

NEW OFFICIALS NOW IN POWER

INSTALLED AT MEETING OF CITY COUNCIL LAST NIGHT

Large Audience of Interested Citizens Extend Warm Greeting to the New City Leaders, and Initiatory Council Meeting is Full of Interest—Retiring Mayor Signs Minutes of Previous Meetings—Start Clear

With the best wishes of the retiring mayor and the assurance from every member of the new council of their personal support, Thomas F. Nicholas Monday night assumed the reins of city government for two years. The council chambers were filled to overflowing with leading citizens, who were present to witness the inauguration of the new city officers. There were representatives from every portion of the city. Friends and supporters of the new mayor were mingled with supporters of the Sander-son candidacy, who had come to tender their offers of support to the new administration. Prominent among the latter was W. Paul Johnson of the Klamath Development company, who has assured Mayor Nicholas that he is ready to give every assistance in his power for the upbuilding and betterment of the city.

The old council approved all the minutes of the preceding sessions, which were signed by Mayor Sander-son. The claims against the city, con-tracted by the outgoing administra-tion, were allowed, and a number of building permits granted. Mayor Sander-son then vacated his seat, and T. F. Nicholas was sworn in by Police Judge Leavitt, who had taken office earlier in the day. When the oath of office had been administered the audience broke into hearty applause. Retiring Mayor Sander-son was the first to congratulate the new mayor. Grasping his successor by the hand he said: "You have my best wishes and heartiest congratulations on as-suming your duties as mayor of this city. May your administration be a progressive one, and may Klamath Falls grow as it never has before. Whenever I can be of any service to you, I am at your command, to assist you in your administration for the upbuilding of a greater Klamath Falls."

The following councilmen were then sworn in: F. D. Miles, J. H. Hamilton, H. J. Savidge, C. H. Under-wood, M. J. Doty and J. F. Goeller. Each in turn was called upon to make a speech by friends in the audience, and each responded with enthusiasm. City Treasurer J. W. Siemens was the last to be sworn in, and when called upon said that the occasion was not a new sensation to him, as last night made the twentieth time he had gone through the same experience in the same office. He wished to publicly thank the people of Klamath Falls for the confidence they had shown in him during this time, and assured them he would continue to do his duty to the best of his ability. Judge Leavitt stated that he felt just like getting back home, and it seemed as if he had only been away on a sort of a vacation.

Calls for Nicholas were then heard throughout the chambers, and the new mayor stated that he was not going to say very much at this time, as he did not know just what he was going up against. He said: "I thank the people of Klamath Falls for the honor they have conferred upon me, and I trust I will merit it. I would ask the support of the citizens for myself and the council in the work before us. I mean to take hold in the best way I can. I hope the people will help us get out of this charter tangle so we can go ahead with much needed improvements."

The organization of the new council was then completed by the election of C. B. Crisler as president, to act during the absence of the mayor. The vote was by ballot, and stood: Crisler 5, Underwood 3, Alford 1, Savidge 1. The election of Crisler was made unanimous.

Mayor Nicholas then made his appointments. Don J. Zumwalt was appointed city engineer for a period of one year. The appointment was confirmed by the council. Thos. Drake for city attorney was also confirmed. When the mayor announced that he would appoint Joseph C. Smith as chief of police, Councilman Miles arose and said that he was not ready to vote on this appointment, and would like to see it laid over until the next meeting. "I am not ac-quainted with the man," said Miles, "and before I vote I would like to have time to make inquiries, and see if he is fitted for this important position. I move that the appointment be tabled until the next meeting." This motion was seconded by Mc-Gowen.

Councilman Alford intimated that the new appointee had been a resident of the city for a much longer time than the councilman, and said that he had resided in Klamath Falls for eight years and had served at least one if not two terms as chief of police of the city. When the motion was put by the mayor it carried a number of the councilmen not voting.

"Does that leave the city without a chief of police?" asked Councilman Savidge. "It does, said the mayor. I would say to the council that the city is without any police force what-soever, and has been since the new charter went into effect, outside of those that may have been appointed by the mayor for a period of five days."

Councilman Doty asked if the mayor could not make temporary ap-pointments until after the next meet-ing. The mayor said he could, but would like to know when the council intended to adjourn to.

"We are at your call," said Mc-Gowen.

"If that is satisfactory," said the mayor, "we will meet on Wednesday, and I will make four appointments for a period of five days." The following were then appointed: J. C. Smith, Chief; Earl Sharp, F. O. Green-wood and William Hall, patrolmen. Hall is the only one of the old officers reappointed. He has been on the force some time, and served as acting chief during Walker's sickness.

"I would like to know," said the mayor, "if this council is going to block my appointments. The mayor is the head of the police department, and is responsible for the actions of its members. It is necessary that the mayor and the head of the police be on friendly terms and work together, and I do not propose to be responsible for any man that some one else might appoint."

Councilman Miles assured the mayor that he did not intend to enter any objections to the mayor's ap-pointments, but he did not want to be held responsible for voting in favor of a man he did not know. He stated that he would always be with the mayor in carrying out his work. Councilman McGowen also assured the mayor of his support and assist-ance.

The appointment of the committees from among the council was post-poned until the next meeting, in order that the mayor might consult with the members as to the committees they wished to serve on.

An application by Al Crystal for a liquor license, and a petition for the transfer of the license of Arthur Liv-ermore to James Wheeler were pre-sented, and on motion laid over until the next meeting.

WOOL CLIP SALES ARE REPORTED

MOST OF KLAMATH AND LAKE COUNTY WOOL HAS BEEN SOLD—REGULAR SALES DAYS ARE ABANDONED

Frank E. Rickey, wool buyer for a Boston firm, who has been buying wool in Klamath county, has gone to Lakeview. While here Mr. Rickey purchased the entire clip of Apple-gate, Murphy & O'Connors Bros. and W. P. Whitney, amounting to about 70,000 pounds. The price paid was 15 1/2 cents, delivered at Klamath Falls.

Mr. Rickey stated that he had purchased about 160,000 pounds in Lake county out of a total clip of 200,000 pounds.

I. D. Applegate states that the Klamath County clip this year is the best wool crop that he has ever seen produced here. There is more wool, and it is better and cleaner than in previous years.

REGULATION FOR SPEED OF MOTORS

INTEREST CENTERS IN PROPOSED NEW RULE FOR MOTOR VEHICLES TO BE PASSED ON IN NEW YORK CITY

Virtually every municipality in the United States will be interested in the new ordinance for the regulation of motor vehicle traffic soon to be adopted by the board of aldermen of the city of New York.

The Touring Club of America has submitted a brief suggesting that a speed limit not to exceed twenty miles per hour should be specifically defined in order that the ordinance can be effectively enforced.

The absolute necessity for such an ordinance was immediately recognized by the authorities when the special committee of aldermen was announced, with Honorable Ralph Folkes, majority leader, as chairman. Much credit is due Folkes for the aggressiveness of the investigation conducted by the committee from a practical viewpoint.

That the present city ordinance prescribes a speed of eight and fifteen miles is obsolete is conceded upon all sides, especially as there is scarcely an automobile driven in New York at the present time without violating the city's speed ordinance.

At the request of Chairman Folkes the Touring Club, through its legis-lative committee, has recommended that the ordinance should be based upon section 287 of the motor vehicle law, known as the Callen law, with the exception of the substitution of "twenty miles" instead of "thirty miles" and of "one-eighth" for "one-fourth" in the last paragraph. The new city ordinance as proposed would read as follows:

"No motor vehicle shall be operated at a rate of speed in excess of or greater than is reasonable and proper, having regard for the traffic and the use of the highway, or so as to en-danger the life or limb of any person and the safety of any property or in any event on any such public street highway, parkway, driveway or place within the said city of New York, at a greater rate than one mile in three minutes; and the maintenance of a greater rate of speed for one-eighth of a mile shall be presumptive evi-dence of driving at a rate of speed which is not careful and prudent."

In support of a twenty mile speed limit attention is directed to the local government board of Great Britain, which has promulgated an order to the effect that no motor car shall be driven at a speed exceeding twenty miles an hour.

In France the speed limit in the open country is thirty kilometers, or 18.64 miles per hour, and when passing through villages twenty kilome-ters, or 14.03 miles per hour.

Comparison has been made between the motor vehicle regulations of the cities of Buffalo and Rochester, which with New York city, includes the cities of the first class in the Empire state.

In Buffalo the rate of speed for motor vehicles varies in accordance with the speed zones designated by the authorities; the highest speed al-lowed being eighteen miles an hour. Practically the same provisions pre-vail in Rochester.

One of the important recommenda-tions contained in the Touring Club's brief is that the new ordinance should convey the necessary authority to the police commissioner of the city of New York to designate such street in-tersections as may be deemed proper where the traffic police shall have the same jurisdiction over pedestrians as they have at present over drivers of all vehicles. Such an ordinance will soon be adopted in Chicago upon the recommendation of Captain C. C. Peley of the Chicago mounted police.

In Kansas City, Mo., a similar ordi-nance has been enacted, enabling the police to control pedestrian the same as they do drivers in the downtown district. This new regulation has been in force for the past month, and has proved very satisfactory; its chief advantage being the safety af-forded not only to the pedestrians but to the drivers of all vehicles, there being no congestion at principal street intersections. There is a pen-alty of \$5 to \$50 for violations of the ordinance by pedestrians.

GEOGRAPHERS TO VISIT THE CRATER

DISTINGUISHED PARTY FROM ALL SECTIONS OF THE WORLD WILL SEE CRATER LAKE DURING THE SUMMER

MEDFORD, June 4.—It is now known for a certainty that the party of famous geographers from all sec-tions of the world will visit Crater Lake this summer as guests of the Medford Commercial Club. "Science," a monthly publication, mentions Crater Lake as one of the points in the Northwest to be visited, and says:

"The list includes forty geograph-ers from sixteen different countries; most of the delegates being professors in universities or officers of national geographic societies. The character of the party will be sufficiently indi-cated by announcing the coming of: Patsch and Drygalski, Merzbacher and Jaeger of Germany; Gaillois, Mar-gerie and Vacher of France; Chisolm, Beckitt and Falconer of Great Britain; Niermeyer and Oestrech of Holland; Lecointe of Belgium; Beltran of Spain; Silva-Telles of Portugal; Bruckner and Oberhumer of Austria; Cholnoky and Telki of Hungary; Cvijic of Serbia; Doubiansky and Chokolsky of Russia; Andersson of Sweden; Olufsen of Denmark; Brunnhes, Chaix and Nussbaum of Switzerland, and Calciati, Marnell and Vinciguerra of Italy. It is safe to say that no such gathering of geographers crowned heads has even been brought from Europe to America."

"The Americans already enlisted, either as round-trip or as temporary members, include, among professors of geography, Harrows and Cowles of Chicago; Brigham of Colgate; Bow-man of Yale; Davis and Ward of Har-vard; Dodge and Johnson of Colum-bia; Fenneman of Cincinnati; Jeff-erson of Ypsilanti and Martin and Whit-beck of Wisconsin, as well as a num-ber of scientific men from various parts of the country representing sub-jects allied to geography. Professor W. M. Davis of Harvard University, has been appointed director of the ex-cursion. The party has fifty round trip members and some twenty or more temporary members."

WOULD HAVE STATE OPERATE TELEPHONE

PORTLAND, June 1.—Power to build and operate a public telephone or telegraph system will be granted to the state or any city of Oregon if an initiative measure prepared by the East Side Business Men's Club is ap-proved when placed on the ballot next November.

The club members insist that tele-phone service from state owned and operated telephone lines would not cost any individual subscriber more than \$1 a month, and they use this rate as contrasted with present rates as an argument for the public going into the business.

The measure, which has already been prepared, not only gives the state power to construct and operate lines, but conveys power to condemn and buy telephone properties now in use. Long distance connections be-yond the state are also allowable.

The business of the public tele-phone company is to be administered by a committee.

"If we do not succeed in getting this measure, which is highly import-ant to the people of Oregon, on the ballot for the November election, we shall spend the time between now and the election following in educating and crystallizing public sentiment in this particular," said Chairman Lep-per of the East Side Club committee.

WOMEN LOSE BEAUTY WHEN THEY TALK MUCH

BOSTON, Mass., June 4.—"Wom-en talk too much. They'd be better looking if they listened more," said Dr. Charles M. Green in a public lec-ture on "The Hygiene of Women" at the Harvard Medical school.

"That's why they are so nervous. They talk too much and they go too much. They spend energy talking

that should be applied to other ends. "The woman of the days before the factories took the burden of house-keeping outside the home kept fully occupied, but they stayed at home in peace. They spent no energy on the going to clubs and social affairs, and they had better health for it."

"What the woman of today needs is a daily quiet hour. Few women real-ize how little rest they take and how much they need it. I do not say that they should sleep. But if they would only go away by themselves for one hour each day and lie down and relax, physically and mentally, it would be of untold benefit to their nerves."

PAYS \$40 AN INCH FOR MAIN STREET PROPERTY

What is said to be the highest price ever paid for real estate in Klamath Falls is reported to have passed between Chas. Swingle and C. E. Riley in a deal a few days ago. It is said that Mr. Swingle, who owns the property and building occupied by the Van Riper grocery on Main street, needed fifteen inches of prop-erty on the west side of his lot very badly. It is said that his building overlapped just that much on the other man's lot. As Mr. Riley had wanted to begin the erection of a two-story fire proof building, it was necessary for Mr. Swingle to either move his building over or get a deed to the land. He couldn't very well move, as another man owned the property on the east side, so he bought the fifteen inches, paying \$600 or at the rate of \$40 an inch.

WEST SIDERS HAVE A PIPE LINE

OPEN DITCH ON WEST SIDE OF RIVER IS CLOSED UP AND REPLACED WITH SIX-INCH PIPE LINE

The property owners on the west side of the river has set a good ex-ample to those who have to put up with the Ankeny canal nuisance. The property along West Main street re-ceive irrigation water from an ex-tension of the government canal. This ditch has until just recently been open, and in much the same condi-tion as the old Ankeny canal.

O. H. Breneman was employed, and he put in a six-inch pipe connecting with the government canal at the power plant and running along the side of the hill past the Stearns place. This was done at a cost of less than \$1,000, and is paid for by the prop-erty owners, who are connecting with the large pipe and using the water to irrigate their lawns and gardens.

TAFT CONTROLS THE COMMITTEE

THE ROOSEVELTERS WILL BE TURNED DOWN

Result of State Convention in Ohio Brings Joy to Followers of President—He Is Winner in the First Preliminary Round at Chicago—Teddy Is Going to Take Personal Charge

CHICAGO, June 4.—Harry New has indicated that the Taft men in-tend to emphasize the Taft control of the national committee when it meets on Thursday. He will refuse to seat the Roosevelt recently elected as national committeemen, and will insist that these must wait until after the new committee orga-nizes following the convention. Robert Howell, chosen Nebraska commit-tee-man at the recent primaries, will be turned down. Roosevelt of Nebras-ka will be elected chairman of the national committee. Taftites are jubilant that Taft carried the Ohio convention, insisting it is a forecast of victory at the Chicago convention. Headquarters will start real activi-ties tomorrow.

It is expected that Roosevelt will come here as a result of the Ohio con-vention and take personal charge next week. It is generally accepted that if the vote should be adverse to the Colonel on the first real con-vention test vote, that the Roosevelt-ers will bolt and go to the auditorium and organize a separate convention to nominate Roosevelt. Beveridge will undoubtedly be his running mate.

Taftites Control Ohio

COLUMBUS, Ohio, June 4.—Taft-ites are in control of the state con-vention. On an attempt of the Roose-velt-ers to substitute a resolution en-dorsing Roosevelt, for a majority re-port endorsing Taft, the Taftites won by 392 1/2 to 359 1/2, six delegates-at-large were elected for Taft.

After electing Taft delegates-at-large, the convention took a recess until July 2, when the state ticket will be named.

Elect Taft Delegates

COLUMBUS, Ohio, June 4.—Later Taft delegates-at-large were elected by 390 1/2 to 362 1/2. Nearly every large county in the state supported Taft. It is rumored that the Roose-velt-ers are planning to bolt.

INTERVENTION DRAWING NEAR

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 5.—State department dispatches give the information that the Prairie landed 450 marines at Guantanamo to guard American interests nearby.

The American consul reports that conditions everywhere in Cuba indi-cate that the rebellion is passing be-yond the control of President Gomez. The Paduan will probably land a body of marines at Santiago this af-ternoon.

President Taft has decided to rush four of the battleships now at Key West to Guantanamo. Secretary Knox said it was merely a precaution-ary measure.

Idlest Plat Filed

The plat of Idlest on Spring Creek was filed with the county clerk Tuesday by R. C. Spink, owner of the resort. Lots along the creek in this new town are on the market, and a number of the local people are making their selections. It is the in-tention of Mr. Spink to give Klamath people the first choice.
