**ASSOCIATION OF GROWERS IN ROGUE RIVER VALLEY WILL BE CARRIED ALONG ON CO-OPERATIVE LINES**

MEDFORD, Jan. 1.—A call has been issued to the growers of the valley to meet at the city hall, Medford, Saturday, for the purpose of organizing a farmers co-operative fruit association. The committee in charge consists of J. A. Perry, George Andrews and S. A. Nye. Speaking of the proposed organization, Mr. Perry, who managed the old fruit exchange, said:

"We propose to form a fruit exchange along co-operative lines. Members of the present fruit and produce association, who are mostly big growers, can join if they want to, but the new association will not conflict with the old. There is room for both, and there is no reason why they should not work together to some extent, especially in maintaining standards in pack and fruit."
