

## BULL MOOSERS TO MEET MONDAY

### SLATE OF CONVENTION FRAMED AT OYSTER BAY

Roosevelt Will Be Placed in Nomination by Pendergast, While Johnson and Lindsay Will Do the Seconding. Democrat of New Orleans Will Be the Permanent Chairman of the Convention

CHICAGO, July 30.—The national progressive convention will open at noon Monday in this city. There will probably be an evening session the first day.

Former Senator Beveridge will deliver the keynote speech, and will outline the party platform.

OYSTER BAY, July 30.—Colonel Roosevelt conferred for three hours with Senator Dixon of Montana today. The latter announced at the conclusion of the conference that John Parker, democrat, of New Orleans, will be permanent chairman of the convention. Pendergast will place Colonel Roosevelt in nomination for the presidency, and the seconding speeches will be by Judge Lindsay of Colorado and Governor Johnson of California.

### DEMS OPPOSE TARIFF BILLS

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 30.—The wool, sugar and excise bills passed by the senate are before the house today.

Representative Underwood, democratic majority leader, urges the returning of all the bills to the senate without concurring in them. He objects to the amendments to the excise bill, which repeals reciprocity and establishes a tariff board.

The house late this afternoon disapproved by a vote of 172 to 56 the La Follette wool bill as passed by the senate. The bill was returned to the senate without asking for a conference.

### HANFORD PROBE MAY CONTINUE

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 30.—Congressmen McCoy and Graham, members of the congressional investigation committee, arrived here today. Congressman Higgins, the third member of the committee, is resting at his home in Norwich, Conn.

Mr. McCoy denied that it had been agreed to end the investigation if Judge Hanford would resign.

The judiciary committee of the house will meet tomorrow and decide whether or not to dismiss the charges against Judge Hanford.

### POLITICIANS ARE MIXED IN NEW YORK MURDER CASE

NEW YORK, July 30.—The grand jury resumed its investigation into the Rosenthal murder today. A score of police officers are facing indictment and a number of prominent citizens, including powerful politicians, are involved. Prominent sporting men have fled from the city overnight.

Police Lieutenant Becker is in the Tombs. Vallon, Rose and Webber are being closely guarded in the city prison. These men have asserted that Becker ordered them to murder Rosenthal, promising them police protection. They assert that Harry Harrowitz, alias "Gyp the Blood," Frank Muller, alias "Whitey" Lewis, Louis Rosenzweig, alias "Lefty Lou," and "Dago" Frank Cirofici were the actual murderers.

### DARROW DENIES ALL CHARGES

LOS ANGELES, July 30.—Clarence Darrow was called to the witness stand today in the trial in which he is charged with bribery. He went over the entire case, denying from the beginning in detail every charge brought against him by the prosecution.

He flatly denied that Franklin had ever told him that Bain and his wife had been given money. Darrow denied that he had ever heard of Frank Fowler going to Talesman Kreuger and, putting four matches on the table, saying "A thousand apiece."

The witness declared that he had never had any conversation with Franklin about bribing anyone.

### CONGRESS PUTS TAFT IN HOLE

WASHINGTON, July 26.—The La Follette wool bill, which passed the senate yesterday, is identical with the bill vetoed by President Taft a year ago. House leaders intend either to accept the bill or modify it only slightly, thereby "putting the president in a hole."

Senator La Follette admits that the bill is based on the report of the tariff board.

President Taft is expected to veto the measure.

It is believed that the democrats and progressives may unite further and pass the sugar revision and income tax bills.

### DIAZ IS WELL

#### Former Mexican President Denies a Rumor

PARIS, July 27.—Ex-President Diaz, who was reported to be seriously ill, is here, having his teeth attended to. He denied that he is ill.

A report was started yesterday to the effect that the former president was near death.

### DIAZ REPORTED TO BE NEAR DEATH

MEXICO CITY, July 27.—A special cable received here today says that ex-President Diaz is seriously ill in Paris, and his recovery seems doubtful. Officials have not been advised, and it is impossible to confirm the report.

### CRATER LAKE IS SENATOR'S HOBBY

#### CHAMBERLAIN HAS ATTRACTED ATTENTION TO OREGON BY HIS ENTHUSIASM FOR WONDERFUL LAKE

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 30.—One of the hobbies of Senator Chamberlain for many years past has been the improvement of Crater Lake National Park. He, with other loyal and enthusiastic Oregonians, worked for the creation of a national park, for the better preservation of the wonderful lake, which has no counterpart anywhere in the known world.

Largely through Senator Chamberlain's efforts, aided materially by it known, by those of his colleagues in the Oregon delegation in congress as well as by many of the "folks at home," congress gave substantial recognition to the Crater Lake park.

In congress Senator Chamberlain took up the cudgels for the national parks against the attacks of Senators Reed, Bacon and others, alleging that the "see America first" movement would be greatly aided if congress made the parks easier of access and provided reasonable accommodations for travelers who want to see the wonders they contained.

The fame of Crater Lake has spread over the land of late years, and now popular lectures are given with this wonder of nature as the subject. From a Washington paper of recent date this notice is reprinted:

"The Crater Lake of Crater Lake National Park and the cliff dwelling of Colorado were described by E. P. Cowell of the Franklin Institute of Philadelphia in a free illustrated lecture at the Pastime theater. Several of the adult spectators declared it was one of the best lectures and most beautifully illustrated that has yet been given at the theater in the free educational campaign for school children, which is being conducted jointly there by the manager, A. J. Bachrach, and Mr. Cowell. The audience attending the session was unusually large and representative.

"Besides Mr. Cowell's lecture, Maj. James McLaughlin, Indian inspector for the interior department, spoke briefly describing the regions which were the subject of the lecture, and told of a few of his travels in that part of the country.

"Mr. Cowell told the children that Crater Lake was about five miles in diameter, and was formed in the crater of an extinct volcano. It was first discovered by white men, he said, in 1853, although the Indians were aware of its existence for generations. The story of the cliff dwellers and something of their manner of living was also imparted to the children.

"The views of Crater Lake were shown in the natural colors, many of them showing the deep blue of the water and the cloudiness of the sky called forth applause."

### Dockers' Strike Ends Suddenly

LONDON, July 27.—The strike of the dock workers came to a sudden termination today.

No explanation has been given for this sudden turn of affairs, and every effort to arrive at the real facts has been unavailing.

The strike has been in progress for ten weeks, and the suffering incidental thereto has been terrible. Thousands of women and children have suffered the pangs of hunger, and there have been numerous deaths which have been traced directly to the strike.

### MEN FIGHT FOR COMPANIONS' LIVES

UNIONTOWN, Pa., July 27.—One hundred rescuers are fighting today to save the lives of Peter Evans, John Scanlon and John Groschak, who were marooned in the flooding of the Lamont mine. The trio were caught 1,800 feet from the mouth of the tunnel. Pumps are at work to reduce the water in the mine.

## FREE SUGAR IS SURE OF PASSAGE

### SENATE WILL VOTE ON MEASURE THIS AFTERNOON

Lodge Declares That All Civilized Countries Maintain Duty on Commodity Because Rich Are More Apt to Be Taxed as Result—The Excise Bill Will Provide Revenue Lost by Measure

WASHINGTON, July 27.—The free sugar bill providing for the reduction of 30 cents per hundredweight on raw sugar, making it \$1.60 per hundred, was presaged by the vote of the senate committee of the whole. The vote was 27 to 26 on the Lodge amendment providing for such reduction.

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 27.—The senate will vote on the democratic bill for the removal of duty on sugar before night. The bill will, in all probability, pass with slight amendments. The bill provides for the elimination of duty on raw sugar and abolishes the duty on the standards of colors.

The excise is designed to offset the loss of revenue resulting from free sugar.

Senator Lodge led the attack on the free sugar bill. He said:

"Every civilized nation taxes sugar. Those best able to pay are taxed by a duty on sugar, because they are the chief purchasers of luxuries wherein sugar is used. The free sugar theory embodied in the house bill appears to be that if the sugar duty were removed the entire benefit would come to the consumer."

The democratic minority of the senate finance committee reported that they did not believe that it was wise to surrender \$50,000,000 of revenue in one bill.

### BLIND MAN TO MANAGE WILSON

SEAGIRT, N. J., July 27.—Professor Wilson arrived home today, bringing with him his completed speech of acceptance. It will be printed Monday.

Senator Gore conferred with Wilson this afternoon. The blind statesman will probably manage the democratic western campaign office in either Denver or San Francisco.

### ORDER SURVEY STATE HIGHWAY

SACRAMENTO, July 26.—The state highway commission has issued an order directing that a survey be made of a proposed route for the state highway, starting at a point a short distance north of Redding, Shasta county, where the roads passing through the city of Redding and the one going over the river at Free Bridge meet on the east side, and up the McCloud River, crossing the Sacramento at Antler and thence traversing the bank of the Sacramento to Dunsuir and on to Sisson and the Oregon line.

It has been definitely decided by the commission that if the city of Redding and the county of Shasta constructs the proposed bridge across the Sacramento at Reed's Ferry, that the state highway to be constructed under the \$18,000,000 bond issue will go through the Shasta county seat.

Before the commission orders the survey accepted or calls for bids on this work, however, the city of Redding must show that it will construct this bridge.

This action will mean that the road to be constructed by the state will not leave Redding to the east, and traverse the Sacramento on the eastern bank. The road will hit the McCloud at a point near Baird. It will not go over the McCloud range. It will traverse the Sacramento northward from Antler, where a crossing will be made.

### THAW IS CRAZY

WHITE PLAINS, July 26.—Harry Thaw is still insane.

This is the decision reached by Justice Keough, after a long hearing in which many alienists testified.

The case came up on a writ of habeas corpus.

Thaw was ordered returned to the asylum at Matteawan immediately. He has been in jail here nearly two months. Justice Keough ruled that if Thaw was released he would be a public menace. This is his third attempt to escape from Matteawan.

### REDDING, CALIF., JULY 30.—WILLIAM CLEMENT, confessed slayer of Wm. Landis, was arraigned today for preliminary examination.

In a voice choking at times with emotion, he repeated his confession. "Landis murdered my mother," he said. "Then he taunted us, playing 'Another Shovelful of Dirt on Mother's Grave.'"

"Then I ambushed him."

The court was crowded with Clement sympathizers. An acquittal is expected.

## WILSON IS HELD UP FOR SCORN

### TRUE BELIEFS OF CANDIDATE DECLARED BY RODENBURG

Speaker Declares That Democrat Is Against Organized Labor and Is Friendly to Chinese Labor—Action of Bryan at Baltimore Is Criticized and the Great Commoner Is Called Unfaithful

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 26.—Representative Rodenburg of Illinois discussed Woodrow Wilson's writings in the house today.

He called Wilson "anti-Jefferson, anti-labor, anti-soldier, pro-Chinese candidate for the presidency."

He referred to Wilson's bacalaureate sermon on organized labor, and commented that he did not agree with Professor Wilson that trade unionists are unprofitable servants.

The speaker said he did not agree with Wilson that the unionist is trying to "give as little as he may for his wages." He quoted the old Wilson letter criticizing Bryan, and added: "This is his honest opinion of Bryan and Bryanism; yet today he is prepared to don the sackcloth and ashes, and eat out of the hand of the man he denounced as an untried claimer."

Rodenburg then roasted Bryan. He said that for "sixteen years Bryan has been democracy's old man of the sea. An impartial historian will write of the betrayal of Clark at Baltimore as marking the acme of perfidy, the culmination of political treachery."

### SUSPECT ACTS LIKE A SPORT

NEW YORK, July 23.—Jauntily swinging his cane, Harry Vallon surrendered to the police today. He is wanted as one of the men riding in the automobile in which the murderers of Rosenthal, the gambler, rode, and in which they made their escape from the officers. He was arraigned on a charge of homicide.

The grand jury has resumed hearings. On Mayor Gaynor's orders the police are now co-operating with District Attorney Whitman in the effort to break up the gambling syndicate.

Mrs. Rosenthal told the grand jury the inside of the gambling situation in New York. She was the only witness today. She said her husband had always paid heavily for police protection, and named one police captain and two inspectors who had received the money.

It is doubtful whether the story can be substantiated.

A general alarm has been sent to the big cities of the country for the arrest of the men believed to have been the actual murderers. It is believed that some of them are hiding in the West.

The fugitives include "Dago" Frank, Whitney Lewis, "Lefty" Loewy, Harry Horowitz, alias "Gib, the Blood," "Red" Wagner and "Humpty" Jackson.

### BABY LARGEST EVER BORN IN CALIFORNIA

BAKERSFIELD, July 27.—Kern county boasts the largest baby ever born in the state. The infant, a boy, born July 22, to Mrs. P. H. Petersen of this city, weighed 14 pounds and 5 ounces. The measurements of the child are: Height, 23 inches; around head, 15 inches ear to ear; neck 8 inches; chest, 15 inches; across the shoulders, 7 1/2 inches.

### Editors to Participate

CHICAGO, July 27.—Editors Earl of Los Angeles, Nelson of Kansas City and Van Valkenburg of Philadelphia have called a meeting of the progressive editors of the United States to meet here August 3.

### SCHOOL INDEMNITY LANDS NOT YET READY

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 27.—At the instance of Governor West, Senator Chamberlain inquired of the general land office why it suspended the state school indemnity selections pending nomination in the field as to the mineral character of the land, the power site and irrigation possibilities. The governor thought it was none of the government's business. The land office replies that under an office order of November 29, 1910, and a departmental order of January 11, 1912, the department must make such examinations.

### Two Suspects Held

NEW YORK, July 27.—As a result of the testimony of Kresse, the waiter, Jake Webber has been held in the Tombs without bail on a charge of murder. He will be held until the inquest, August 15th.

The coroner has also held Jack Sullivan without bail for complicity in the Rosenthal murder. He has been remanded to the Tombs.

## HEIRESS BODY FOUND

### Mystery of Missing Girl Is at Last Solved

CATSKILL, N. Y., July 29.—A body of a girl was found near here yesterday. It has been positively identified as that of Miss Dorcas Snodgrass, the missing New York heiress.

### TAFT PROBING HANFORD CASE

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 27.—Hanford's letter of resignation has arrived, and President Taft has ordered it filed until the subcommittee returns to this city. He will then decide whether to accept it or not.

In the event of the president being convinced that impeachment proceedings should continue, he will reject the resignation.

### WAITER SAW NEW YORK MURDER

#### MAN SEEN IN THE FATEFUL AUTOMOBILE IS IDENTIFIED IN COURT ROOM AND IS IMMEDIATELY ARRESTED

NEW YORK, July 26.—Louis Kresse, a waiter, testified at the corner's inquest today that he had seen the slaying of Rosenthal. He heard the shots and saw Webber running away from the scene. Asked if he saw anyone in the court room whom he had seen in the auto in which were riding the murderers of Rosenthal, the witness pointed to Jack Sullivan, an East Side gambler, who was at once placed under arrest on the charge of murder.

The police are trying to arrest Sam Schepps, the only Rosenthal murder suspect now at liberty. Shapiro's confession involved Schepps. "Dago" Frank Palmer was arrested last night in Harlem.

Mayor Gaynor has written to Police Commissioner Waldo, ordering him to reinstate Police Lieutenant Becker, who has been suspended. The mayor criticized the newspapers severely for their stand taken in the gambling situation.

### MRS. DARROW TO GO ON THE STAND

LOS ANGELES, July 26.—Earl Rogers, attorney for Clarence Darrow, stated this afternoon that Mrs. Darrow would follow Davis on the witness stand. It is not known concerning what she will testify, but it is expected that she will deny portions of Harrington's testimony.

The entire morning session was taken up with the cross-examination of Davis by District Attorney Fredericks in a futile effort to tangle up the witness on the details of the plan to have the McNamaras plead guilty two days before Lockwood was alleged to have been bribed.

The gist of Davis' testimony was that the McNamaras had been ready to change their pleas, and that District Attorney Fredericks had been so advised two days before the Lockwood bribery was alleged to have passed.

### SAN FRANCISCO, July 26.—

Charges that Jim McNamara is being kept in solitary confinement in San Quentin and abused by his keeper, as part of a plot of Burns' detectives to make him "come through" were made here today, following a visit to the penitentiary by a committee of the Trades and Labor Council, headed by ex-Mayor McCarthy, Twitmore and Clancy.

The labor leaders interviewed Warden Hoyle to ascertain why Jim McNamara was kept in solitary confinement. They told the warden that Malcolm McLaren, a Burns detective, had been secretly in the prison. Hoyle denied this, but an examination of the records show that McLaren was there.

The laborites also declared that a guard named Grub had prodded Jim with a stick. Grub, it was stated, had declared that he hoped McNamara would be put in his ward; that he would "raise hell with them."

Hoyle refused to allow the laborites to talk with McNamara, and declared that the visit would not shorten the solitary confinement sentence of the prisoner. He maintained that Jim McNamara had been put in solitary confinement because of mutiny.

The laborites pleaded that Jim and John be given fair play.

### LIL' ANTHUR TO QUIT FIGHTING

CHICAGO, July 30.—Jack Johnson issued a statement today to the effect that he has "quit the prize ring forever. He declares that even a purse of \$100,000 would not cause him to change his determination never to fight again.

## BE GOOD OR BE SEVERELY SPANKED

### MEXICAN LEADER IS WARNED BY STATE DEPARTMENT

Orozco Is Notified That He Will Be Held Responsible Unless Attacks on Americans in Mexico Cease—State Department Figuring How to Avoid War—Congress Votes Relief for Americans in Distress

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 30.—The state department today telegraphed to General Orozco an ultimatum. It is in effect that he will be held responsible unless the attacks on Americans in Mexico cease.

The state department is figuring on how to protect Americans without declaring war and intervening in Mexico.

The senate and house today passed a resolution appropriating \$20,000 for the relief of American refugees in El Paso.

### ISMAI WAS RIGHT IN LEAVING SHIP ACCORDING TO JUDGES

LONDON, July 30.—Lord Mersey, chairman of the commission inquiring into the Titanic disaster, reported today that the commission had decided that excessive speed had been responsible, and that the poor arrangements for launching and manning lifeboats had been responsible for the great loss of life.

The commission found that Bruce Ismay, managing director of the company owning the Titanic, had not been obliged to remain on the Titanic. If he had done so it would have been the needless loss of another life.

### Vote on Tax Bill Soon

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 27.—The excise tax bill has been made a special order of business. A vote is expected at 8 o'clock tonight. The bill proposes to extend the excise tax to individuals.

### Britain Satisfied

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 27.—British Charge d'Affaires Innes today notified Secretary of State Knox that England would not protest the free passage of American vessels through the Panama canal beyond the formal note already presented.

### SIMPLE CLOTHES TO AID BEAUTY CULTURE

ST. LOUIS, July 30.—Mrs. Lillian Stuart's lecture here on "Our Foolish Clothes" is the one topic of conversation with St. Louis women. Mrs. Stuart makes use of the leg of a skeleton, charts and pictures to illustrate her address, which was given under the auspices of Miss Alice Thomas, a sister of Augustus Thomas, the playwright.

"I might say I wear only three garments," said Mrs. Stuart. "They are a waist and a skirt, which snap together like the fastenings of a glove, and a one-piece union suit."

Mrs. Stuart then referred to the "one-piece union suit" as a "three-in-one" undergarment. Its principal advantage, as far as the laymen could gather, is that it helps eliminate the waist line. Mrs. Stuart does not like the habit of wearing thirty-eight inches of waist in a size 30 garment. She blames this as the cause of all manner of ills.

### Honor Policeman

SAN FRANCISCO, July 29.—Three hundred policemen acted as a guard of honor at the funeral of Policeman Lates, who was murdered last week. There is no trace of his assassin.

### "WHAT'S GOOD FOR HORSE IS ALSO GOOD FOR A MAN"

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 31.—Senator Stephenson of Wisconsin, the oldest member of the senate, confided to a newspaper man at the White House the other afternoon a few of the secrets of his hearty old age.

"One pill of aloe a day keeps a man fit," said the sage of the Wisconsin lumber camps. "Aloe keeps a horse in condition, and what's good for horses is good for man."

"Unkle Ikke" said he had successfully prescribed snuff for the deafness of former Senators McLaurin, McEnery and Daniels.

"What's a good cure for obesity?" asked a corpulent reporter.

"Six months with an axe in a Wisconsin lumber camp," the senator replied.

### CALIFORNIA STOCK BEING BROUGHT HERE
