

DIAZ'S LIFE SPARED; IMPRISONED

PRESIDENT MADERO YIELDS TO STRONG PRESSURE

Two of the Rebel Leader's Officers Are Summarily Executed—Court Martial Is Now in Progress at Vera Cruz—Fear Is Entertained That the Army May Get Angry and Revolt

To Save Diaz' Life

MEXICO CITY, Oct. 25.—It was announced this afternoon that President Madero will spare the life of Diaz, decreeing that he be imprisoned and not shot. It has not been announced how long he will be imprisoned.

MEXICO CITY, Oct. 25.—It is expected that the court martial of Diaz will start in Vera Cruz late this afternoon. Cuesta and Zarate have already been executed. Crowds surround the newspaper offices clamoring for news.

NEW YORK, Oct. 25.—A local news bureau dispatch from Mexico City says that Major Cuesta and Major Zarate have been shot to death in Vera Cruz. The message adds that Madero's advisers have not agreed on the advisability of shooting Diaz. Pressure has been brought to bear on Madero to save the nephew of the former president, but there are others who have warned Madero that unless Diaz is summarily executed the army may revolt.

BINGHAM MINERS CLASH WITH DEPUTY SHERIFFS

SALT LAKE, Oct. 25.—The striking miners and deputy sheriffs engaged in a battle in Bingham this morning. L. J. Tidwell, a special deputy, was shot through both arms several times. He may die.

Two Greeks, who have not been identified, were wounded.

The officers allege that the strikers waited in ambush and fired a volley when the deputies escorted some of the Greek workmen to the United States mine.

TRAITOR GIVES THE UNION KEYS

INDIANAPOLIS, Oct. 25.—Ralph Douglas, an Indianapolis reporter testified today that he had discovered a dictograph in the Iron Workers Union headquarters. He described how the government agents had listened to everything two weeks before John McNamara had been arrested.

Despite objections, Walter Drew swore that Hockin gave Detective Burns keys to the union headquarters, thus enabling the detective to install the dictograph.

When Hockin turned over the keys he said:

WOMAN SOBS; LEAVES COURT

SAN DIEGO, Calif., Oct. 25.—Mrs. Lewis, who is the leading witness for her husband, on trial for murder, sobbed for two hours, and was then led from the court room.

A. J. Arens of Berkeley swore that Lewis had described to him Toliver's abuse. He believed that Lewis was insane.

ROOSEVELT TO RE-ENTER FIGHT

OYSTER BAY, Oct. 25.—Colonel Roosevelt dressed early this morning and had breakfast. He dictated letters and started preparing two speeches, the first to be delivered in Madison Square Garden next week and the other in Oyster Bay on the eve of election.

Dr. Terrill said that the Colonel was getting along fine, and that there was no reason why he should not re-enter the campaign.

The Colonel lunched with Perkins, Munsey and William Hotchkiss.

Wilson Gets Busy

PRINCETON, N. J., Oct. 25.—Woodrow Wilson will resume the stump Monday. He will speak at

two rallies in Philadelphia, and during the rest of the week he will speak in New Jersey in favor of the state legislative ticket. He will appear in Madison Square Garden on October 31st.

Beveridge to Testify

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 25.—The Clapp investigation committee held a brief meeting this morning and then adjourned until tomorrow, when ex-Senator Beveridge will testify.

CHAMPION STEER ROPER ARRESTED

PENDLETON, Oct. 26.—Jim Roach, Umatilla county cowboy, who won the steer roping championship of the world at the recent Round-Up, is now the prisoner of the man who conferred the title of champion upon him, T. D. Taylor being not only the sheriff of Umatilla county, but also president of the Round-Up Association.

Roach is charged with larceny of a calf from L. W. Keeler, a McKay creek farmer, and will be given a preliminary hearing next Monday. Until then he will remain in the county jail unless he furnishes bonds of \$750.

MOTHER OFFERS CASH FOR SON

GUSTAV VAIL HAS BEEN MISSING FOR SOME TIME, AND HIS MOTHER FEARS THAT FOUL PLAY HAS OCCURRED

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 26.—Fearing that her son, Gustav Erby Vail, a youth of 20 years of age, who came here from Portland, Ore., a short time ago, and has been missing since October 10th, has met with foul play, his mother has offered a reward for any information as to his whereabouts.

The last trace of Vail is found when he called on John Weylton, at 5223 Mission street, and asked where he could invest \$500 in the plumbing business. This is the last seen of him by his friends, and his mother, who is living at the Dale hotel, is almost prostrated with worry over his continued absence.

Mrs. Vail has lived in Portland for the past forty years, and came here following her son's removal to this city. She is said to have been a prominent leader in Grange work in Oregon, and also in the woman suffrage movement. Friends fear that Vail had the \$500 with him when he disappeared, and that he was killed for his money.

CALIFORNIA TO POLL MANY VOTES

SACRAMENTO, Oct. 26.—Secretary of State Jordan announced today that the total registration of California was 988,706. This is 200,000 over the registration of 1910, but is below the expectation.

As there was no segregation, it is impossible to determine how many women registered.

SUIT TO OUST PRINTER STOPPED

SALEM, Oct. 26.—After it had been pending in court ever since September, 1911, Secretary of State Olcott has directed Attorney General Crawford to dismiss the suit instituted to oust State Printer Dunnaway from the Capitol building. The secretary of state in instituting the suit maintained that under the law the state printer was not entitled to an office in the state house, and declared that room taken up by the plant was needed by other officers entitled to office room.

The circuit court sustained a demurrer to the complaint, and the secretary of state appealed to the supreme court, where the case was pending. As it is figured that by the time it is decided the additional capitol building will be completed and the state printer be able to move into it, it was decided to dismiss the case.

CHARLES TAFT GIVES \$50,000

NEW YORK, Oct. 26.—At republican headquarters this morning the contribution figures to date were announced. The largest is from Charles Taft, and is \$50,000. Francis Leland of New York contributed \$50,000 and Andrew Carnegie \$35,000.

Miner Is Shot

SALT LAKE, Oct. 26.—Otto Kelly was shot in the left eye and killed by Deputy Sheriff William Meyers at Bingham today. The coroner is investigating.

MEXICO CITY, Oct. 26.—Miguel and Lima, officers of Diaz staff, are believed to have been shot this morning in Vera Cruz.

President Madero formally refused the senate's demand for information concerning the fate of Diaz.

FACING ELECTRIC CHAIR, BECKER NERVOUS

FORMER POLICE OFFICER WILL APPEAL CASE

Declares That the Charge to the Jury by Justice Goff Was One of the Causes of His Conviction—He Wanted to Tell His Own Story of the Stand—Errors Are Made in the Record

NEW YORK, Oct. 25.—Ex-Lieutenant of Police Becker, convicted yesterday of murder in the first degree, is retaining his nerve. His lawyers insist that there are plenty of reversible errors in the record, and that the verdict will not stand.

The prisoner's greatest concern to day appears to be his wife's condition. He insists that he is innocent and blames his conviction on Justice Goff's charge to the jury and his attorney's refusal to allow him to go on the stand.

The defense will file notice of appeal as soon as sentence is passed next Wednesday.

UNIFORM WEIGHT TO BE ADOPTED

For the first time in the history of boxing in the United States, an official attempt will be made by the New York State Athletic Commission to fix an international standard of weights to govern championship bouts in the various classes.

The commission hopes to get its schedule recognized by the authorities governing the sport in England, France and Australia. The weight scale, drawn up by the New York commission is now on its way to the governing bodies in the three countries named, and it is expected to meet their approval:

Paperweight, 108 pounds; bantamweight, 115 pounds; featherweight, 125 pounds; lightweight, 135 pounds; welterweight, 145 pounds; middleweight, 158 pounds; light-heavyweight or "commission" weight, 175 pounds; heavyweight, 175 pounds and over. The commission in fixing the scale also stipulated that the various weight limits should be made at the ringside. Weighing has many opponents in this country, and it is believed that a modification of this rule will be agreed upon later by the international bodies concerned.

The commission's schedule calls for a new class to include boxers too heavy to make 158 pounds ringside, yet too light to compete as full-fledged heavyweights. The idea is to do away with contests in which a man weighing 165 pounds meets an opponent carrying 20 pounds or more.

In addition to the weights program, the commission has entered into an agreement with English, French and Australian promoters by which uniform rules and penalties will be mutually recognized.

YOUTH GETS YEAR ON THE ROCKPILE

PORTLAND, Oct. 26.—Tommy King, 18 years of age, who stole a valuable auto belonging to Mrs. C. H. Lewis from in front of the Multnomah hotel the night of August 24th, and wrecked it at Gresham while on a joy ride, was brought before Judge Gatens this forenoon and sentenced to a year on the rockpile. King received a broken hip when the machine rolled over an embankment, and has been in the hospital. His companions, Ed McGinty and E. W. Walker, were unhurt. All three were indicted for the theft, but McGinty and Walker have been paroled by Judge Gatens that he had taken five other automobiles in a similar manner, and after driving them about for a portion of the night, deserted them.

BECKER TO DIE IN DECEMBER

NEW YORK, Oct. 26.—It is rumored that as a result of the confession of Shapiro, the district attorney has a complete case against the gunmen who are charged with the murder of Rosenthal.

It is expected that Justice Goff will set the first or second week in December as the time for the execution of Becker.

BEVERIDGE IS PERKINS' FRIEND

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 26.—At noon the Clapp investigating committee adjourned indefinitely, and will probably not resume until congress convenes.

Senator Beveridge testified that he and Perkins are close friends. He added:

"He is the god father of my son. Pinchot is the god father of my daughter, and both are my devoted friends. When the senators walked out while I was speaking and I was supposed to be broken and humiliated and my career ended, Perkins stood by me. He is my oldest friend."

SERVIANS WIN A VICTORY TODAY

AUSTRIA AND RUSSIA PREDICT DEFEAT OF SULTAN

Attitude of Two Powers Is Deemed Menacing—England and Italy Will Stand Together in the Trouble Which Is Threatened in the Settlement of War in the Balkan States

Servians Win

LONDON, Oct. 26.—A stock exchange dispatch says that the Servians have captured Uskub.

Prisoners Arrive

SOFIA, Oct. 26.—One thousand Turkish prisoners arrived here this afternoon from Adrianople. They were received kindly and given medical attention.

LONDON, Oct. 26.—A dispatch from Athens says that the Greeks have captured more towns. The Turks are retreating, butcher the inhabitants. Diplomats expect that the Turks will admit defeat soon and ask for terms.

May Intervene

PARIS, Oct. 26.—The foreign diplomats are endeavoring to secure a peaceful intervention in the Balkans. England and Italy are expected to support this move. The attitude of Germany, Austria and Russia is causing anxiety.

Scutari Bombarded

CETTINJE, Oct. 26.—The Montenegrins are bombarding Scutari. The Turkish artillery replied.

Uskub to Fall

VRANJE, Servia, Oct. 26.—The Servians have captured Varisovita, north of Uskub. It is believed that this foreshadows the fall of Uskub.

VIENNA, Oct. 26.—It is reported authoritatively that Austria and Russia have notified Turkey that "in view of recent developments, we reserve our liberty of action."

If this is true it means that the two powers consider the Turks beaten, and propose to protect their own interests, regardless of the wishes of the sultan. This is deemed menacing by the other powers.

VIENNA, Oct. 26.—Dispatches from Sofia say that the Bulgarians have cut off the retreat of the Turkish commander, Mukhtar Pasha, and the bulk of his army. It is stated that he will be forced to surrender or be destroyed.

SOFIA, Oct. 26.—It is reported that the Bulgarians are storming Adrianople, after a bombardment.

Eighteen hundred Turks have been captured.

All of the Bulgarian forces are not engaged in the attack on Adrianople, but a portion of the army is pushing southward to engage the main Turkish force.

CAMBRIDGE SPRINGS Penn., Oct. 26.—President Taft dedicated the Polish college here today. He lauded the influx of the sturdy peasantry of Europe, whose arms had built the railroads, declaring that they soon became a part of the American body politic.

EDDIE HEARING GETS EXCITING

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 25.—Alma Jones, an octofoon, collapsed on the witness stand during the Eddie hearing today.

Ledene Earle, a chorus girl, and the fourth woman to accuse Eddie, and Humane Officers McLoughlin and Lloyd Johnson swore that they had watched Eddie and the Jones woman through a keyhole.

WILSON TO GO TO BED EARLY

PRINCETON, N. J., Oct. 26.—Woodrow Wilson stated today that he would retire at 9 o'clock on election night, no matter what the returns indicate. Wires have been installed in his home for the benefit of the members of the family. The governor says that he prefers to wait until the next day to learn the results.

Roosevelt Feels Fine

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SULTAN CHIEF IS MADE PRISONER

BULGARIANS SUSTAIN HEAVY LOSS BUT WIN

Forty Thousand Subjects of the Sultan Lay Down Their Arms and Are Taken Prisoners of War—Strong Position in Front of Adrianople Is Captured by the Forces of the Allies

CETTINJE, Oct. 25.—Thirty-four thousand Bulgarians were slain in capturing Kirk Killaseh, and a similar number were wounded. It is ascertained that the Turks' loss was even greater.

The Bulgarians captured General Mahmud Mukhtar Pasha, the Turkish commander; Prince Ambdul Hafim and several pashas, besides 40,000 soldiers and 118 cannon.

PODGORITZA, Oct. 25.—General Martinovitch's Montenegrins last night captured a position dominating Tarabosch, the main fortress defending Scutari. He has demanded the surrender of the Turks.

Montenegrins Rejoice

CITTENJE, Oct. 25.—A dispatch from the front says that the Montenegrins have surrounded Scutari, and have commenced bombarding the place. There is great rejoicing here, as Scutari is the most important point in Northern Albania. The town is strongly defended.

Bulgarians Fighting

SOFIA, Oct. 25.—It is officially announced that dispatches from the front say that the Bulgarians are closing in on Adrianople, and are entrenching as they advance. The Turks are retreating at some points.

The Bulgarians are reported to be within three miles from the main forts of the city. News of an attempt to storm the city is expected at any hour.

Teddy Is Weak

OYSTER BAY, Oct. 25.—Colonel Roosevelt was out of doors for half an hour today. He is still weak, and suffers occasional pain from the bullet wound. It is believed that it will require all of his strength to deliver his Madison Square Garden speech of half an hour.

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
