

BARNES ARRIVED SATURDAY NIGHT

SHERIFF IS BRINGING BACK THE YOUNG GIRL WANTED AS WITNESS AGAINST HER FATHER, CHARGED WITH INCEST

With Bernice Wallen in custody, Sheriff Barnes arrived in the city Saturday night. On the same train was Deputy Sheriff John Schallack having in custody Harriet Fink.

Through the courtesy of a Texas sheriff, Sheriff Barnes went only as far south as Los Angeles in his chase for Bernice Wallen, wanted here as a witness against her father, Arthur Wallen, who is charged with incest.

The girl is supposed to have been splintered out of the country. She was traced through letters to Texas, and the authorities there notified. The word came back that the Texas officer would bring the girl as far as Los Angeles, and Sheriff Barnes went there and the girl was turned over to him.

In order to bring the girl back to this city it became necessary to lodge a charge against her. This was done by charging her with delinquency, an extraditable offense.

RICH WILL SOON BE AT LIBERTY

BOND OF FORMER KLAMATH FALLS SHOE MAN FIXED AT \$1,000, AND WEALTHY RELATIVES WILL PROVIDE IT

C. F. Stone of this city, attorney for L. B. Rich, charged in Grants Pass with bigamy, received word Saturday from his associate counsel there that Rich had been arraigned on an indictment returned by the Josephine county grand jury, and his bond fixed at \$1,000.

Since his arrest in this city Rich has been constantly in confinement, except for a brief period of time when he was released on \$750 bond. Before he had enjoyed more than an hour or two of liberty, the amount of bond was increased to \$2,000, and he was returned to jail.

Mr. Stone received word Saturday that the \$1,000 demanded by the Josephine county court will be speedily furnished, and Rich will be at liberty again.

POWER COMPANY TO FACE A BIG LAWSUIT

The Oregon-California Power company will soon be asked to pay damages as a result of the death of Horace Cox in this city a short time ago. A suit charging the company with the responsibility of the young man's death will be filed in the circuit court next week by relatives.

M. E. Pogue, uncle of the deceased, and a well known Salem attorney, has been in this city for almost a week investigating the death of his nephew and finally it was decided to start an action against the power company. The amount for which suit will be entered had not been determined today, but it is expected that it will be in the neighborhood of \$20,000.

Horace Cox was well known in this city. He was a graduate of the Klamath county high school, and was ambitious to become an attorney. In order to provide funds with which to complete his education, he accepted a position from the power company, and was employed in this city as store keeper.

On the day of his untimely death a heavy wind prevailed, and power lines had crossed telephone lines. Young Cox notified the company's lineman, and then proceeded to the scene of the trouble. He was climbing a telegraph pole, presumably to attend to his duties of turning on street lights, when he came in contact with a high voltage wire. He fell to the ground, and when assistance arrived he was dead.

CLEVELAND TAKES LEAVE OF CITY PLAN TO MAKE RODEO A FIXTURE

WELL KNOWN EMPLOYEE OF THE RECLAMATION SERVICE ACCEPTS POSITION WITH CALIFORNIA HIGHWAY COMMISSION

A. B. Cleveland, who has been connected with the local reclamation service in this city for the past three and a half years, has accepted an engineering position in the headquarters office of the California State Highway commission, and left for Sacramento with his family Sunday.

Mr. Cleveland has been with the reclamation service for seven and a half years, and previous to that time was connected with the public works department of Massachusetts, including water, park and rapid transit systems. All of the appointments of the California State Highway commission have been made on merit, without consideration of political affiliation, and the selection of Mr. Cleveland is a just recognition of his ability and fitness.

Argument for the Initiative Millage Bill

Editor Republican:

The initiative millage tax bill, providing for a six-tenths of a mill tax, four-sevenths for the use of the Agricultural College, and three-sevenths for the use of the university, and providing also for a single board of regents, was prepared by a joint committee from the governor's special commission appointed to solve Oregon's higher educational problem, and from the boards of regents of the two institutions working in conjunction with the governor and with the presidents of the two institutions, and is offered as a substitute for all the present legislative bills for support and government of the two institutions.

This bill does not increase the average rate of taxation for the support of the two institutions as shown during the last ten years. The average during this period is a trifle over six-tenths of a mill.

The state of Washington is at present paying for the same purpose seventeen-hundredths of a mill more than the Oregon bill calls for, namely, forty-five hundredths of a mill for the university and thirty-two hundredths of a mill for the Agricultural college.

The growth of the two institutions will certainly keep pace with the growth of wealth in the state, as has been shown by the experience of all other states using the millage basis of support.

This bill expressly repeals the \$500,000 appropriations of the legislative session of two years ago, now submitted to the voters under the referendum (official numbers on the ballot 372, 373, 374, 375) for their approval or rejection.

The present standing appropriations to be continued for one year are most urgently needed to give the institutions a start in buildings and to carry them through the period while the mill tax is being collected.

The passage of this bill will take the university and Agricultural college out of politics. The efficiency and dignity of the institutions demand permanency of support and freedom from political entanglements.

Through the unified control of the single board, hearty co-operation of the two institutions will be insured. The advantages of a combined institution will be secured, and the advantages which come from segregation will not be sacrificed.

Since the millage bill involves the question of taxation, it should be taken directly to the people. It is, therefore, not an abuse but a proper use of the initiative law, and the bill should be voted upon its merits.

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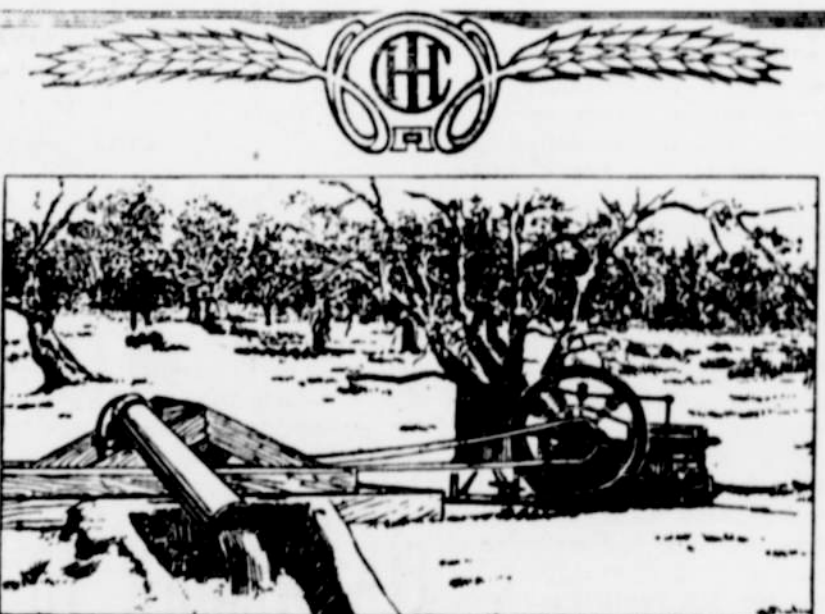
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
