SAYS MONEY CAME FROM GOMPERS

FRANKLIN SWEARS THAT BRIBBE MONEY CAME DIRECT FROM GOMPERS—LATTER SAYS IT IS UNTRUE

LOS ANGELES, June 4.—"Darrow told me he got money direct from Samuel Gompers," Franklin swore today, referring to the \$4,000 alleged to have been paid to Lockwood. He swore that Darrow promised if Franklin would plead guilty and take a fine he would get \$3,000, and that Davis also promised him. Franklin fought Rogers' questions, often saying he did not remember, when pressed.

Gompers Denies Report

WASHINGTON, June 4.—Gompers said: "Any statement that I furnished money to Darrow in the McNamara case for the purpose of bribing talesmen or jurors is absolutely untrue. I don't believe Darrow made such a statement. I never handled a penny of money sent there."

WILL HOLD FARMERS' INSTITUTES

TO BE HELD IN KLAMATH COUNTY SOON

State Dairy and Food Commissioner and Probably Dr. Withycombe of the Agricultural College Will Be Here the Latter Part of the Month to Conduct Institutes in This County

Secretary C. T. Oliver of the Klamath Chamber of Commerce, has received word from J. W. Bailey, state dairy and food commissioner, that he will be here the latter part of the month to assist in conducting farmers' institutes throughout the county. It is expected that Dr. Withycombe of Corvallis will also be here at that time. If Dr. Withycombe cannot come there will be one of the instructors of the Agricultural college here. Institutes will be held at Merrill on June 26; at Bonanza on the 27th, Fort Klamath on the 28th, and Klamath Falls on the 29th. The subject of dairying will be the principal topic to be discussed.

RIDES WINNER

LONDON, June 5.—Tagalie won the Derby, with Jaeger second, Tracey third and Pintadeu fourth. Johnny Reiff, a San Jose, Calif., boy, rode Tagalie, and won by four lengths. He took the lead at the start, and was never headed. Sweeper II, the favorite in the betting, never figured in the race. Tagalie was a 100-to-8 bet. The king and queen were present, although the weather was chilly. Time—2:38 4-5.

Always the greatest sporting event of the year, the race for the Derby, which was run today over the historic Epsom course, has rarely excited more popular interest than has been the case this year. The situation was rendered more interesting by the fact that it was believed it would fall to King George's colt, Pintadeu, to save the coveted prize, the "blue ribbon of the English turf," from a foreign invader, Sweeper II, a Franco-American colt, belonging to the popular American sportsman, H. B. Duran, which was made a strong favorite after his impressive victory in the 2,000 guineas at Newmarket six weeks ago.

King George has never run a horse in the Derby before, but since he took up racing after ascending the throne he has met with a fair share of success.

FIND USE FOR WHITE

ROCK ALONG SACRAMENTO

SAN FRANCISCO, June 5.—The tons of smooth, almost white rock that have lined the banks of Northern California streams for years as the result of the operation of mining dredgers, and that have been considered an obstruction to agriculture, will no longer be such an impediment. Within recent years uses have been found for this rock, formerly considered waste, and it has a real commercial value. The Southern Pacific company in its double track work and in the usual course of maintenance, is using many tons of this rock.

For years it has been piled high on the banks of the rivers and smaller streams. It was useless for levee work, and was pronounced a detriment to the country. Now, the ordinary sized rocks—about the size of a boy's hand—are used for track ballast without any crushing. The larger boulders are broken into both ballast and gravel. Many tons of this same rock have also been used by the Southern Pacific in preparing the concrete for its new bridges across the Sacramento and American rivers.
