### AGED EMPEROR WANTS WAR START

#### FRANZ JOSEF MAKES A STATEMENT REGARDING MURDER

An Armistice Has Been Agreed Upon in Order to Permit the Burial of the Dead—Peace With Turkey Is Now in Sight, But It Is Certain That Trouble Will Emerge Between the World Powers.

VIENNA, Nov. 19.—A dispatch from Budapest says that when told of the bayonetting of Consul Prochaska at Prishrend, Emperor Franz Josef said:

"I was for peace, but now I am not for peace at any price."

#### Armistice Agreed on

CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 19.—The Bulgarians have agreed to an eight-hour armistice to bury the dead. The slaughter during the last few days has been terrific. Corpses are piled high within and without the Chatalja forts.

SOFIA, Nov. 19.—The Bulgarian plenipotentiaries were appointed today to arrange for a general armistice with Turkey.

#### Peace Is Near

BERLIN, Nov. 19.—Peace is near at hand in the Balkans. It is feared, however, that the partition of European Turkey may start trouble between the powers. The sultan will probably retain but a fragment of European Turkey.

#### Cholera Breaks Out

SOFIA, Nov. 19.—The government admits that cholera has broken out among the Bulgarians before Constantinople.

#### SISEMORE FAVORS SELLING SQUARE

#### FORT KLAMATH RANCHER BELIEVES THAT ENTIRE BODY OF TAXPAYERS IN THE COUNTY SHOULD GET BENEFIT

Lindsey Sisemore, well known Fort Klamath rancher, is opposed to any plan which will deprive the taxpayers of Klamath county of the proceeds of the sale of court house square. He arrived in the city Monday night and Tuesday was discussing the subject with Klamath Falls residents.

"Court house square belongs to Klamath county taxpayers," said Mr. Sisemore, "and should be sold for the benefit of the whole county, not retained for the benefit of a few people in Klamath Falls, who, through sentiment mostly, desire to retain it."

"The plan to turn the square into a market place seems to me ridiculous. In the first place the property is too valuable for that purpose. The plan of providing a market place is good, but a better and less expensive location should be secured."

"Market places of the kind being planned are not as a rule the most attractive spots in the world, and it does not seem to me proper that the center of the city should be utilized for that purpose. However, that is a matter in which the residents of Klamath Falls are most interested. All of the taxpayers of the county will be affected by the sale of the property."

### MUCH MONEY IS SPENT ON NOTS

#### STATEMENTS FILED WITH THE SECRETARY OF STATE DISCLOSE SOME ENLIGHTENING FINANCIAL MATTERS

SALEM, Nov. 18.—Expense statement filed with the secretary of state show that a total of \$39,899.80 was spent during the campaign to defeat the graduated single tax measure and to secure the passage of tax measures endorsed by the state legislative tax committee.

The Oregon Equal Taxation League spent \$28,810.06 of this sum, the state legislative tax committee \$7,047.74, and Sig Stebel \$4,085. Though the time for filing statements expired last night, W. S. U'Ren, who during the campaign led the single tax forces and who is known to have spent large sums of money on the promotion of the measures for which they stood, has filed no statement. Advice received by the secretary of state are to the effect that he takes the position that he has seven days yet in which to file a statement, but an examination of the law fails to disclose any such provision. When a candidate fails to file an expense statement, the law provides that he shall be prosecuted, but no provision seems to be made for the prosecution of persons who expend money for or against measures, and fail to file a statement.

The statement filed by W. S. Dunaway, state printer, showed he had expended \$2,313.22 in fighting the state printer flat salary bill. A statement filed by Harry Hill shows that he expended \$350.35 in waging the campaign for the measure. R. A. Harris has filed a statement showing he spent \$332.50 on behalf of the bill to abolish capital punishment.

A. W. Lafferty, candidate for congress from the Third district, expended \$383.99; Thomas McCusker, candidate for the same office, spent \$609.39; N. J. Sinnott, candidate for congress in the Second district, spent \$184.85. The Cascade county committee expended \$2,981.07 on behalf of a measure to create Cascade county.

#### ON DISPLAY

AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE SHOWS VARIOUS TYPES OF THE SOIL OF STATE AT PORTLAND LAND SHOW—DEMONSTRATIONS

 CORVALLIS, Nov. 18.—Farmer, orchardist and stock raiser alike will be interested in the display of the various types of Oregon soil to be made by the department of agronomy of the Oregon Agricultural college at the Portland Land Show.

Everything found in the state, from the lightest sand loam to the heaviest clay soils, will be shown.

The method by which soil samples are taken will be demonstrated, as will also the actual analysis of soils for their various properties, just as it is done in the college laboratories. The complete set of instruments used in soil analyses will also be shown and explained.

Experiments will be carried on in various lines during the week, including percolation, mulching, leaching and other soil improvement methods.

#### POWER FLOW KEPT BUSY AT THE FORT

The Weather Takes a Change for the Better, and Much Progress is Made in Preparing for the Crop of the Coming Year

FORT KLAMATH, Nov. 19.—We are having some very nice weather for this time of the year, and there is every indication of a mild winter, which, it would seem, we are entitled to after so much bad weather for the past year.

#### Two big power plows are now at

work in the upper end of the valley, and they have enough work to keep them busy all winter if the weather will only permit, which is not likely; yet it has been known in the past for conditions to permit of plowing most of the winter.

All kinds of stock are doing fine on pasture at present. But it will not be long until it will be necessary to feed, whether we have snow or not, owing to the growth of the grass being checked by frost.

Mr. J. W. Cox, who has just finished plowing 300 acres of fine meadow land, left for his home in Medford a few days ago, to be gone until the 1st of April, when he expects to begin seeding his 1,100 acres for next season's crop. Mr. Cox expects to thresh several hundred acres of timothy next year.

The creamery at Fort Klamath is doing fine for this time of year. Owing to the fact that the cows are doing less at the beginning of winter than at any other time, it was not expected the output would be as great as it is, but by the first of the year, when all cows will be sheltered and fed, and the increased number of fresh cows, the output will be doubled.

News has just been received that George L. Nutley is very low with pneumonia at his home in Tacoma, Wash. Mr. Nutley is an old-time resident shoemaker of Klamath Falls, he moved to Washington about fourteen years ago, where he has been engaged in the hotel business.

Johnson came into court accompanied by four big negroes who acted as his bodyguard.

Lucille Cameron, who it was claimed Johnson abducted, is in jail in Rockford, held as a witness against Johnson in cases which the government has started, and which white slavery is charged.

#### BEATY GUARDS BLIND MUSICIAN

DEPUTY UNITED STATES MARSHAL TAKES SUSPECT TO WASHINGTON ON CHARGE OF WHITE SLAVERY

NORTH YAKIMA, Wash., Nov. 20.—Arrested on a white slavery charge, C. L. Lloyd, a blind musician, who, led about by a very pretty young girl, has been a feature of the streets in many cities of Washington and Oregon, is in the county jail upon complaint of the federal authorities.

He was brought here from Portland by R. F. Beatty, a United States deputy marshal of Oregon, on a writ of removal from that district.

Unless bail is furnished, he will remain in jail here until the February term of the federal court, when he will be arraigned for violation of the Mann white slave act in having transported the girl from Washington to Oregon. The girl has passed for his sister. Lloyd, it is said, has a wife and two children in Walla Walla.

### AUSTRIA AND SERBIA MAY FIGHT

#### NEWSPAPERS SAY THAT SERBIAN TUM HAS BEEN SEEN

Trouble Between the Allies and Turkey Is About Over—It Is Considered Certain That the Representatives of the Countries Involved Will Agree on Peace—Disease Takes Many Lives

BERLIN, Nov. 20.—The Tageblatt prints a story today to the effect that Austria has sent an ultimatum to Serbia.

The Vienna Reichpost says that the two countries are on the eve of war.

SOFIA, Nov. 20.—General Savoff has been chosen as Bulgaria's representative in the peace negotiations at Chatalja. Hostilities have ceased.

#### Turks Agree

LONDON, Nov. 20.—A dispatch from Sofia says that Turkey has agreed to the terms of peace of the Balkan states. It is believed here that the announcement is premature.

#### Nazim Pasha Named

CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 20.—Nazim Pasha has been named as Turkey's representative to confer with the allies.

#### War Is Over

BERLIN, Nov. 20.—The war is considered over. An agreement between the representatives of Turkey and the allies is considered certain.

The Turkish army has been reduced to half by wounds and disease. Cholera is spreading in the ranks of both armies.

There are now signs of trouble between the allies. Bulgaria, Greece and Serbia all want Monastir.

#### Sultan Keeps Constantinople

LONDON, Nov. 20.—It has not been announced what the allies demand, but it is believed that they will permit the sultan to keep Constantinople, a strip along the Bosphorus, the Sea of Marmora, the Dardanelles and nominal suzerainty over Albania.

#### Courier En Route

VIENNA, Nov. 20.—Under Austrian pressure, Serbia has allowed an Austrian foreign office courier to start for Prizerend to interview Count Prochaska, who was reported bayoneted.

#### Provinces Dissatisfied

BELGRADE, Nov. 20.—It is predicted that if Austria tries to prevent Serbia securing an Adriatic port, the Austrian provinces of Delmatia, Herzegovina, Bosnia, Croatia and Slavonia will seek to rejoin the Serbian kingdom.

#### IRATE HUSBAND KILLS A YOUTH

WIFE WHO WAS INDIRECT CAUSE OF THE MURDER REMARKS THAT IT IS "TOUGH LUCK, AIN'T IT?"

NORTH YAKIMA, Wash., Nov. 20.—"Gee, it's tough luck, ain't it?" remarked Mrs. Lida Defoe, in reference to the murder by her husband of John Holley Hagerman, a young farmer, with whom she had gone to a dance in the Natches Valley.

"My husband left me a month ago, and he wrote that he was going to sue for a divorce. I thought I was practically a free woman, and I began going to these Saturday night dances with Mrs. Olson. She lived with me. Her husband is in Tacoma. We told people that we were sisters, and that our name was Delmore. I was Cherry and she was Flora. I don't know whether I told Ogburn, the boy with rMs. Olson, that I was married or not. He called me Cherry. We didn't want these boys to know where we lived, and met at the corner of Camp's drug store Saturday night to drive out to the dance. When we came home we didn't want them to know where the house was, so we told them to stop about a block beyond it."

"When we were getting out we saw a man running towards us. I thought it was my brother-in-law, and then I saw it was my husband, and I said 'Oh, George.' Then he began shooting. He shot Ogburn in the leg, and then shot at Hagerman. He turned the gun on me, but I grabbed his arm. Then he shot after Mrs. Olson, who was running."

Defoe in the county jail cautioned his wife not to talk or to let any one get pictures of either of them or see his letters. He assured her he would see that she and their adopted daughter were taken care of, even though he had to go to Walla Walla for 99 years.

George Ogburn, who received a bullet in his hip, is in no danger. Both Mrs. Defoe and Mrs. Olson are being detained.
