EUGENE CASE IS POLICE BAFFLER

EUGENE, Ore., Aug. 20.—Lying in bed with her head almost severed from her body, little Mildred Green was found this morning.

The house was undisturbed, and there is no clue to the perpetrator of the horrible crime.

The body was discovered by the child's father, a Baptist minister, at 8 o'clock this morning.

The murdered girl was but 12 years of age.

Every effort is being made by the local authorities to obtain some clue on which to work, but so far there has not been discovered a single fact which would tend to point to the murderer.

TERROR REIGNS IN CHINESE REPUBLIC: SOLDIERS WATCH

PEKING, Aug. 20.—Troops are everywhere. The presidential headquarters are surrounded, and a reign of terror exists.

The lives of all prominent men are considered unsafe.

Yuan fears assassination. Only his closest and truest friends are allowed to approach him.

It is believed that bomb throwers are prepared to kill the president.

Li Yuan Hung, vice president, is now the bitter enemy of Yuan.

It is believed that Sun Yat Sen is safe at sea between Shanghai and Tientsin, en route to Peking.

SAVES RELATIVE: NOW HE'S SORRY

GENEVA, Aug. 21.—While returning home from work along the bank of the Rhone, at Bellegarde, a young mechanic named Dubois heard cries of distress, and seeing a woman struggling in the stream he plunged in and started to tow her to safety.

Just as his feet touched bottom, Dubois discovered to his disgust that he had saved his mother-in-law, with whom he had been on bad terms for some time. He promptly threw her out into the water again, and walked away swearing.

Fortunately at this juncture a boatman who had put out into the river, picked up the woman, who otherwise would have been drowned.

The mother-in-law has decided not to prosecute Dubois.

CHINKS STILL IN FIGHTING MOOD

NEW LEADER OF REPUBLIC MAY BE ASSASSINATED

Army Is Being Organized and Fighting Seems Certain—Foreigners Fear Result of Squabble—There Is Already Considerable Anti-Foreign Sentiment—Sun Will Have a Body Guard When He Goes to Peking

TIENTSIN, China, Aug. 19.—Foreigners here are alarmed over the prospects of fighting when Sun Yat Sen arrives en route to Peking. Sun is determined to charge Yuan with murdering his generals.

It is feared that Sun's life will be attempted in Peking. A bodyguard is being organized to accompany him to the capital.

SHANGHAI, Aug. 19.—Sun Yat Sen's agents are mobilizing an army here. It is expected that fully 300,000 men will be under arms this week. A clash is regarded as certain. There is considerable anti-foreign sentiment.

STAND COLLAPSES; MANY INJURED

MARSHALL NOTIFICATION CEREMONIES INAUSPICIOUS

Three Hundred Persons Fall and Fifty Are Injured—Stampede Follows the Collapse and a Number of People Are Injured in the Rush. In Spite of Serious Nature of Collapse, No One Is Killed

INDIANAPOLIS, Aug. 20.—A stand filled with spectators collapsed during the notification ceremonies here today.

Three hundred persons fell. About fifty were injured; none fatally.

Immediately following the falling of the stand, there was a stampede, and a number of people were slightly injured in this.

RED CHIEFS HONOR WHITES

GLACIER PARK, Mont., Aug. 20.—Louis W. Hill, chairman of the board of directors of the Great Northern railroad; Harvey P. Bittner of Spokane and Charles Griffin of St. Paul were adopted into the tribe of Black-foot Indians at the celebration of "The Night of Black Tail" at Maries Lake.

The ceremonies, which lasted three hours, were conducted by Boss Riba, chief medicine man of the tribe, and were followed by the "Black Tail" dance.

The white men were given Indian names, which were entered on the enormous roll of elk skin that constitutes the directory of the tribe. Hill became "Gray Horse," Bittner was christened "Mountain Chief," and Griffin was given the name of "Lame Bull."

Louis Hill, chairman of the board of directors of the Great Northern, and advertised as the "Man Who Made the West," will not come to Klamath Falls this month. In fact he has passed up the Central Oregon Development League meeting in Lakeview, and has gone to St. Paul.

J. R. Stinson, manager for the Oregon Western Colonization company in Crook and Harney counties, a concern in which Mr. Hill is heavily interested, arrived in the city last night with this information:

"Mr. Hill wired me that he had been obliged to return to St. Paul from Glacier National Park," said Mr. Stinson. "W. P. Davidson, president of our company, likewise will be unable to attend the meeting in Lakeview."

Mr. Stinson with his wife and Dr. and Mrs. J. H. Resenberg of Prineville, left home at 9:10 Sunday morning and arrived at Crater Lake, by auto, at 8:50 the same night. They came on to this city Monday, and left this morning for Lakeview.

"The colonization company has about 800,000 acres of land in four counties, Crook, Harney, Lind and Malheur," said Mr. Stinson. "This land we are selling rapidly. The prices range from \$5 to \$80 an acre. The price is fixed under the Hill plan of a price that will yield a profit to the farmer of 10 per cent."

"We have recently opened offices in Spokane and Seattle, and are getting very good results from our present selling campaign."

HUTTON PASSES DARROW CASE

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 20.—Preferring not to hear the argument on the motion to dismiss the second indictment against Clarence Darrow, Judge Hutton announced this afternoon that when the case is called he will pass it out to Presiding Judge Willis.

The argument of Attorney Earl Rogers will be heard Monday morning.

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PARIS, Aug. 20.—Madame Sembrich is suffering much pain from a severe fracture of her left wrist, sustained a few days ago at Onchy. She returned to a trolley car from which she had just alighted to rescue her favorite dachshund. She fell and broke the wrist bone. Mme. Sembrich will sail on September 18th for the United States, where she will give sixty concerts.

WESTVILLE MEN WILL BE PAROLED

MEDFORD, Aug. 20.—Westville honor camp No. 1 is to be temporarily abandoned, owing to the remarkably good condition of the honor men at work on the Crater Lake highway who have shown themselves to be entitled to parole and the scarcity of honor men at Salem.

Warden Curtis of the Oregon penitentiary arrived in Medford for the purpose of paroling the men. As there are no other men available, the camp will have to be temporarily abandoned. The demand in state institutions and from other counties for men far exceeds the supply available. The county court some time ago made application for men, and greatly regrets the abandonment of the camp.

Westville honor camp No. 1, was established last November at the Peeler ranch on Upper Rogue river. Since that time the honor men have constructed several miles of excellent mountain road, their work receiving the highest commendation from all who have inspected it. The men worked under the direction of a foreman furnished by Jackson county, but without any guard whatever. Practically all of the men proved worthy of the trust reposed in them by Governor West, and faithfully kept their promises to him.

HUNGARY FAVORS VOTES FOR WOMEN

BUDAPEST, Hungary, Aug. 20.—Women suffrage is making rapid strides in Hungary, as the government, it is semi-officially reported, intends to introduce a bill into Parliament for the enfranchisement of 80,000 women. These are to include owners of property, proprietors of businesses and holders of the title of doctor.

Balloon Is Safe

SANTA PAULA, Aug. 20.—The balloon California landed here today. The passengers and pilots were safe.

INDIANAPOLIS, Aug. 20.—Thomas R. Marshall was formally notified of his nomination on the democratic ticket for the vice presidency this morning. Woodrow Wilson and Chairman McComb were unable to attend.

The ceremonies were held in the Democratic club rooms. Samuel Ralston, democratic candidate for governor, introduced Alton B. Parker, chairman of the notification committee.

Following the notification, the distinguished guests toured the city in automobiles, and then attended a reception at the Marshall home. Acting National Chairman McAdoo was present. Tonight he goes to Chicago to open headquarters.

In concluding his address, Governor Marshall said:

"If I doubted that the return of the historic democratic party to power would fall to right the wrongs of industrial life, to wipe out the injustices of legislation and to preserve the opportunity of every man for happiness, then my voice, now weak, would be silent. If I did not believe that in-so-far as human agency can, this party of ours will promote the

brotherhood of mankind, I would here and now repudiate it. But believing as I do that the republic had its origin in an inspiration which did not come from the mere brain of a mere man, but sprang from the heart of humanity, believing that this age more than any which has preceded it calls for conscience and brotherhood in governmental affairs; hoping that every sacrifice of mind and body and personal good which has been made, is a guaranty of the perpetuity of this, the latest and greatest experiment upon the part of a democracy to work out its ideals in government; and trusting that the God of Washington, the founder, and of Lincoln, the preserver, will still be the God of the republic, and will not permit his chosen people to forever wander in the wilderness of legislative sin, I accept upon its platform, the nomination of the democratic party for vice president of the United States. And may my right hand forget her cunning and my tongue cleave to the roof of my mouth if in all my gettings I fail to get that greatest gift—wisdom and understanding to know the heart-break and the need of our common humanity."

SENATE PASSES THE BUDGET BILL

MEASURE WILL NOW GO TO THE PRESIDENT

Resolution to Probe the Soldiers' Home at Santa Monica Is Adopted. Senate Argues on the One Battleship Program—It Will Not Be a Super-Dreadnought—Fur Sealing Will Be Stopped

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 19.—The senate late today adopted the conference report on the naval bill. The house is expected to pass the measure before adjournment tonight, and the measure will probably go to the president tomorrow. Thornton Lodge vainly attempted to have the senate insist on two battleships.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 19.—The senate today passed the new budget bill containing provisions for the abolishment of the commerce court. Senator Overman objected to the amendment eliminating the appropriation for the commerce court, but it was adopted by a vote of 35 to 23.

The resolution of Senator Works providing for an investigation of the National Soldiers' Home at Santa Monica was adopted by the senate.

The senate and house conferees have agreed on a compromise of one \$15,000,000 battleship in the naval bill, and this is expected to end the dispute on this measure. The vessel provided for will not be super-dreadnought, as originally planned.

The conferees also agreed on a bill making the sealing treaty effective. It was agreed to stop the hunting for seals in Alaska for five years. The senate has accepted the conference report.

TRUCE IS FIXED UP FOR FARMERS

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 20.—The Truckee General Electric company has declared a truce with the government over the ownership of the outlet to Lake Tahoe. As a result, there will be averted a serious water famine, and the resulting damage to crops of farmers on the Truckee-Carson irrigation project in Nevada.

The electric company threatened to shut off the water, but agreed not to take this step until September 15th.

MEXICANS BESIEGE BAND OF AMERICANS AND ENGLISH

EL PASO, Texas, Aug. 20.—Mexican federals are en route from Matatlan to Tomlin, a mining camp 80 miles from the coast, where rebels and a federal garrison have been besieging a dozen American and English miners.

The American gunboat Denver is due at Matatlan today, and may send marines into the country thereabouts.

The Americans and English have been without food and water, as well as ammunition for some time, but have continued to fight.

The situation is desperate, and it is feared that there will be a massacre unless relief is sent at once.

CROOKS INDICTED

NEW YORK, Aug. 20.—The grand jury returned seven indictments today charging murder in the first degree. One was a superseding indictment for Becker. The others accused are Whitey Lewis, Dago Frank, Lefty Louie, Gyp the Blood, Jacob Reich, alias Jack Sullivan, and Becker's agent William Shapiro.

HOUSE ASKS FOR AN EXPLANATION

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 20.—By a resolution introduced by Representative Norris of Nebraska, the state department was instructed to investigate the death of James Ward Rogers, reported to have been killed by British soldiers in the African jungles.

Rogers formerly lived in California. His widow is reported to be now living in Oakland.

CALIFORNIA WILL CONTINUE HANGING

SACRAMENTO, Aug. 20.—Because the agitation for the abolition of the death penalty failed to enlist but a few thousand signatures to the petition, Governor Johnson announced today that all seven of the condemned men who had been reprieved from time to time because of the existence of this petition, must die.

Alexander Szafarsky and George Figueroa will be hanged September 6. The other executions will follow a week apart.

Marshal Will Know

INDIANAPOLIS, Aug. 19.—Marshal, democratic candidate for vice-president, will learn officially of his nomination tomorrow, when he will be officially notified. The advance guard has already arrived.
