

FREDERICKS AND DARROW CLASH

ATTORNEYS ARE FINED FOR CONTEMPT OF COURT

Darrow Admits That He Received \$200,000 of McNamara Defence Money from Frank Morrison—Cancelled Check for \$10,000 Endorsed by Darrow and Cashied by Tivietmoe Offered in Evidence

LOS ANGELES, June 5.—A personal clash between Darrow and Fredericks came when Darrow in a side talk with Fredericks admitted he received \$200,000 McNamara defence money from Frank Morrison.

Fredericks said, "You would not admit it if you thought we could not prove it."

Darrow jumped to his feet with the remark, "I object to the remark intended for the jury."

Fredericks retorted, "I thought the defendant man enough and with stamina enough to have a little personal conversation, without bawling it out to the court."

Attorney Appel shook his fist under Fredericks's nose.

Judge Hutton warned all.

Cancelled Check in Evidence

LOS ANGELES, June 5.—Prosecutor Fredericks offered in evidence a cancelled check for \$10,000 drawn by Frank Morrison in favor of Darrow. Darrow endorsed the check, and Tivietmoe cashed it in a San Francisco bank. Ford said the state will trace this money to Franklin. Judge Hutton fined Attorneys Fredericks and Appel each \$5 for contempt of court, and roasted Prosecutor Fredericks.

FINDS INDIAN BURIAL GROUND

MOUND OPENED ON BARE ISLAND BELIEVED TO BE EITHER A BURIAL GROUND OR PREHISTORIC CAVE

Captain J. C. Rutledge, Geo. B. Snyder and Mr. Hart formed a party which left Wednesday for Bare Island in the Upper Klamath Lake, to investigate what is reported to be either an old time Indian burial ground or the mounds of a prehistoric race of cave dwellers. It is reported that a mound on the island has been uncovered containing beads, brass kettles, tom toms and other relics of ancient times.

Captain Rutledge is recognized as one of the greatest relic hunters of the Northwest, and he already has a wonderful collection of relics of the Indians and early inhabitants of this section of Oregon. He believes that the present discovery will prove one of the greatest ever found in Oregon.

SAYS SALOON BUSINESS SHOULD SUPPORT DRUNKS

Governor West Believes That Every Industry Should Care for Its Maimed, Wounded, and Its Helpless in Their Helplessness

SALEM, June 5.—Declaring his belief that every industry should be compelled to take care of its own maimed and injured, Governor West said he included in this the saloon business as well as mills and factories. He advocated making saloon men provide an institution where men or women who have been made decrepit, worn out and helpless by the use of liquor may be cared for at the expense of the saloon business.

"Nearly all of us favor a just compensation law," said Governor West, "and I think this should include every industry, the saloon, as well as the saw mill. If the saloon has its maimed and wounded, which include the army of old drunks, there is no reason why such should be sent to the poor farm or the insane asylum to be supported by the taxpayers who have no interest in the sale of liquors. They should be sent to a home and be supported by a tax on the business that put them in that condition."

MANY CONTRACTS WILL BE LET

BIDS HAVE BEEN RECEIVED ON SEVERAL LARGE BUILDING CONTRACTS—AWARDS WILL BE MADE TOMORROW

Within a few days construction work on new buildings will greatly increase the activity among the mechanics and laboring people. Bids were opened yesterday for the construction of the Melhase building, and it is expected that the contract will be let within a day or so. The building which will adjoin the First National bank is to be three stories, and the second two floors will be fitted up for hotel rooms, and will be operated in connection with the Livermore hotel under a new management. The first floor will be occupied as a store. The bid of D. J. Lytle was the lowest offered.

Bids were opened today for the erection of the Crisler & Stiltz building, and the C. E. Riley building, and the contract will be awarded this afternoon or tomorrow. It will probably go to either the Garrett Construction company or to Cofer Bros. Both of these buildings will be two stories, with pressed brick fronts to match the new Slough building now in course of construction adjoining this property.

The contract for the new \$2,000 brick or concrete garage to be built for George Biehn will probably be let tonight. Bids were opened yesterday. This will make seven new fire proof buildings in a distance of two blocks to be erected on Main street this spring.

It was reported today that prominent persons may be behind the plot, and other arrests are expected.

The map will show all counties, townships, cities and towns, giving the distances and the new populations. The population of Klamath Falls is placed at 5,310. All electric lines, as well as steam railroads will be shown, also all new surveys and proposed roads.

JAPANESE SEND SEVERAL MILLION DOLLARS HOME

Prominent Japanese Merchant and Capitalist Says That a Vast Amount Is Saved and Sent Out of the United States by His Countrymen

TOKYO, Japan, June 5.—That the 90,000 Japanese in the United States save and send to Japan a large part of \$22,500,000 yearly was the statement made here today by Otehiho Majima, a prominent Japanese merchant and capitalist, who has just returned from a two months' tour of the United States, where he went to study conditions.

"The average wages of Japanese immigrants is \$2 a day," said Majima, "so that the monthly earnings, excluding holidays, will be about \$50. The total earnings of the 90,000 Japanese is \$45,000,000 a year, and if one-half is spent on living, the other half, about 27,000,000 yen, can be saved every year."

"White labor cannot compete with the Japanese in skill or cheapness. They are, therefore, trying to get the best of the Japs in other ways. The American capitalists generally welcome Japanese labor."

Leads in Enforcement of the Child Labor Law

SACRAMENTO, June 5.—A special report devoted chiefly to the enforcement of the more important labor laws—child labor, women's eight-hour law, payment of wage, pay check and employment agency—by State Labor Commissioner McLaughlin, for the six months ending December 31, 1911, is off the press. McLaughlin asserts that after inspection of 3,000 establishments, he is convinced that California leads all states in percentage of children kept in school and out of the factory and store. The commissioner finds that most employers of women have increased the number of female employees since the eight hour law was passed.

DESPERATE FIGHTING IN STORE FOR FRENCH TROOPS

Fifty Thousand Natives in Morocco Have Gathered to Await the French Attack, and May Start the Fighting Themselves

PARIS, June 5.—It is generally conceded, according to advices received here, that desperate fighting is in store for the French troops in Morocco before conditions there are much bettered.

In the Taza region 50,000 natives have gathered for the purpose of awaiting the French attack, some declare; others say they will not wait to be attacked, but will take the offensive themselves. The French are planning to cross the Moulouya, on the offensive, but this may come soon or late.

The Moors regard their Sultan Muly Hafid as a traitor for siding with the French protectorate, and he is so afraid of assassination he wishes to abdicate. France has reinforced her army in Morocco to more than 30,000, with 12,000 more on the Morocco-Algerian frontier—in all, about 42,000 troops ready for service.

M. Salinas has returned from a trip to Chicago and other Eastern points. While in Chicago he bought some new machinery for the saddle department of the Bradley Harness company. He will be able to turn out a larger number of the cowboy saddles which are giving the Bradley company a reputation in every cattle country in the West.

OREGON'S GROWTH IN DECADE SHOWN

POPULATION INCREASES FIFTY-ONE PER CENT IN THE PERIOD FROM 1900 TO 1910—OFFICIAL FEDERAL CENSUS

Between 1900 and 1910 the population of Oregon increased 51 per cent, according to the official figures of the official federal census. The population in 1900 was 413,536, ten years later it reached 672,765. Oregon was one of eleven Western states in which the population increased more than 50 per cent. The other states were Washington, Oklahoma, Idaho, Nevada, Dakota, New Mexico, Arizona, California, Wyoming and Montana.

The bulk of Oregon's growth in population in the last decade has gone to the cities. According to the census figures the total population of the state, 672,765 in 1910, was divided as follows: Urban, 307,060; rural, 365,705. In 1900 the division was: Urban, 133,180; rural, 280,356.

In the last decade the population of Portland increased from 90,426 to 207,214, or 129.2 per cent. The population in that part of the metropolitan district outside of the city proper in the same length of time increased from 1,242 to 7,834, or 530.8 per cent.

NEW TRIAL GRANTED MAN DISFRANCHISED

GATHERING AT HEADQUARTERS

McKINLEY AND DIXON ARRIVE IN CHICAGO

Talk of Bolting Convention Becomes Stronger—Rollcall of Committee Tomorrow and Hearing Contests Will Begin Friday—Certain That That Taftites Will Be Seated Except of Texas and Washington

CHICAGO, June 5.—McKinley and Dixon have arrived here. The Roosevelt-voters are extremely bitter, and the talk of bolting is becoming louder.

The Roosevelt-voters insist they have a big majority with the uninstructed delegates, while the Taftites ridicule their claim. The national committee meets for the first time in this city tomorrow at 2 o'clock. On the first roll called the newly elected committeemen will present their credentials, thereby precipitating the initial contest. The committee undoubtedly will flatly reject the new men, who may later get a mandamus. The hearing of the contests begins Friday, with reporters present. It seems certain that Taftites will be seated in every case excepting Texas and Washington.

HALLS SECURE ANOTHER HOTEL

HAVE LEASED THE LIVERMORE HOTEL, AND WILL KEEP IT OPEN—NEW THREE-STORY ADDITION BEING BUILT

Mr. and Mrs. E. B. Hall, who conduct the Baldwin hotel, have leased the Withrow-Melhase building, where the Livermore hotel has been conducted. The hotel will be kept open and run in connection with the Baldwin during the summer. With the completion of the adjoining three story building now in course of construction, the capacity of the hotel will be enlarged to 54 guest rooms. It is expected to have the new building ready for occupancy about the 1st of August, when it will be fitted with the most modern hotel furnishings.

The Baldwin hotel will continue in operation under the management of the Halls during the summer, and probably this fall it will be used for the accommodation of permanent roomers.
