

WHISKEY CAUSES INJURY AND RIOT

MEXICAN IS LODGED IN COUNTY JAIL FOR OFFENSE

Joe Lopez, With Liquor in Possession, Makes a Distasteful Trip to the Klamath Reservation—Eph Captain Gets Some of the Firewater and Starts on Rampage Which Causes Much Trouble.

Charged with selling liquor to an Indian and, indirectly, being responsible for the serious injury of an Indian woman, to say nothing of a near riot on the reservation, Joe Lopez, a Mexican, was lodged in the county jail Friday afternoon by Jim Johnson, chief of the Indian police on the Klamath reservation.

Lopez is accused of selling liquor to Eph Captain, who became intoxicated and started on a rampage.

Armed with a club, he proceeded to beat up his sister. The woman is said to be in a serious condition. Then Captain charged on Kate Javison, another Indian woman, and injured her, but not seriously.

The prisoner will be held here until the arrival of federal officers from Portland.

LECTURES WILL GET ATTENTION

A public lecture course for the patrons of the public schools as was suggested by State School Superintendent Alderman, is being considered by a number of school districts in the county, and already two of the districts, Merrill and Bonanza, have decided to hold a series of lectures covering the subjects selected by Mr. Alderman. These lectures will commence some time in January, and continue through the winter.

The questions are all occupying the minds of thinking people at the present time, and they are to be discussed before the audiences at the school assemblies by prominent Klamath county men. Public school programs will also be given in connection with the lectures.

Rollo C. Groesbeck, a well known attorney, has been assigned the subjects, "New View of Education," and "New View of Crime and Criminals." Other lecture subjects yet to be assigned for the course follow:

"New View of Boy Life," "New View of Recreation," "New View of Human Life," "New View of Rural Life," "New View of People's Wealth," "New View of Workingmen's Rights," "New View of Community Life," "New View of Public Finance."

William S. Fish, who has been manager of the Big Basin Lumber company's interests in the Klamath country for the past three years, has resigned his position with the company. He will be succeeded by Glen M. Harrington, who arrived Friday night from San Francisco, and is being taken over by the Big Basin's interests by Mr. Fish.

Mr. Fish has not given any definite statement as to his plans for the future, but it is understood that he will remain in the Klamath country, possibly engaging in the lumber business for himself.

Mr. Fish came to Klamath Falls three years ago from McCloud, Calif., where he was connected with the McCloud River Lumber company. Since coming here he has been directly in charge of the Big Basin company's sawmill, its logging operations at Keno, its planing mill and wholesale and retail business in this city and its branch yards at Merrill and Dorris. The growth of the business transacted by the company was largely due to his efforts.

Mr. Harrington, the new manager, has been connected with the C. A. Smith Lumber company at Bay Point, and is a lumberman of wide experience. He will assume the management of the Big Basin in a few days.

KNAPP WANTS \$750 FOR PLANS

Suit was started in the circuit court last Friday by Fred H. Mills, attorney for J. J. Knapp, against the city of Klamath Falls. The action is brought to recover \$750, alleged to be due for services rendered in drawing plans and preparing specifications for a proposed city hall.

The bill has been before the city council on three different occasions, and at the last meeting was rejected.

MURDER CASE IS PROBE SUBJECT

GRAND JURY IS EXAMINING WITNESSES IN AN EFFORT TO SECURE FACTS CONNECTED WITH THE MURDER OF FRANK JACK

That the Klamath county grand jury is probing carefully into the murder of Frank Jack is evidenced by the fact that for three days witnesses in the case have been before the jury.

Soon after the murder, which occurred at Fort Klamath, Chenoweth Umpqua, an Indian, was arrested, charged with having fired the fatal shot. Later stories that others were implicated in the affair were received here from the Indian reservation. It is supposed that the grand jury is investigating these stories.

As a result of the action taken by the county court in refusing to authorize the construction of wooden bridges over canals of the second unit laterals of the Klamath project, the reclamation service has decided to put in corrugated metal pipe bridges at all crossings.

In connection with the second unit laterals on the Klamath project the reclamation service followed the custom heretofore prevailing on this project, and designed the canals at road crossings for first class fir bridges.

After the material had been bought and delivered, and just as the construction of the bridges was about to be started, the county court formally ordered the local office that it would not permit any more wooden bridges to be built, but would require either concrete or corrugated metal pipe at all crossings of highways with laterals. The appropriation for the project made concrete bridges out of the question, hence proposals were at once gotten out for corrugated pipe, and bids were opened on the 2d inst., with the following result:

Beall & Co., Portland, Ore., \$6,467; Illinois Corrugated Metal Co., Bloomington, Ill., \$6,105; Canton Culvert Co., Canton, Ohio, \$6,019; The Hennepin Bridge Co., Minneapolis, Minn., \$4,952.

The lowest bid was accepted.

Corrugated pipe does not permit the passage of water so readily as open structures like bridges, and as the canals are already located and under construction, it is impossible to change the grade sufficient to accommodate the extra head required by the pipe structures. It will be necessary in many cases, therefore, to lay three parallel lines of 36-inch pipe, and even then the water delivery through the laterals will be restricted somewhat from the original computed capacity, and the cost of the crossings will be very much greater than would have been the case with wooden bridges, thus adding to the building cost per acre.

WINTER WORK TO BE CARRIED ON

THERE WILL BE NO LET UP IN THE PROGRESS OF THE SECOND UNIT LATERAL OF THE RECLAMATION SERVICE

Work on the excavation of canals in the second unit of the Klamath project will in all probability continue through the winter, according to reclamation service officials. All of the sub-contractors under Maney Brothers have contracts calling for both dirt excavation and rock work, and as soon as the weather becomes too severe to do dirt excavation the sub-contractors will commence the work of blasting out the rock.

This announcement would indicate that the work on the second unit contracted for by Maney Brothers will be completed much sooner than anticipated, despite the rapid progress that was made in the different schedules. The work completed by the 1st of December was greatly in excess of the ten per cent required by the contract between Maney Brothers and the reclamation service.

Work on the steel flume across Lost River at Olene will be completed as soon as the bridge where the county road crosses the canal is widened. Timbers for this work were sent to Olene today.

The flume will carry water across Lost River from the east branch canal to the South Poe Valley lateral, which is now being built. The work of erecting the flume was done by the reclamation service.

In addition to the construction of the steel flume, the reclamation service also built 2,200 feet of flume near the Masten ranch, to carry the water on the North Poe Valley lateral around the rim rock at that point.

YOUNG CARLEY GETS A CHANGE

JUDGE BENSON PAROLES YOUTH WHO PLEADED GUILTY TO A CHARGE OF BURGLARIZING THE GUN STORE

Upon his promise to do better in the future, William Carley, the lad who pleaded guilty to a charge of robbing the Gun Store, was paroled on Saturday by Circuit Judge Benson, after he had been given an indeterminate sentence of from one to five years. The lad has a promise of employment, and will start to work Monday.

Rollo C. Groesbeck, the defendant's attorney, asked the court to parole the prisoner, stating that the leniency of the court would be an incentive to the youth to mend his ways. The prisoner also expressed his desire of starting anew, and the request for parole was granted after the judge took occasion to give the prisoner some helpful advice.

Stock Reduced

The capital stock of the Klamath Water Users Association was reduced from 100,000 to 60,000 shares at Friday's meeting of the stockholders of the organization. The vote was 51,800 shares in favor, and 200 shares against the reduction.

This reduction of the capital stock places the association on a more workable basis, and reduces the majority necessary to make legal the transactions of the association.

McLEMORE WILL

BUY BIG HERD

P. M. McLemore left on Sunday morning for Arizona to buy 3,000 head of cattle for the northern markets. He will go direct from this city to Nogales, and will spend some time in that vicinity looking over the herds.

About 1,000 head will be shipped to the Sacramento Valley early in the spring, and the balance will be shipped to Lake and Klamath counties to be sold to ranchers. It is Mr. McLemore's plan to buy one and two year olds, as well as a bunch of cows. "I believe that the cattle bought for this section may be shipped here in March, April and May," said Mr. McLemore.

According to letters just received from J. W. McCoy, he has purchased a carload of fine Holstein cattle for distribution in Klamath county, and is now looking for more stock in Ohio. Mr. McCoy's letter, which was written from Jefferson, Wis., said he was leaving immediately for the Northern part of the Buckeye state, which is one of the best dairying sections of the Middle West.

Mr. McCoy expects to leave for Klamath Falls by December 24th, with three carloads of blooded cattle, thereby taking advantage of the special freight rate granted by the Southern Pacific. The cattle being purchased by Mr. McCoy are to be purchased by Klamath county farmers, who realize the necessity of starting their dairy herds with good stock. A large percentage of the cattle will go to the Bohemian colony at Malin.

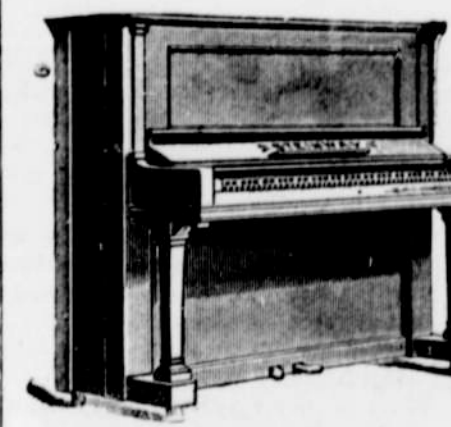
