NO MONOPOLY IN AUTO TRAVEL

SUPERINTENDENT ARANT ANNOUNCES RULING OF DEPARTMENT OF INTERIOR ON TRAFFIC INTO NATIONAL PARK

As a result of a ruling of the department of the interior, a monopoly in the automobile traffic into Crater Lake Park will not be made possible.

W. F. Arant, superintendent of the park, in an interview with The Herald this morning, announced the rules governing traffic into the park.

"The regulations provide for a license fee of \$1 for each auto trip into the park," said Mr. Arant. "The license fee for the season is \$5. These fees apply only to private machines, not carrying paid passengers. Licenses are issued by the superintendent of the park."

"Persons desiring to engage in carrying passengers into the park must secure a license direct from the secretary of the interior. The fee for this license is \$10 for the season. All autos under these rules are eligible to run in and through the park."

TREE BLIGHT IS PREVALENT

O. A. Stearns, fruit inspector, declares that there is prevalent in Klamath Falls tree blight, and today he was out notifying tree owners to take steps to put a stop to the tree disease.

"There is a prevalence of tree blight in the city," said Mr. Stearns. "I have noticed a number of trees in the gardens and yards in the city that are affected."

"Wherever the dead leaves and twigs are seen in fruit trees they should be removed at once by cutting off below the affected part. If this is not done, and soon, it will become necessary to cut up and burn the entire tree to prevent the spread of the disease, which is very contagious. All cuttings should be immediately burned."

"I would warn tree owners to attend to this at once, and avoid expense and trouble later."

LACKING LICENSE 3 ARE PINCHED

Charged with selling wagons without a license, Walter Sears and John Kellerman were arrested in this city and Clarence Hunter was taken into custody at Midland.

The men were taken before Justice Graves and their bonds fixed at \$1,000 each. At a late hour Friday afternoon the men gave security, and were released.

COUNTY FAIR IS TO BE HELD

ARRANGEMENTS ARE COMPLETED BY THE AGRICULTURAL ASSOCIATION AND DATES ARE SELECTED

A meeting was held Thursday by the directors of the Agricultural Association and definite plans made for holding a fair this fall, on September 25, 26, 27 and 28. C. T. Oliver was selected to have the management of the fair.

Circular letters are to be printed containing the program schedule and premium list, and these are to be mailed to all of the farmers of the county. Between \$1,200 and \$1,500 will be given in cash premiums, which will cover exhibits of cattle, horses, swine, poultry, grain, vegetables, potatoes, fruits, farm exhibits and best hoots.

In addition to the fair there is to be a good program of races, and the Woodmen of the World will hold a "Log Rolling" during the week, which is expected to bring 5,000 visitors here from out of the county.

FARMER ARGUES FOR LIVES OF COYOTES AND BOBCATS

That a law should be enacted removing the bounty on coyotes and bobcats is the opinion of J. H. Van Meter, a prominent farmer of Olene, who was here Saturday. He urges that instead of killing the varmints mentioned, farmers should give them a chicken dinner occasionally, but not often enough to prevent their waging war on the rabbits.

"If something is not done to kill off the rabbits in the vicinity of Olene we might just as well give up farming there," said Mr. Van Meter this afternoon. "The bounty of \$1.50 each for coyotes and \$2 each for bobcats has made them very scarce, and with their extermination has come the growth in number of rabbits."

"In my opinion rabbits do far more harm than do coyotes and bobcats. Occasionally a coyote will steal a chicken, but for my part I will willingly provide a chicken dinner once in a while for a coyote or bobcat if by so doing I will encourage the animals to stay around and hunt rabbits."

"There has been a great slaughter for years of coyotes, and the result is that the rabbits have accumulated so rapidly that they have become an actual menace. Give the coyotes a chance, I say, and the rabbits will soon be reduced in numbers. The benefit to the farmer will be great."

SALTPETER ON MT. WAGONTIRE

The Harney County News states it is watching closely the steps that are in progress for revealing and bringing into use the natural resources which are so plentiful throughout this part of Oregon, but as yet closely hidden from the ordinary eye.

The News says the latest revelation in this line is a rich deposit of saltpetre, or nitrate of soda, which exists in the west side of Wagontire mountain, about sixty miles south of Burns on the Harney and Lake county line. There is a little uncertainty yet as to the extent of the deposit, but its quality has been established beyond doubt, and it is declared to be the nearest pure saltpetre of any found in the United States.

Leonard Cole of Vale, who has known of the deposit for some years, went there last week accompanied by E. Melzor, an expert mineralogist from Baker, and Percy Johnson, a civil engineer. They ran out the lines so as to ascertain the exact position of the ground, made thorough investigation and staked out a number of claims with a view to making a complete test of the possibilities later.

The route of the Harriman railroad lies within a few miles of the saltpetre mine, and with the building of that line development work will be prosecuted vigorously if the quantity proves to be what is indicated.

Great secrecy was observed by Mr. Cole and his associates, and it is their policy to pretend at present that they have not found anything of great importance, but the News says it was on the trail at once, and knows there is a big thing in sight there for this country.

Saltpetre is an important article of commerce, in the production of which Chili and Peru have their principal sources of revenue.

BORES FOR WATER: OPENS GOLD MINE

Finding a promising ledge of gold as well as a splendid supply of water is the good fortune of Louis Scheld, a prominent land owner near Yreka.

Scheld, when he commenced boring for artesian water, expected to find both gold and water, and the result proves that his theories were correct. He has not found artesian water, but expects to find enough to irrigate several hundred acres of land.

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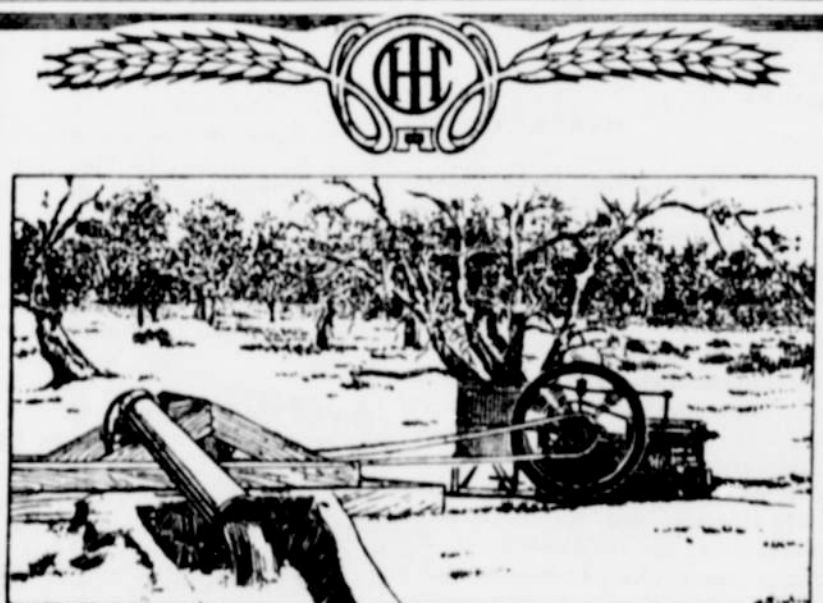
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
