering on election day and the lack of time to instruct the voters before that day."

"I wish to thank my friends for their very hearty support which would, undoubtedly, have resulted in my nomination had the matter been allowed to proceed in a lawful and orderly way. Very respectfully,

FOUNDER OF RED CROSS SOCIETY PASSES AWAY

WASHINGTON, April 13.—Miss Clara Barton, founder of the National Red Cross movement, died at her home in Glen Echo, Maryland, yesterday. She had been ill for months.

Clara Barton was more than 90 years of age. She was born at Oxford, Mass., in 1821. She first became nationally prominent in the Civil War, when she participated in and directed relief work on the battlefields. After the war she was associated with the International Red Cross of Geneva, and served in relief work of the Franco-Prussian war. She organized the National Red Cross in this country in 1881, being its president until she resigned in 1904. She served on the field in the Spanish war.

CHARLES SHERMAN FOUND ILL AT HIS HOMESTEAD

Friends of Charles W. Sherman Sr. will be very sorry to learn that the veteran editor is laid up at Anderson's, in Dairy, Ore., from rheumatism, and was probably saved from a very serious condition by being discovered ill at his homestead by a neighboring farmer, who called to get some seed grain.

It appears that Mr. Sherman had been laid up, practically helpless, for a number of days when the neighbor dropped in and found him helpless. He had Mr. Sherman removed to Dairy, where the patient could get the best of attention.

The disabling of Mr. Sherman

makes it necessary for him to abate, for a time, his personal canvass among the voters of this neighborhood in favor of his candidacy for delegate to the national democratic convention at Baltimore.

He is a homesteader, Grand Army veteran, has spent the greater part of his life as editor of democratic newspapers, and has been known as a strong advocate of reforms in government. Among other things which Mr. Sherman declares he is after is "cutting off of privileges accorded to wealth by law." He says he stands as a progressive, and believes that if there are reactionaries among the democrats of this state he does not care for their votes.

Mr. Sherman used to live in Nebraska, where he knew William Jennings Bryan well, as the following letter, dated Garrison, Mont., March 5, 1912, testifies:

"My Dear Sherman—Your letter received. Am sorry that I could not pass through your section. It would have been pleasant to see you again, as it was to hear from you. You may quote me as saying that I have known you for more than twenty years, and that I do not know of anyone whom I would trust more fully as a delegate."

PORTLAND, Ore., April 15.—One touch of suffragism makes the whole world kin, is the opinion today of those who attended the suffrage banquet given here, at which Caucasian and Chinese woman suffragists sat side by side and discussed on terms of perfect equality the progress of the cause.

Mrs. S. K. Chan, a prominent Chinese woman, delivered an address through an interpreter in which she noted with satisfaction that the Chinese were more progressive than the Americans, women in her country having been granted national suffrage.

HAMPSHIRE BOAR GOES OVER STYX

Mr. Cheyne expects to make a specialty of raising high class hogs. If the stock comes up to his expectations he will send for a larger shipment this fall.

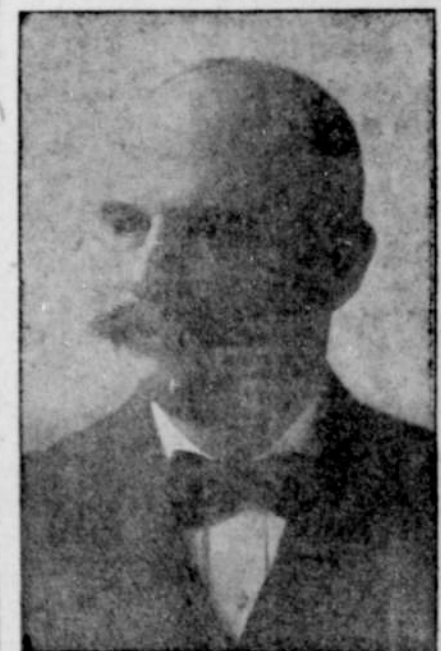
Clinton Charlie, another Indian, with freewater on the Indian reservation a couple of weeks ago.

At the time of Jacque's alleged offense Beatty was on the Indian reservation to get a prisoner, and, according to his story, found Jacque and Clinton Charlie very badly intoxicated, so much so that he could not learn from them where they had obtained the joyful waters with which they had been filling themselves. At the time Clinton Charlie drove his wife from their house in his drunken rage.

Beatty went back to Portland, and in the meantime evidence had been gathered as to the origin of the liquor furnished Clinton Charlie, and the result was the information lodged against Jacque. The deputy marshal came here and went to Modoc Point in a horse and buggy to get his prisoner, finding that Jacque had ridden horseback to Williamson River, where the officer had to follow. He placed Jacque under arrest, and had him precede the rig, astride his nag. The Indian got up steam and beat his captor to Klamath Falls several notches.

When Beatty got here he found that Jacque has obtained some liquor, to wit, two pint bottles, which were alleged to have been secured for the Indian by Stebbings, so Stebbings was arrested. Jacque had consumed one bottle of the fluid, and the other was taken by Beatty. Not internally, to be sure, but as evidence. Both men waived a hearing before United States Commissioner Charles J. Ferguson, and were taken to Portland for examination by the federal court in that
